

Should the process be arranged top-down or bottom-up? (2)

Kuldīga case

(a bottom-up pilot project)

Conclusion: without top-down assistance local communities might be unable to identify ICH and promote its representation in the ICH Inventory

Liepna case

(a pilot project combining bottomup and top-down perspectives)

Presumption: local initiative combined with professional research/management assistance might be an optimal model for drawing up ICH inventories



How to secure community involvement?

- lack of information
- low prestige of the ICH idea in society
- insufficient education in the sphere of ICH at all levels of society involved
- concept of ICH unclear
- lack of institutional, personal and financial resources

What is the relation between national and local inventories? (1)

<u>National</u>: the most vivid and characteristic ICH manifestations that significantly contribute to the formation of national culture as a whole and that are suitable for the international representation of Latvian ICH

<u>Local</u>: ICH manifestations that are disseminated and recognized within confines of a local community and that are regarded as a part of their cultural heritage by a community, a group or (sometimes) separate individuals
