In a [Letter to Partners](#), Michel Sidibé, the new Executive Director of UNAIDS called for intensified efforts and commitment towards universal access.

“With acceleration, we can enter a new era — where fewer people are becoming infected with HIV than going on treatment. When this happens we will have broken the trajectory of the epidemic,” said Mr. Sidibé.







[The Fourth Wave: Violence, Gender, Culture & HIV in the 21st Century](#)



Developed by UNESCO in close collaboration with a range of partners, they are designed to support ministries of education and other stakeholders at the country-level responsible for developing and implementing policies, determining resource allocations, and implementing programmes for education and HIV & AIDS.

This Information Kit assists and guides school teachers in dealing with challenges related to HIV and AIDS in the school setting, including: countering community resistance to HIV and AIDS education; addressing stigma and discrimination; and reducing risk behaviours. It was originally developed in [English](#) (2.3MB) and has been translated into various languages and adapted for local contexts in [Cambodia](#), 2.7MB; [China](#), 8.7MB; [Kazakhstan](#), 7.4MB; [Nepal](#), 1MB; the [Philippines](#), 6MB and the [Russian Federation](#), 7.5MB (all PDF format).
