Sustainability science and research/action 15.15 - 14.30

Sustainable science seeks to link up science, politics and behaviour. In this regard it promotes research-action, scientific research which is both fundamental and applied: fundamental in its questioning of itself and of its normative narratives; applied, in the projects that it executes, which respond to stakes of environmental change on the ground at the regional and local levels. Research-action also responds to the principle of action which is contextualised by the bottom-up approach and encourages global access to knowledge, as well as the appropriation of what's at stake in environmental change by local communities. This session will aim to present the progress in this new science, as well as to discuss the emerging limits and challenges.




