The consultation is in a discussion mode with at least four business sessions.

- I. Inaugural session
- **2.** Business session I which presents the context to the curricula by one of the resource persons associated with the work followed by Q&A session
- **3.** Business session 2 which presents a brief study on the status of journalism education followed by a Q&A session

The participants then break into working groups where they would discuss the adaptability of the curricula and their individual and institutional response with regard to its relevance, importance and adaptability.

The participants will, on a representative basis, present a framework of their current curricula with regard to different levels of the programme - certificate, diploma, bachelors and post graduate level programme.

The groups will take about two to three working sessions to discuss the model curricula in the light of their respective curricula, institutional dynamics and adaptability factors.

After the groups have deliberated a designated member from the working group will present the group's view to the general penultimate business session. The resource persons will respond to these presentations.

The last business session will be "What Next" - where UNESCO representatives will hear and respond to the dynamics of implementation with regard to human resources, text books, equipment, networking, etc. and end with recommendations for adaptation.
