

Communities in action

Welcome to another edition of the Youth Visioning newsletter. This issue highlights three projects where communities get together for a common initiative, whether that be for protecting the environment for the future (Maldives), reviving lost traditions (Tonga) or simply focusing on the present (Jamaica).

Elsewhere, in the **Solomon Islands**, Fred Pateson and the Global Youth Nexus group are organising training workshops for youth in the local communities. Through developing practical skills and work ethics, the project aims to empower young people to expand their future employment opportunities.

In **Papua New Guinea**, Norman Wai and the Foundation for Young People are aiming to sensitise 30 schools in the Western Highlands Province on the dangers of HIV/AIDS. The Provincial Aids Council held a workshop for ten youth leaders, training them on the dissemination of pedagogical materials on school visits and radio

broadcasts. Through information sharing it is hoped that as many of the 14,000 youth in the Province can be sensitized.

In **Grenada**, Samuel Antoine, Quasi Andrew and Clifton Nedd of the Youth Empowerment Foundation are undertaking activities aimed at building the capacity of youth groups to enable them to develop and implement HIV/AIDS projects in response to the National Strategic Plan for HIV/AIDS. A four-day training workshop will be organised and follow-up activities will be monitored to gauge the success of the project.



- Organising a photo exhibition and clean-up campaign centred on the recent event of 'Hurricane Dean';
- Designing posters and planning an AIDS awareness day.

Vanessa Tui'one, Sophie Mackey and the Tongan National Youth Congress successfully organised Tonga's first National Canoe Festival. In a range of activities, the project aimed to boost self-esteem and cultural pride amongst participants and in particular, to provide youth with the opportunity to rediscover the lost art of canoe carving. Importantly, this created a dialogue between youth and elders to facilitate the transfer of skills between generations.

The activities of this project (September 2007 - December 2007) included:

• Coordinating the opening ceremony, national canoe

- parade, official launch of 5 freshly carved canoes along the waterfront;
- Organising carving sessions where five teams of youth from each of the Tongan island groups work together under the tutelage of a master carver to carve a wooden canoe in the traditional style unique to their island
- Organising workshops to teach life skills for carvers such as First Aid and Safety, the historical and cultural significance of the Tongan canoe, environmental considerations, business, leadership and life skills training.

Silma Mohamed and the **NGO Vidhuvaru** are implementing a series of activities on the island of Naifaru, Maldives, to help protect and preserve the existing island environment. There are approximately 4000 inhabitants on the island and the main economic activity is fishing.

The activities of this project (September 2007 - December 2007) includes:

 Raising awareness amongst inhabitants of Naifaru Island about the critical environmental issues that the island is facing and the need to take action to preserve their island home for future generations;

- Organizing a photo exhibition on the recent negative environmental impacts on the island and identifying solutions on how to tackle the problems;
- Conducting a one day workshop with all stakeholders to address the challenges identified during the exhibition, in particular the problem of erosion and methods to prevent it;
- Under the guidance of experts, in line with environmental laws and regulations, the island landuse plan, acquiring and planting coastal vegetation;
- Evaluating the effectiveness of coastal vegetation on reducing erosion.
