PERIODIC REPORTING FOR WELL PLANNED HERITAGE PRESERVATION

Background

The twenty-ninth General Conference of UNESCO, held in 1997, decided to activate Article 29 of the World Heritage Convention concerning the submission of periodic reports on the state of implementation of the World Heritage Convention (Section I) and the State of Conservation of World Heritage properties (Section II). The national authorities are invited to report on Section I, while Section II shall be prepared for each property inscribed on the World Heritage list by the person(s) directly in charge of the property's management.

The periodic reports prepared by the States Parties will serve a three-fold purpose:

- ❖ to assess the current state of all World Heritage related issues in a State Party,
- * to help focus the Committee's as well as the State Party's future activities and funds,
- * to strengthen sub-regional and regional co-operation between States Parties.

The Periodic Reporting Questionnaire

In 1998, at its twenty-second session, the World Heritage Committee approved *Explanatory Notes*, designed to be read in conjunction with the *Periodic Reporting Format*, in order to outline the information expected to flow from the periodic reporting exercise. To facilitate the preparation of the report, a *Questionnaire* was developed that the States Parties are encouraged to use. It closely follows the subjects referred to in the *Explanatory Notes*, but in contrast to the latter splits the subjects up into short questions to be answered in a few sentences or paragraphs. A second type of question requires the indication of YES or NO by circling or underlining the appropriate answer. All questions are clearly identified with a little number in the right hand column of the *Questionnaire*. To make the reporting results meaningful every one of these questions has to be answered. If no answer is possible, the reasons should be given. If the available space is not sufficient for the answer, the response should be continued on a separate sheet of paper, clearly indicating the number of the question the text refers to (e.g. 006).

Benefits for the States Parties

The *Questionnaire* was developed in such a way as to allow to extract and compile or compare relevant information from different States Parties or properties, facilitating the process of preparing the regional synthesis report to be presented to the World Heritage Committee. The YES / NO questions make it possible to evaluate the reports quantitatively, but only the details that should be supplied in the related 'open question' make the answers meaningful and can be the basis for concerted actions to preserve a State Party's most valuable heritage for its transmission to future generations.

The information collected in this way will help the States Parties to assess their own strengths and weaknesses concerning the implementation of the World Heritage Convention, putting them in a position to (re)define policies and to request assistance in order to finance projects and / or training. On the other hand it allows the World Heritage Committee to collect information needed to devise *Regional Action Plans*, give well-informed advice to States Parties and to focus funds as well as attention on the region(s), States Parties and / or properties that need the collective support of the international community.

The preparation process of the regional periodic report will furthermore enhance regional cooperation through information meetings as well as through the better availability of regularly up-dated information on activities as well as contact addresses etc. The identification of the State Party's strengths makes it possible to exchange experiences and look for solutions to problems (e.g. of site conservation) within the region.

Conclusion

Periodic Reporting is a participatory exercise, aiming to collect information on World Heritage related issues on a national as well as on the property level. The individual State Party reports will be collated into a regional synthesis report to be presented to the World Heritage Committee. This information will enhance cooperation between the Committee and the States Parties and allow to focus funds and activities more efficiently, allowing the States Parties to protect their most valuable heritage more effectively for transmission to future generations.

	The Yakushima World Heritage Area contains Yakusugi trees which are thousands of years old and unique in the world, as well as many plants and animals which are unique to the area and/or endangered. It also contains a wide representation of species in vertical distribution, from species seen on the coastal regions to those only seen in the subalpine region. It therefore is a region containing a unique ecosystem and extraordinary natural scenery.

The national and prefectural governments communicate and coordinate through the Yakushima World Heritage Area Liaison Committee established in September 1995 and implement the legislations.

The measures taken by each administrative body are as follows;

National Government: Ministry of the Environment and Forest Agency collaborate in patrol, monitoring of number of visitors and research on monitoring methods. Ministry of the Environment implement the regulations of Nature Conservation Law, Forestry Agency implement the regulations of the Forest Ecosystem Reserve in accordance with Forest Law and Protected Forest System, and the Agency for Cultural Affairs implement the regulations of the Law on the Protection of Cultural Properties. The Area is strictly conserved. The national government also maintains the mountain trails and shelters.

Kagoshima Prefecture: It assists the Ministry of the Environment and the Agency for the Cultural Affairs in implementing the legal restrictions. It also maintains mountain trails and shelters, and contributes to the strict protection of the Area.

Kamiyaku-cho Town and Yaku-cho Town: They maintain mountain trails, shelters and public lavatories, and contribute to the protection of the Area.

With cooperation of the many interested research organizations, research and monitoring will be implemented to gather basic data on wild animals, plants, water resources and environment, etc. A base facility to support these researches and monitoring activities will also be established. 2. For rare species, there is a concern that even a small sample for research purposes may have a significant impact on their remaining numbers. Therefore, extreme caution will be exercised in handling of these species. 3. The study tracking the shift of the forest structure established in the research areas within the Wilderness Area's vertical distribution zones will continue. Furthermore, there will also be coordination with ecological research that is being conducted on Yakusugi by university research facilities within the Forest Ecosystem Conservation area. Furthermore, coordinating arrangement with the research activities on ecosystems of Yakusugi natural forests in the plots set by research institution such as Universities will be continued. 4. There will be further communication facilitation with the related organizations and the researchers, at the Yakushima World Heritage Conservation Center and the Yakushima Forest Environment Conservation Center. Yakushima's values for which it is nominated are less for its appeal to mass tourism than for its biological, scientific and aesthetic significance. The presence of such a site on a small island is especially valuable particularly as it includes not only the high peaks of the central core but a salient which reaches down 2000m to the seacoast. Because of this phenomenon plus the fact that the nominated area contains the last, best example of an ecosystem dominated by the Japanese cedar in a superb scenic setting, the site meets natural criterion (iii).

Moreover, Yakusima also meets criterion (ii) as it contains a unique remnant of a warm-temperate ancient forest which have been much reduced elsewhere in the region. These forests extend through an altitudinal sequence from broadleaved forest along the coast up through temperate coniferous at middle altitudes to a cold-temperate bamboo grassland at the central peaks. The site is very important for scientific studies on evolutionary biology, biogeography, vegetation succession, interaction of lowland and upland systems, hydrology and warm-temperate ecosystem processes. It is also meets the conditions of integrity for this criterion as a full representation of the different life-zones is included.
