Through the Association Djunta Mô Pa Tchada Grande and a number of local partners, **Lourenço Andrade** (left) organised a successful HIV/AIDS awareness campaign in Cape Verde. As

a project had never been done before in their country, the positive feedback from participants has encouraged them to conduct the same activities again in August 2006.

The project took place on the island of Santiago, in the Achada Grande Frente neighborhood. It was implemented in two phases (August 2005 – February 2006) and revolved around soccer and basketball tournaments that were followed by a conference on HIV/AIDS featuring presentations by a doctor and a psychologist.

The activities of this project included:

- Debates
- Quiz competitions
- Dance performances
- Distribution of information at the sport tournaments
- Distribution of information door-to-door

The primary objectives of this project were to hold a soccer and basketball tournament for the youth of the aforementioned neighborhood in order to create a sense of friendship. It also provided a way for the young people to fill their free time while learning about HIV/AIDS. Based on the success of the activities, these objectives have been met and similar activities will be planned in the future.

The focus of **Marvo Didier's** project was to sensitize the village of Gutter about their improper garbage disposal habits and to assist them to play their role in keeping it clean. The project has had an immediate and visual impact in Gutter Village and neighboring communities have expressed an interest in undertaking similar activities.

From the beginning the response from the community and other partners was overwhelmingly positive. Many people acknowledged the need for such a campaign and pledged their support from the start.

The activities of this project (July 2005 – January 2006) included:

- Flyer distribution
- Children's workshop
- Public PowerPoint presentation
- Heavy garbage day
- Clean up of ravine

The best attended activities were by far the children's workshop and the heavy garbage day for the disposal of white goods. The two-day workshop, which still continues to bear fruit, was organized for 8-11 year olds with the aim of assisting young people to make informed decisions about proper garbage disposal. It is strongly recommended that these activities be repeated and funding options are currently being explored. A day for the cleaning of the unsightly ravine was also organized and an 18 cubic yard bin was filled with the refuse collected.

Neighbouring communities have been impressed by what has been done thus far and have requested that the same be done in their own communities. This initiative has been well received and it is an excellent stepping-stone for future projects.

Kennedy Folasi is leading a talented group of youths to dramatize the issues affecting young people in the communities around Honiara, Solomon Islands. Their goal is to promote active participation of youths in their communities and to bring awareness to social issues affecting young people such as substance abuse, sexually transmitted diseases, HIV/AIDS and lack of self-esteem.

The partners in this project include Save the Children Australia (SCA) and their Youth Outreach Program (YOP) with support from the Ministry of Health.

Dream Cast was initially formed in July 2005 after Kennedy Folasi coordinated a drama training project. It targeted unemployed and out of school youths and the

programme was deemed a success for the participants.

Since then, the group has organised sport activities, Karaoke nights, mountain hikes and clean ups around the community.

The next mission of Dream Cast is to use drama performances and radio drama as an advocacy tool in the community around Honiara.

Their activities (March – September 2006) will include among other things, writing drama scripts featuring social issues such as HIV/AIDS and substance abuse. They will also involve young people in performing dramatic presentations for their peers in 35 different communities, and conducting peer-to-peer and youth focus awareness talks.
