### DECISIONS ADOPTED BY THE EXECUTIVE BOARD **AT ITS 154th SESSION**

(Paris, 27 April-7 May 1998)

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ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA, TIMETABLE OF WORK AND REPORT OF THE BUREAU (154 EX/1, 154 EX/INF.1 and 154 EX/2)

The Executive Board <u>adopted</u> the agenda and timetable of work as set out in documents 154 EX/1 and 154 EX/INF.1.

The Executive Board <u>decided</u> to refer the following items of its agenda to the commissions:

### 3 EXECUTION OF THE PROGRAMME

3.1 Report by the Director-General on the execution of the programme adopted by the General Conference (154 EX/4, Part I and Corr., Part II and Part III and Add., 154 EX/4 Add., 154 EX/INF.3, 154 EX/INF.4, 154 EX/51 and 154 EX/52)

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### **Execution of the programme**

The Executive Board,

- 1. <u>Having examined</u> documents 154 EX/4, Part II and Part III and Add., 154 EX/4 Add., 154 EX/INF.3 and 154 EX/INF.4,
- 2. Recalling 29 C/Resolution 88 on the working methods of the Executive Board,
- 3. Conscious of its responsibilities with regard to programme implementation,
- 4. <u>Considering</u> that, in order to discharge such responsibilities effectively, the Executive Board must be provided with pertinent information enabling it to evaluate both the progress of the Organization's work measured in terms of the achievement of the results anticipated by Member States through the Organization's actions and the Secretariat's performance,
- 5. <u>Noting</u> that, according to paragraph 67 of document 154 EX/4, Part II, the Director-General has started to introduce a new integrated programming/budgeting/monitoring system, <u>underlines</u> the need for the Executive Board to be kept fully informed of the progress;

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- 6. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to take into account, when reporting to the Executive Board on the execution of the Programme and Budget adopted by the General Conference, the need to include in such reports, as soon as possible and as a first step, the following information in summary form, for each main line of action and for each action:
  - (a) issues identified and objective pursued;
  - (b) expected results;
  - (c) number and type of activities fully or partly implemented and funded under the regular programme; and
  - (d) number and type of financial and/or human resources, indicating reasons for significant differences between resources estimated and resources allocated;
- 7. <u>Further invites</u> the Director-General to report on the implementation of the present decision to it at its 155th session;

- 8. <u>Notes</u> that, after the adjustments and transfers made at the end of the biennium for the purpose of closing the accounts for 1996-1997 (see document 154 EX/21), the expenditures of the biennium were within the limits authorized through appropriations approved by the General Conference and adjusted by the Executive Board;
- 9. <u>Further notes</u> the significant overruns of expenditure as at 31 December 1997 under some objects of expenditure, which are mainly costs related to personnel services, over the provisions contained in Appendix II of document 28 C/5 Approved, and therefore <u>requests</u> the Director-General to increase his efforts for further efficient delivery of programmes in the execution of document 29 C/5 Approved, on the understanding that the reports on the execution of the programme adopted by the General Conference will contain the same breakdown of objects of expenditure as contained in document 154 EX/4 (Part III), Table 3;

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- 10. <u>Notes with regret</u> that, owing to the failure of Members to pay their contributions on time, the Director-General again borrowed money during the 1996-1997 biennium with net interest cost totalling \$2.1 million which was deducted from miscellaneous income to the disadvantage of Member States that pay promptly;
- 11. Notes with concern that information provided in document 154 EX/INF.3 (Part II) on the implementation of the Information Resources Development Plan (IRDP) does not fully comply with 29 C/Resolution 90 and that, in particular, it does not provide information on the assistance given to the National Commissions in this context.

### **Education for All in the nine high-population (E-9) countries**

- 1. <u>Recalling</u> 145 EX/Decision 4.1 in which it asked the Director-General to submit to it at each of its sessions a report about UNESCO-led activities in the nine high-population (E-9) countries relating to Education for All (EFA),
- 2. <u>Having taken note</u> of the oral report by the Director-General about UNESCO's contribution to the E-9 Initiative, and <u>acknowledging with satisfaction</u> the continued progress reported by UNESCO in the E-9 countries since the EFA Summit in New Delhi in 1993, including rising school enrolments and literacy rates, especially for girls, and declining population growth rates,
- 3. <u>Welcomes</u> UNESCO's continued efforts to develop through its offices in the E-9 countries EFA programmes in the priority areas of girls' and women's education, literacy and teacher training, and <u>expresses its appreciation</u> of the Organization's efforts to this effect resulting in the establishment of well functioning offices in

each of the nine countries and the provision thereof with sufficient funds to implement those ambitious programmes;

- 4. <u>Confirms</u> the full commitment of the E-9 countries, as stated in the Joint Communiqué adopted by the Ministers of Education or their representatives in Islamabad on 16 September 1997, to basic education as a fundamental human right and as a central factor in ensuring sustainable livelihoods and the eradication of poverty, and in breaking the cycle of gender inequity, marginalization and exclusion;
- 5. Reaffirms the need to share EFA knowledge and experience developed by the E-9 countries, with a view to making relevant and innovative practice better known to other countries confronted with similar problems, paying special attention in this respect to distance education and modern technologies for basic education, street and working children, literacy and post literacy, and women's education, and, in so doing, making provision for translating relevant publications into national languages in order to enhance the impact of sharing and participating;
- 6. Expresses its appreciation to the Government of Mexico for having invited the E-9 countries to attend a conference in November 1998 on 'women and their role as educators', and <u>recommends</u> that UNESCO give full support to this conference;
- 7. <u>Stresses</u> the importance of the next E-9 Ministerial Review Meeting scheduled to take place in Brazil in 1999, and <u>invites</u> UNESCO to provide full support to the E-9 countries in undertaking for this purpose a comprehensive assessment of EFA progress.

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### Co-operation with the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) and the World Foundation for AIDS Research and Prevention

- 1. Having examined document 154 EX/4 (Part I, para. 59),
- 2. <u>Bearing in mind</u> the statements made on Tuesday, 28 April 1998 before the Executive Board by Dr Peter Piot, Executive Director of the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS), and Professor Luc Montagnier, co-discoverer of the AIDS virus and President of the World Foundation for AIDS Research and Prevention,
- 3. <u>Recalling</u> that UNESCO occupies the Chair of the Committee of Co-sponsoring Organizations of the UNAIDS Programme until 30 June 1998,
- 4. <u>Conscious</u> of the danger represented by the spread of the epidemic in many countries, especially in the developing countries,

- 5. <u>Considering</u> the urgency, in the interests of the international community as a whole, of responding to the challenge of the AIDS epidemic with which millions of human beings are faced,
- 6. Expressing its deep concern at the great difficulty experienced by HIV-positive people in the developing countries in gaining access to the new forms of treatment, and <u>considering</u> that everything must be done to eliminate this discrimination.
- 7. <u>Thanks</u> Dr Peter Piot and Professor Luc Montagnier for the efforts they have made to expand and intensify action to combat AIDS;
- 8. <u>Congratulates</u> the Director-General on the initiatives taken on behalf of UNESCO in support of these efforts;
- 9. <u>Urges</u> the Member States and the competent international organizations to adopt policies and release appropriate funds to render the fight against AIDS more effective at national, regional and world levels:
  - (a) by stepping up preventive action through education, scientifically rigorous information and participation by the local community, while showing respect for cultural values;
  - (b) by continuing research efforts, in order to make treatment accessible to all, by strengthening research capacities, chiefly in the developing countries, and by developing an effective vaccine;
  - (c) by creating, particularly in the developing countries, local structures to ensure the proper use of treatment and the monitoring of its effectiveness;
- 10. Invites the Director-General to make proposals concerning:
  - (a) the strengthening, in UNESCO's programmes, of actions that contribute to combating the epidemic, in particular by taking steps to ensure that population groups particularly affected by HIV/AIDS can benefit from the research efforts and means of prevention;
  - (b) the continuation of his support to the UNAIDS Programme by assisting Member States' efforts in UNESCO's fields of competence;
  - (c) the continuation, in particular through the scientific network set up by the World Foundation for AIDS Research and Prevention, of the research efforts of the UNESCO programme 'Man against Virus', which may be revised to include emergent diseases;
- 11. Also invites the Director-General to report to it at its 156th session.

### Third International Conference of Ministers and Senior Officials Responsible for Physical Activities and Sport

The Executive Board,

- 1. Having examined document 154 EX/4 Add. (para. 21),
- 2. Recalling 151 EX/Decision 3.5.3,
- 3. <u>Bearing in mind</u> the spirit of the recommendations of the second International Conference of Ministers and Senior Officials Responsible for Physical Education and Sport (MINEPS II), which was held in Moscow in 1988,
- 4. <u>Bearing in mind also</u> 29 C/Resolution 19 regarding the Intergovernmental Committee for Physical Education and Sport (CIGEPS),
- 5. <u>Emphasizing</u> the new and higher profile which the Director-General wishes to give to UNESCO's action concerning sports activities,
- 6. Recognizing the importance of strengthening efforts to combat all forms of violence in sports competitions and to defend the ethical dimension of sport, mutual respect and solidarity,
- 7. <u>Aware</u> of the needs of the developing countries with regard to the incorporation of physical and sports activities in their education systems,
- 8. <u>Greatly appreciating</u> the offer of the Government of Uruguay to host the third International Conference of Ministers and Senior Officials Responsible for Physical Activities and Sport in December 1999,
- 9. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to convene this Conference (category II), with a view to examining the role of physical activities and sport as instruments of development, peace, solidarity and international co-operation;
- 10. <u>Further invites</u> the Director-General to carry out, in conjunction with the Uruguayan Government, a feasibility study, without budgetary implications, relating to the financial, logistical and practical aspects of the organization of the Conference and to submit it to the General Conference at its 30th session;
- 11. <u>Also invites</u> the Member States to co-operate in carrying out that study and in ensuring the success of the Conference.

### **Bolshoi Theatre project**

The Executive Board,

- 1. <u>Recalling</u> the importance of promoting cultural creativity and protecting the cultural heritage,
- 2. <u>Underlining</u> the need to support major cultural centres which are of worldwide significance,
- 3. Recognizing the unique artistic and architectural value of the Bolshoi Theatre in Moscow and its contribution to the world cultural heritage,
- 4. <u>Noting</u> that the Director-General has been requested to launch an international fund-raising campaign for the Bolshoi Theatre (154 EX/4, Part I, para. 158),
- 5. <u>Congratulates</u> the Director-General for adopting a strategy for an international awareness campaign;
- 6. Invites the Director-General:
  - (a) to launch an international fund-raising and awareness campaign for the Bolshoi Theatre:
  - (b) to mobilize extrabudgetary funds for the Bolshoi Theatre project;
  - (c) to call on Member States, intergovernmental organizations and nongovernmental organizations to contribute to the implementation of this project.

- 2. <u>Takes note</u> of the proposals contained in these documents concerning the objectives, functions, programmes and governance of the Institute as well as its managerial and financial arrangements;
- 3. <u>Authorizes</u> the Director-General to continue to ensure the transition from the present Division of Statistics to a UNESCO Institute for Statistics and to enable it to start its operation on an experimental basis;
- 4. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to submit to it at its 155th session a report on the implementation of these measures including, in particular, more information on the administrative, managerial and financial aspects planned for the UNESCO Institute for Statistics:

5. <u>Further invites</u> the Director-General to submit to it at its 156th session the draft statutes and the financial regulations for the UNESCO Institute for Statistics.

### 3.3 Education

## **3.3.1** United Nations University: Report by the Council of the University and the Director-General's comments thereon (154 EX/6 and 154 EX/52)

- 1. <u>Taking note</u> with interest of the annual reports for 1996 and 1997 of the Council of the United Nations University (UNU) and the Director-General's report (154 EX/6),
- 2. <u>Acknowledges</u> the outstanding contribution made by the former Rector of UNU, Professor Heitor Gurgulino de Souza, in the institutional and academic strengthening of the University and its networks as well as the furthering of cooperation with UNESCO;
- 3. <u>Appreciates</u> the active participation of UNU in joint activities with UNESCO;
- 4. <u>Expresses satisfaction</u> with the development of the programme and activities of UNU, and <u>invites</u> the University to strengthen its activities on behalf of the states and regions most in need of them;
- 5. Expresses its gratitude to the Government of Japan for its continued financial and intellectual support to UNU and, especially through the Japanese funds-in-trust, its financial support for joint UNU and UNESCO projects, more particularly, for the holding of the regional consultations on higher education in preparation of the World Conference on Higher Education;
- 6. <u>Expresses also its gratitude</u> to the Member States which host Research and Training Centres (RTCs) and Programmes (RTPs) and other institutions of UNU for their continued financial and intellectual support;
- 7. Extends its thanks to those governments and organizations which have contributed to the endowment or operating funds of the University or of its research and training centres and programmes;
- 8. <u>Expresses its full support</u> to the newly appointed Rector of UNU, Professor Hans van Ginkel;
- 9. Reaffirms its recommendation for enhanced co-operation between UNESCO and the United Nations University, including the reinforcement of collaboration on the UNITWIN/UNESCO Chairs Programme and further development of its concept, UNESCO's activities in the field of fellowships and 'study abroad', and the culture of peace programme, as well as the follow-up to such major meetings as the World Conference on Higher Education and the World Science Conference;

10. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to communicate to the Chairman of the Council of the United Nations University and to the Rector the text of the present decision together with the relevant documents.

- 3. Requests the Director-General to take its comments into account when preparing this Conference and, in particular, to prepare the rules of procedure for the Conference in the spirit of the provisions for category II meetings.

- 2. <u>Recalling</u> 143 EX/Decision 7.1.2 and 148 EX/Decision 7.1 in which it designated Members of the Executive Board to serve on the UNESCO/UNICEF Joint Committee on Education.
- 3. <u>Decides</u> to designate the following four Member States: Cuba, Yemen, Senegal and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland to replace, respectively, El Salvador, Jordan, Nigeria and Switzerland.

### **3.3.4** Malcolm Adiseshiah International Literacy Prize (154 EX/44 and 154 EX/52)

- 1. Having examined document 154 EX/44,
- 2. <u>Authorizes</u> the Director-General to accept the generous offer contained therein, it being understood that, in accordance with paragraph 2 of the General Rules governing the award of prizes for meritorious work in literacy, the official name of the prize will be settled by agreement between the donor and the Director-General, and it being further understood that in granting the award, as a literacy prize, special consideration will be given to Dr Adiseshiah's concern about educating low-income communities in rural and urban areas;

3. <u>Expresses its warmest thanks</u> to the Government of India for this contribution to the struggle against illiteracy.

### **3.4.1** Preparations for the holding of the World Science Conference (154 EX/9 and 154 EX/52)

The Executive Board,

- 1. Having examined document 154 EX/9,
- 2. <u>Appreciates</u> the Director-General's efforts in relation to the preparatory work undertaken so far in connection with the organization of the World Science Conference;
- 3. <u>Appreciates also</u> the generous offer of the Government of Hungary to host the Conference;
- 4. <u>Requests</u> the Director-General to take its comments into account when preparing this Conference and, in particular, to prepare the rules of procedure for the Conference in the spirit of the provisions for category II meetings;
- 5. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to report to it on the progress of the preparations for the World Science Conference at its 155th and 156th sessions.

### 3.4.2 Establishment of the World Commission on the Ethics of Scientific Knowledge and Technology (154 EX/10 and 154 EX/52)

- 1. Having examined document 154 EX/10,
- 2. <u>Expresses the hope</u> that the World Commission on the Ethics of Scientific Knowledge and Technology will contribute to the reinforcement of the Organization's ethical mission;
- 3. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to seek full concertation within the United Nations system concerning the agenda of the World Commission, with a view to avoiding duplication of effort;
- 4. <u>Approves</u> the Statutes of the Commission, which are annexed hereto.

#### **ANNEX**

### Statutes of the World Commission on the Ethics of Scientific Knowledge and Technology

#### Article 1

A World Commission on the Ethics of Scientific Knowledge and Technology, hereinafter called 'the Commission' (category V), is hereby established.

### **Article 2**

The Commission shall be responsible for advising the Organization on its programme concerning the ethics of scientific knowledge and technology. It shall also be mandated:

to be an intellectual forum for the exchange of ideas and experience;

to detect on that basis the early signs of risk situations;

to perform the role of adviser to decision-makers in this respect; and, lastly,

to promote dialogue between scientific communities, decision-makers and the public at large.

#### Article 3

- 1. The Commission shall be composed of 18 members, appointed by the Director-General following consultation with the National Commissions and Academies of Science of the Member States, and serving in a personal capacity. It shall have an open-ended structure and may bring in specialists on specific subjects.
- 2. The members shall be appointed for a four-year term, renewable once. In the event of the resignation or death of a Commission member, the Director-General shall appoint a replacement for the remainder of the current term.
- 3. One half of the members of the Commission shall be replaced every two years. Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph 2 above, when appointing the first members of the Commission, the Director-General shall designate the nine members whose term shall expire on 31 December 2000.
- 4. The members of the Commission shall be chosen from among eminent personalities in the fields of science, professional engineering, law, philosophy, culture, religion or politics, having the competence and the authority necessary to fulfil the functions entrusted to the Commission, taking due account of geographical distribution and ensuring coverage of the various disciplines and schools of thought.
- 5. The Presidents of UNESCO's five intergovernmental scientific programmes (IOC, MAB, MOST, IGCP and IHP), of the International Bioethics Committee (IBC) and the Intergovernmental Committee, and those of the International Council of Philosophy and Human Sciences (ICPHS), the International Council of Social Sciences (ICSS), the International Council of Scientific Unions (ICSU)

- and the Pugwash Conference on Science and World Affairs shall be invited to participate in the work of the Commission.
- 6. The Commission shall define, in agreement with the Director-General, the conditions under which certain specialists, representatives of non-governmental organizations or personalities may be consulted in person, on the questions listed in its programme.

### Article 4

- 1. The Member States and Associate Members of UNESCO may participate as observers in the meetings of the Commission.
- 2. States which are not Members of UNESCO, but Members of the United Nations system organizations, may participate as observers in the Commission's meetings at the invitation of the Director-General.
- 3. The United Nations and the other organizations of the United Nations system with which UNESCO has concluded mutual representation agreements may participate as observers in the Commission's meetings.
- 4. The Commission shall define, in agreement with the Director-General, the conditions under which other intergovernmental and international non-governmental organizations with purposes similar to those of the Commission may be invited to attend its debates.

### Article 5

- 1. The Director-General shall convene the Commission in ordinary session once every two years. He/she may convene extraordinary sessions at the request of the President of the Commission and subject to the availability of the necessary resources.
- 2. The Director-General, in consultation with the Bureau of the Commission, shall set the date and place of each session.
- 3. Any Member State of UNESCO, or Member of one of the United Nations system organizations, may invite the Director-General to convene a session of the Commission on its territory.

### **Article 6**

- 1. At each of its ordinary sessions, the Commission shall elect a President, two Vice-Presidents and a Rapporteur, who shall form the Bureau of the Commission and shall remain in office until the following ordinary session.
- 2. Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph 1 above, the Director-General shall appoint the first President of the Commission.
- 3. The Director-General shall convene the Bureau, in consultation with the President, and shall be represented at the Bureau's meetings.

#### Article 7

- 1. The Director-General shall provide the staff and the resources needed to ensure the operation of the Commission's secretariat.
- 2. The Director-General of UNESCO shall designate a member of the UNESCO Secretariat as the Executive Secretary of the Commission.

#### Article 8

- 1. The travel expenses and subsistence allowances payable to Commission members in connection with meetings shall be borne by UNESCO, in accordance with the applicable travel regulations.
- 2. The costs arising from the participation of specialists, in connection with any hearings requested by the Commission, shall be borne by UNESCO, in accordance with the applicable travel regulations.
- 3. The international non-governmental organizations invited to participate in the Commission's work shall bear the expenses arising from the participation of their representative in the Commission's sessions.
- 4. The running expenses of the Commission shall be financed by an allocation made for that purpose by the General Conference at each of its ordinary sessions or by extrabudgetary resources that states may donate for that purpose.

#### Article 9

- 1. The Commission shall establish its Rules of Procedure, which shall be submitted to the Director-General for approval.
- 2. The Director-General shall draw up the agenda of the Commission's sessions, after consultation with the President of the Commission.
- 3. After each session, the Commission shall submit to the Director-General a report on its work, and its recommendations. The Director-General shall transmit the results of the Commission's work to the governing bodies of the Organization, and to the bodies concerned by the Commission's proposals.

### Article 10

The present Statutes may be modified by the Executive Board at its own initiative or on a proposal by the Director-General.

# 3.4.3 Report on concrete measures implemented or being implemented to enable the Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission to carry out its duties effectively (154 EX/11 and 154 EX/51)

The Executive Board,

- 1. <u>Having examined</u> the report by the Director-General on concrete measures implemented or being implemented to enable the Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission (IOC) to carry out its duties effectively (154 EX/11),
- 2. <u>Taking into account</u> the fact that IOC is currently studying amendments to its Statutes and Rules of Procedure,
- 3. <u>Recognizing</u> the relevance, on grounds of efficiency and transparency, of establishing a framework which helps both to clarify and enhance the role of IOC within UNESCO,
- 4. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to submit to it at its 156th session, in a single text, the administrative and financial arrangements consistent with the status of IOC as a body with functional autonomy within UNESCO, making reference, in particular, to the UNESCO provision on which each such arrangement is based.

- 2. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to pursue negotiations with the Government of Italy and UNIDO in this respect, to report thereon and to provide financial and administrative information to it at its 155th session.

### 3.5 Culture

3.5.1 Proposal by the Director-General concerning the criteria for the selection of spaces or forms of popular and traditional cultural expression that deserve to be proclaimed by UNESCO to be masterpieces of the oral heritage of humanity (154 EX/13 and 154 EX/52)

- 1. Recalling Article I of the Constitution of UNESCO,
- 2. <u>Considering</u> that the Convention for the Protection of the World Cultural and Natural Heritage (Paris, 1972) refers only to monuments, groups (of buildings) and sites (works of man or combined works of nature and man) and that it is not applicable to the intangible heritage,

- 3. <u>Taking into account</u> the provisions of the Recommendation on the Safeguarding of Traditional Culture and Folklore, adopted by the General Conference at its 25th session in 1989, and the guide on Living Human Treasures,
- 4. <u>Considering</u> the oral and intangible heritage, composed of different traditional and popular forms of cultural expression produced and/or transmitted orally, as defined in paragraph A of the above-mentioned Recommendation on the Safeguarding of Traditional Culture and Folklore, to which should be added, among the examples, traditional forms of communication and information,
- 5. Recognizing that the oral and intangible heritage is for many communities the essential source of an identity having its roots deep in history,
- 6. <u>Concerned</u> at the fate of the oral and intangible heritage and <u>stressing</u> the need in all countries for recognition of the role of that heritage in the present social context,
- 7. <u>Convinced</u> of the need to make governments, non-governmental organizations, and above all the communities concerned aware of the value of their oral and intangible heritage and of the urgency and importance of safeguarding and revitalizing it,
- 8. <u>Having regard</u> to 29 C/Resolution 23,
- 9. <u>Having examined</u> document 154 EX/13 and, in particular, the draft Regulations relating to the proclamation by UNESCO of masterpieces of the oral heritage of humanity, contained in Annex III thereof,
- 10. <u>Approves</u> the principles set out in document 154 EX/13 concerning the creation of an international distinction entitled masterpieces of the oral and intangible heritage of humanity;
- 11. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to establish, in consultation with all the regions, precise criteria for choosing cultural spaces or forms of cultural expression and to define a detailed selection procedure and funding methods, taking into account the opinions expressed in the discussions of the Programme and External Relations Commission of the Executive Board at its 154th session, with a view to their submission to the Board at its 155th session:
- 12. <u>Further invites</u> the Director-General to study means of disseminating, preserving and protecting these immaterial or intangible cultural spaces for the benefit of the communities of origin;
- 13. <u>Invites also</u> the Director-General to seek public or private donors for the creation of a prize that would be awarded by UNESCO in order to ensure the preservation and promotion of cultural spaces or forms of oral cultural expression proclaimed masterpieces of the oral and intangible heritage of humanity.

### 3.6 Communication

### 3.6.1 Project to establish a film bank and a database for the use of the public television channels of developing countries (154 EX/14 and 154 EX/52)

The Executive Board,

- 1. <u>Having examined</u> document 154 EX/14 on the project to establish a film bank and a database for the use of the public television channels of developing countries, a project entitled 'Screens without Frontiers',
- 2. Recalling the resolutions of the General Conference relating to the role and mission of public service broadcasting and, in particular, 29 C/Resolution 28 concerning Major Programme IV, which *inter alia* invited the Director-General to 'strengthen the educational and cultural mission of public service broadcasting ...',
- 3. <u>Congratulates</u> the author of the feasibility study and the International Radio and Television University (URTI) for the quality of their work, together with all the international and national professional organizations that have taken an interest in this initiative and contributed to the project;
- 4. <u>Emphasizes</u> the importance of this supportive cultural project;
- 5. <u>Recalls</u> the major implications of this project in terms of both human and financial resources;
- 6. Decides therefore to give priority to the implementation of the database;
- 7. <u>Reaffirms</u> the need to associate professional media organizations closely with this project;
- 8. <u>Appeals</u> to Member States to give full support to this project both through financial and commodity contributions and through national, regional and international initiatives;
- 9. <u>Encourages</u> public and private foundations and patrons to display their solidarity by supporting the project financially;
- 10. <u>Expresses its thanks</u> to the Intergovernmental Council of the International Programme for the Development of Communication (IPDC) for its co-operation, and <u>reaffirms</u> its wish that IPDC should consider the possibility of contributing to the financing of the project;

### 11. Invites the Director-General to:

(a) identify extrabudgetary funding sources with a view to finding the necessary contributions to ensure the launching of the first phase of the project: establishment of the database combining existing and appropriate sources, and establishment of a partnership and a network among the organizations concerned;

(b) call on professional organizations wishing to belong to the network to study how it might operate in partnership with UNESCO, and to submit the results of this consultation to it at its 155th session.

- 4. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to report on the implementation of further activities planned for the 1998-1999 biennium at its 157th session, and, in particular, those aimed at encouraging multilingualism on the networks.

- 5. <u>Requests</u> the Committee to resume consideration of this item at the 155th session of the Board and <u>decides</u> to grant the Committee two additional working days for that purpose.

4.4 Report of the Joint ILO/UNESCO Committee of Experts on the Application of the Recommendation concerning the Status of Teachers (CEART) on its fourth special session and report by the Committee on Conventions and Recommendations thereon (154 EX/18 and 154 EX/47)

- 2. <u>Having examined</u> the report submitted by the Joint ILO/UNESCO Committee of Experts on the Application of the Recommendation concerning the Status of Teachers (CEART) on its fourth special session (CEART/SP/1997/13) in the light of document 154 EX/18,
- 3. <u>Concurs</u> with the Director-General's comments on CEART's report and hereby <u>authorizes</u> him, in consultation with the Director-General of ILO, to develop an enhanced programme of co-operation with ILO on the status of teachers, and to support in the education programme and budget in this and the next biennium (2000-2001) some of the proposals for future action set forth by CEART (cf. paras. 84-88 of its report);
- 4. Takes note of the suggestion of ILO's Governing Body that the present mandate of CEART be extended to include monitoring of the Recommendation concerning the Status of Higher-Education Teaching Personnel, and <u>authorizes</u> the Director-General, in consultation with the Director-General of ILO, to examine the implications of this new function for CEART and to recommend to the Executive Board at a subsequent session how this new function may be implemented;
- 5. <u>Decides</u>, subject to the corresponding approval of ILO, to modify CEART's working methods for responding to allegations, as set forth in paragraph 81 of its report;
- 6. <u>Greatly appreciates</u> the valuable suggestions and role of CEART in stimulating action to promote greater awareness and better application of the Recommendation concerning the Status of Teachers, and <u>invites</u> the Director-General to facilitate CEART's current cycle of work, the next report on which, scheduled for the year 2000, is to be presented to the Executive Board by the Chairperson of CEART;
- 7. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to bring the report of CEART, together with the observations of the Executive Board, to the attention of Member States and their National Commissions, international teachers' organizations and other relevant international organizations having relations with UNESCO, and to encourage them to continue and intensify their efforts to apply all provisions of the ILO/UNESCO Recommendation, notably in the light of the Joint Committee's proposals on a strategy for improving teachers' status.

### **4.5 Draft statutes of the International Institute for Higher Education in Latin America and the Caribbean** (154 EX/19 and Add., 154 EX/51 and 154 EX/52)

#### 7.1.2 Education for All

- 1. <u>Welcomes</u> General Assembly resolution 52/84, which reaffirms the international community's resolve to eradicate adult illiteracy and to ensure that everyone acquires a basic education;
- 2. <u>Invites</u> Member States and organizations to accelerate their efforts to expand and improve the provision of basic education, devoting a greater share of their budgets to this end, and to conduct a thorough assessment of their progress towards Education for All (EFA) goals in accordance with the guidelines provided by the International Consultative Forum on Education for All;
- 3. <u>Encourages</u> Member States as well as multilateral and bilateral development agencies to call on UNESCO's experience and expertise when planning the reform and development of their education systems;
- 4. Requests the Director-General:

- (a) to develop further UNESCO's co-operation with United Nations agencies and programmes, as well as with other multilateral and bilateral development organizations;
- (b) to assist Member States in conducting the above-mentioned assessment and in preparing the fourth global meeting of the International Consultative Forum on Education for All that will build on the momentum generated by the Jomtien Conference, which refocused Member States' efforts to build a solid foundation for their education systems;
- (c) to consider the feasibility of launching the United Nations Week on Adult Learning at the fourth global meeting of the International Consultative Forum on Education for All, as a means of achieving the goal of eradicating illiteracy;
- 5. <u>Further requests</u> the Director-General to co-operate fully with the Secretary-General of the United Nations in consulting Member States on effective ways and means for achieving the goal of Education for All and on the desirability and the feasibility of launching a United Nations decade to eradicate illiteracy, taking into account the approach decided at the Fifth International Conference on Adult Education, held in Hamburg in July 1997;
- 6. <u>Urges</u> the Director-General to accord high priority to UNESCO's actions in support of the EFA 2000 Assessment.

- 4. <u>Further requests</u> the Director-General to continue to pursue efforts to have the cultural dimension included in the next United Nations International Development Strategy;

5. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to submit to it at its 155th session a report on the Stockholm Conference and on an overall strategy for a practical follow-up to that Conference.

Recalling also the Joint Statement of the Chairpersons of IGCP, IHP, IOC, MAB and MOST addressed to the General Conference at its 29th session stressing the important contributions which these programmes make to the implementation of Agenda 21 and the need for interdisciplinary scientific co-operation and for a transdisciplinary approach involving the sciences, education, culture and communication, in the pursuit of sustainable development,
- 4. <u>Invites</u> Member States and international organizations to draw the necessary consequences from the alarming outcome of the overall review of the implementation of Agenda 21 and to enhance significantly support, including financial support, for the wide range of measures needed to move towards sustainable development as highlighted in the 'Programme for the Further Implementation of Agenda 21';
- 5. <u>Further invites</u> Member States and international organizations to continue to accord special attention in the further implementation of Agenda 21 and the related conventions to the essential role of the natural sciences, social sciences, education, culture and communication as well as to the importance of interdisciplinary scientific co-operation and transdisciplinary approaches in moving towards sustainable development;
- 6. <u>Invites also</u> Member States to continue to support UNESCO's activities contributing to the implementation of Agenda 21 and the related conventions, to strengthen national activities and national focal points of UNESCO's intergovernmental scientific programmes concerned with environment and sustainable development (IGCP, IHP, IOC, MAB and MOST) as well as of the World Solar Programme, and to ensure the involvement of these national focal points in action aimed at UNCED follow-up;
- 7. <u>Recalling also</u> UNESCO's specific mandate, competence and experience in science and technology for development,

#### 8. Invites the Director-General to:

- (a) continue to ensure that UNESCO's relevant programmes contribute fully to the United Nations system-wide efforts for implementing Agenda 21 and other UNCED outcomes, in the light of the decisions taken by the nineteenth special session of the General Assembly and in close cooperation with the Commission on Sustainable Development, paying also due attention to the moral and ethical dimension of Agenda 21;
- (b) continue to devote particular attention to promoting co-operation both among UNESCO's intergovernmental and international scientific programmes (IGCP, IHP, IOC, MAB, MOST and WSP) in the further implementation of Agenda 21 and the related conventions, and between them and other UNESCO activities in the fields of the sciences, education, culture and communication;
- (c) ensure that the World Conference on Science for the Twenty-First Century: A New Commitment (1999) will also pay particular attention to science for economically efficient, socially equitable and environmentally sound sustainable development, seek adequate co-operation from relevant United Nations system organizations and strengthen UNESCO's leading role in science in the United Nations system;
- (d) pursue efforts to seek funds from appropriate national and international funding agencies and mechanisms, including the Global Environment Facility (GEF), for projects in the area of environment and sustainable development, and assist Member States, particularly developing countries, in their national efforts to obtain extrabudgetary funds;
- (e) continue to report periodically to it on progress made both by UNESCO and by the United Nations system as a whole in the implementation of Agenda 21 and the related conventions, and to make more effective and efficient UNESCO's action as inter-agency task manager for mobilizing and co-ordinating United Nations system-wide support for the implementation of Agenda 21 chapters on science and education.

#### I. CRITERIA FOR THE SELECTION OF ANNIVERSARIES

- (a) Each proposed anniversary should be indisputably linked to the Organization's ideals and missions in the fields of education, science, culture, social and human sciences or communication and should promote closer relations among peoples, tolerance, and the ideals of peace, cultural dialogue and mutual understanding among peoples.
- (b) Commemorations of the birth, independence or institutional regime of a state, historical empires and dynasties will not be eligible for consideration; similarly the anniversaries of military events will be excluded.
- (c) The anniversary should concern personalities, works or events of genuinely worldwide or at least regional significance in order to reflect the ideals, the values, the cultural diversity and the universality of the Organization.
- (d) The anniversary should be a fiftieth anniversary, a centenary, or a multiple thereof; some flexibility should nevertheless be used in applying this criterion.
- (e) The anniversary should be the occasion for nationwide events already planned and for the organization of which certain resources have been allocated in the Member State or group of Member States directly concerned.
- (f) Any anniversary proposal involving more than one state should be submitted by all.

# II. PROCEDURE FOR THE SUBMISSION AND CONSIDERATION OF REQUESTS

### A. Consideration of requests

- (a) The Director-General shall address a circular letter to the National Commissions, accompanied by a form seeking detailed and precise information on their request.
- (b) An intersectoral committee shall be set up within the Secretariat to consider the list of requests meeting the criteria adopted, with a view to achieving greater selectivity and deciding on controversial cases.
- (c) At its session preceding the start of the General Conference, the Executive Board shall take a decision on those requests which have been judged by the Director-General to meet the criteria. The General Conference may be invited to decide on the list of celebrations with which the Organization might be associated during the following biennium as proposed by the Executive Board, as a whole.

#### **B.** Dates for the submission of requests

- (a) The circular letter in which the Director-General invites the National Commissions to inform him/her of the anniversaries of eminent personalities or historic events with which they would like to associate UNESCO shall be sent no later than 15 September of the first year of the biennium, with a deadline for nominations of 15 March of the following year.
- (b) Consideration shall not be given to requests submitted after the deadline.
- (c) The document containing the list of requests which have been judged by the Director-General to meet the criteria adopted above shall be sent to the Member States and to the Members of the Executive Board 30 days before the opening of the session of the Executive Board immediately preceding the General Conference. The requests shall be considered at that session.
- (d) Neither the Executive Board nor the General Conference shall consider requests submitted beyond the deadline, so that the governing bodies do not have to take a decision on requests which have not been previously evaluated by the Secretariat according to the established procedure.

### III. FINANCING OF THE ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS

In conformity with 29 C/Resolution 59, where a state or group of states wishes to obtain financial support from UNESCO for these celebrations, such support would be accorded under the Participation Programme. Nevertheless, in order to maintain a balanced distribution of funds from the Programme, such financial assistance should remain exceptional and be contingent on the submission of a priority request to the Director-General.

- 5. <u>Decides</u>, in accordance with the Statutes of the IBC, to elect at its 155th session, as an interim measure, members of the Intergovernmental Committee whose term of office will expire at the end of the 30th session of the General Conference;
- 6. <u>Also decides</u> that the interim provisions that appear in Articles 6 and 11 of the Statutes of the IBC shall be deleted from the said text at the end of the 30th session of the General Conference.

#### **ANNEX**

### **Statutes of the International Bioethics Committee (IBC)**

#### **Article 1**

A permanent Committee, named the International Bioethics Committee of UNESCO (IBC), hereafter referred to as 'the IBC', is hereby established within the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO).

#### **Article 2 - Functions**

- 1. The Committee shall have the following functions:
  - (a) it shall promote reflection on the ethical and legal issues raised by research in the life sciences and their applications, as well as encourage the exchange of ideas and information, particularly through education;
  - (b) it shall encourage action to heighten awareness among the general public, specialized groups and public and private decision-makers involved in bioethics;
  - (c) it shall co-operate with the international governmental and non-governmental organizations concerned by the issues raised in the field of bioethics as well as with the national and regional bioethics committees and similar bodies;
  - (d) in accordance with Article 24 of the Universal Declaration on the Human Genome and Human Rights, hereafter referred to as 'the Declaration':
    - (i) it shall contribute to the dissemination of the principles set out in the Declaration and to the further examination of issues raised by their applications and by the evolution of the technologies in question;
    - (ii) it shall organize appropriate consultations with parties concerned, such as vulnerable groups;
    - (iii) it shall make recommendations, in accordance with UNESCO's statutory procedures, addressed to the General Conference and give advice concerning the follow-up of the Declaration, and it shall identify practices that could be contrary to human dignity.
- 2. The IBC shall determine its programme of work which shall be made public. The IBC shall include in that programme any item so requested by the Director-General or the Executive Board. It shall take into account the views of the Intergovernmental Committee, hereafter provided under Article 11, concerning its programme.

#### **Article 3 - Membership**

- 1. The IBC shall be composed of 36 members appointed by the Director-General. The members shall be independent and shall act in their personal capacity. When making his choice, the Director-General shall take into account cultural diversity, balanced geographical representation and the need to ensure appropriate rotation. He shall also take into account the nominations for membership of the IBC received from the Member States of UNESCO, Associate Members and non-Member States which have set up a permanent observer mission to UNESCO.
- 2. When proposing their candidates for the IBC, states shall endeavour to include eminent persons who are specialists in the life sciences and in the social and human sciences, including law, human rights, philosophy, education and

communication, with the necessary competence and authority to perform the IBC's duties.

3. The Director-General shall not appoint simultaneously more than one national of the same state.

#### **Article 4 - Observers**

- 1. Member States and Associate Members of UNESCO may take part as observers in the meetings of the IBC.
- 2. Non-Member States which have set up a permanent observer mission to UNESCO may take part as observers in the meetings of the IBC on the invitation of the Director-General.
- 3. The United Nations and the other organizations of the United Nations system with which UNESCO has concluded an agreement providing for reciprocal representation may take part as observers in the meetings of the IBC.
- 4. International governmental or non-governmental organizations with objectives similar to those of the IBC may be invited to take part as observers in the meetings of the IBC.
- 5. Specialists or other relevant persons or groups may be consulted on matters within the competence of the IBC.

### **Article 5 - Sessions**

The Director-General shall convene the IBC at least once a year.

#### **Article 6 - Terms of office**

- 1. The term of office for members of the IBC shall be four years.
- 2. Half the IBC's members shall be replaced every two years.
- 3. The Director-General shall not appoint the same person for more than two consecutive terms of office.

### **Interim provision**

Notwithstanding Article 6.1, the term of office of half the members appointed by the Director-General shall expire at the end of the 30th session of the General Conference. Each outgoing member shall be replaced by a national of a state belonging to the same regional group.

#### **Article 7 - Advice and recommendations**

The advice and recommendations of the IBC shall be taken by consensus, promptly made public and widely disseminated. Any member of the IBC shall have the right to record a dissenting opinion.

#### **Article 8 - Rules of Procedure**

The IBC shall adopt its Rules of Procedure.

#### Article 9 - Secretariat

- 1. The Director-General of UNESCO shall provide the staff and other means required for the operation of the secretariat of the IBC.
- 2. The Director-General shall appoint a member of the Secretariat of UNESCO as Secretary-General of the IBC.

#### **Article 10 - Expenses**

- 1. The servicing expenses of the sessions of the IBC shall be financed by the appropriations allocated for this purpose by the General Conference.
- 2. Member States of UNESCO, Associate Members and non-Member States which have set up a permanent observer mission to UNESCO shall bear the expenses of the participation of their observers at the sessions of the IBC and of their participation in the Intergovernmental Committee.
- 3. UNESCO shall bear the expenses of the participation of specialists in connection with hearings requested by the IBC.

### **Article 11 - Intergovernmental Committee**

- 1. An Intergovernmental Committee, hereafter referred to as 'the Intergovernmental Committee', is hereby established within the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO).
- 2. The Intergovernmental Committee shall examine the advice and recommendations of the IBC, including those concerned with the follow-up of the Universal Declaration. The Intergovernmental Committee shall inform the IBC of its opinions. It shall submit its opinions to the Director-General for transmission, together with the advice and recommendations of the IBC, to the Member States, the Executive Board and the General Conference. It may transmit any proposals for the follow-up of the advice and recommendations of the IBC.
- 3. The Intergovernmental Committee shall be composed of 36 representatives of the Member States of UNESCO elected by the General Conference. Associate Members of UNESCO shall be invited to participate. They shall not have the right to vote. When electing the members of the Intergovernmental Committee, the General Conference shall take into account cultural diversity, balanced geographical representation and the need to ensure appropriate rotation.
- 4. The term of office of members of the Intergovernmental Committee shall extend from the end of the ordinary session of the General Conference during which they are elected until the end of its second subsequent ordinary session.

#### Interim provision

The Executive Board, at its 155th session, as an interim measure, shall elect the first members of the Intergovernmental Committee to hold office until the next succeeding General Conference. When electing these members, the Executive Board shall take into account cultural diversity, balanced geographical representation and the need to ensure appropriate rotation.

- 5. Member States of UNESCO, Associate Members and non-Member States which have set up a permanent observer mission to UNESCO may take part in the meetings of the Intergovernmental Committee. The provisions of Article 4 relating to the IBC shall apply *mutatis mutandis* to the Intergovernmental Committee.
- 6. The sessions of the Intergovernmental Committee shall be convened by the Director-General at least once every two years.
- 7. Where the Intergovernmental Committee or the Director-General so decides, a Joint Session of the IBC and the Intergovernmental Committee, hereafter referred to as 'the Joint Session', shall be convened. The Joint Session shall foster dialogue between the IBC and the Intergovernmental Committee on matters of mutual concern. Without limiting the generality of such matters, they may include consideration of any proposals to:
  - (a) amend the Universal Declaration on the Human Genome and Human Rights; or
  - (b) adopt any further declaration or any other international instrument within the field of competence of the IBC.

The Joint Session shall:

- (a) be chaired by the Chairpersons of the IBC and of the Intergovernmental Committee as joint presiding officers;
- (b) be open to observers *mutatis mutandis* in accordance with Article 4; and
- (c) present a report on the meeting to the Director-General, who shall provide it to the Member States for such action as they may decide before it is presented to the General Conference.

#### **Article 12 - Revision**

These Statutes may be revised by the UNESCO Executive Board.

# **8.5** Preliminary consolidated report to the United Nations on a culture of peace (154 EX/42 and 154 EX/52)

I

### Draft declaration and programme of action on a culture of peace

- 1. <u>Welcomes</u> resolution 52/13 adopted by the United Nations General Assembly whereby a culture of peace is given a central place on its agenda and mainstreamed in the United Nations system;
- 2. <u>Expresses its appreciation</u> of the fact that the year 2000 has been proclaimed the International Year for the Culture of Peace by General Assembly resolution 52/15 and that UNESCO has been designated as the focal point for the International Year by Economic and Social Council resolution 1997/47;
- 3. <u>Notes with satisfaction</u> that the General Assembly has invited the Secretary-General of the United Nations, in co-ordination with the Director-General of UNESCO, to present to it at its fifty-third session a consolidated report containing a draft declaration and programme of action on a culture of peace;
- 4. <u>Further notes</u> document 154 EX/42 containing the preliminary consolidated report to the United Nations on a culture of peace, presented to it by the Director-General at the present session;
- 5. <u>Recognizes</u> that this document could be further enriched by contributions from different entities of the United Nations system;
- 6. <u>Considers</u> that high priority should be given in the preliminary proposals for the Draft Programme and Budget for 2000-2001 (30 C/5) to the activities proposed as part of the programme of action for a culture of peace and those planned for the International Year for the Culture of Peace and <u>requests</u> the Director-General to further develop the conceptual framework for the culture of peace programme based on the Medium-Term Strategy, with clear objectives and corresponding activities, for consideration by it at its 155th session;
- 7. <u>Looks forward</u> to receiving from the Director-General at its 156th session information on decisions taken, if any, at the forthcoming session of the United Nations General Assembly on a draft declaration and programme of action on a culture of peace;
- 8. Requests the Director-General to take into account the views expressed by Members of the Executive Board at the present session as inputs for the consolidated report containing a draft declaration and programme of action on a culture of peace, based on the relevant resolutions of the General Conference and decisions of the Executive Board, to be presented by the United Nations Secretary-General at the fifty-third session of the General Assembly as called for in General Assembly resolution 52/13 of 20 November 1997, and to submit the report to it at its 155th session.

#### **International Year for the Culture of Peace**

The Executive Board,

- 1. <u>Noting with satisfaction</u> the draft programme of action for the International Year for the Culture of Peace contained in document 154 EX/42.
- 2. <u>Requests</u> the Director-General to study the theme of 'recognition of all humanity as one in spirit' as one of UNESCO's contributions to the International Year for the Culture of Peace.

III

#### **Human rights education**

- 1. Recalling that, according to Article I of its Constitution, UNESCO's purpose is to 'contribute to peace and security by promoting collaboration among the nations through education, science and culture in order to further universal respect for justice, for the rule of law and for human rights and fundamental freedoms',
- 2. <u>Recognizing</u> the essential link between human rights and peace,
- 3. <u>Underlining</u> that UNESCO has a vital role to play in the construction of peace in the minds of men by placing education in the service of human rights and by disseminating information about these rights,
- 4. <u>Emphasizing</u> the need, according to 29 C/Resolution 38, 'Towards a culture of peace', to develop a comprehensive system of education and training for peace, human rights and democracy, international understanding and tolerance,
- 5. <u>Stressing</u> the urgency of developing specific programmes and strategies for ensuring the widest human rights education, as stated in the Vienna Declaration and Programme of Action adopted in 1993,
- 6. Referring to the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (1948), to UNESCO's essential role in the United Nations Decade for Human Rights Education (1995-2004), to the World Plan of Action on Education for Human Rights and Democracy (Montreal, 1993), and to the Declaration and Integrated Framework of Action adopted by the 44th International Conference on Education (Geneva, 1994) and subsequently by the General Conference at its 28th session,
- 7. <u>Referring also</u> to resolution 52/127 adopted in 1997 by the General Assembly of the United Nations, which stresses that the effectiveness of existing human rights education and public information activities would be enhanced by better coordination and co-operation at the national, regional and international levels,
- 8. <u>Emphasizing</u> the importance of the UNESCO Regional Conference on Human Rights Education in Europe (Turku, 1997) and its follow-up in other regions,

- 9. <u>Acknowledging</u> the valuable work already undertaken by UNESCO in the field of human rights education and the important role of the Advisory Committee on Education for Peace, Human Rights, Democracy, International Understanding and Tolerance,
- 10. Recognizing the further need for better co-ordination of the above-mentioned existing plans of action in the field of human rights education and also the need for the development and co-ordination of information systems and networks in human rights teaching at various levels,
- 11. <u>Decides</u> to set up a temporary working group among its Members with the task of proposing through the Executive Board to the General Conference at its 30th session an overall strategy for human rights education to be taken into account in the planning of the biennial programmes and of the Medium-Term Strategy of the Organization. The working group shall consist of 12 members, two from each electoral group, and be appointed in consultation with these groups;
- 12. Requests the working group, in close co-operation with the Chairperson of the Advisory Committee on Education for Peace, Human Rights, Democracy, International Understanding and Tolerance, to study the mandate and working methods of the Advisory Committee;
- 13. <u>Further requests</u> the working group to look into the structural problems arising from the fact that human rights education depends, within the Organization, on both the Education Sector and the Social and Human Sciences Sector;
- 14. <u>Invites</u> Member States to make contributions to cover the expenses for the functioning of this working group;
- 15. Requests the working group to present its report to the Board at its 156th session.

# Statutes of the World Commission on the Ethics of Scientific Knowledge and Technology

Article 3, paragraph 3, last line: Replace 2000 by 1999.

The text must therefore read as follows:

3. One half of the members of the Commission shall be replaced every two years. Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph 2 above, when appointing the first members of the Commission, the Director-General shall designate the nine members whose term shall expire on 31 December 1999.
