UNESCO Activities at the XVII International AIDS Conference

Monday 4 August

At School: Students, Educators and HIV

Poster Discussion, 13:00 – 14:00 Venue: SBR 5 (MOPDD1)

As the co-chair for the session, UNESCO will begin with a brief overview of the critical role of HIVpositive teachers in an effective AIDS response. UNESCO-supported posters presented during the session also include:

- Coordinating, harmonising and aligning the education sector's response to HIV and AIDS: Lessons learned in Jamaica, Kenya, Thailand and Zambia (UNAIDS IATT on Education) (MOPDD103)

Rethinking Structure: Prevention in Challenging Settings

Oral Abstract Session, 14:30 – 16:00 Venue: SR6 (MOAD01)

The session will include a presentation from UNESCO on *Healthy sexuality - using museums as a means for HIV prevention education*. UNESCO Bangkok and the National Science Museum of Thailand, in cooperation with three ministries, namely, Public Health, Education, and Science and Technology, local NGOs, and other organizations, are developing a world-class 1,000 square meter exhibition addressing: gender, adolescents and HIV & AIDS. This presentation will feature a computerized walk-through of the exhibition including interactive video components, puppeteers, and 'live' discussions with HIV+ volunteers, with crosscutting emphasis on gender and communication issues in relationships. Intensifying HIV Prevention: Meeting the challenges of scale, demand and drivers

Satellite Session, 18:00 – 20:00 Venue: SR2 (MOSAT09) UNAIDS Secretariat, World Bank and UNESCO

What does one of the world's biggest HIV prevention programmes look like? Who has achieved universal

access to prevention? How do we get people in the streets demanding their prevention rights? How do we deliver prevention on a massive scale and how do we plan for sustained success? The satellite will have 3 arms: 1) a focused discussion on the model for prevention scale-up; 2) a lively interchange on prevention demand: can we grow prevention activists or are they born that way?; and 3) a state-of-the-art panel on social change communication to address the drivers of the epidemic.

Tuesday 5 August

Education Matters: The role of the sector in promoting universal access to prevention, care and support

Satellite Session, 18:30 – 20:30 Venue: SBR 5 (TUSAT24) UNESCO and UNAIDS Inter-Agency Task Team on Education

This session will examine: The current state of school-based HIV and AIDS education; lessons learned, opportunities and risks of integrating treatment, care and support programmes in schools; and efforts to date and actions required to address the educational, sexual and reproductive health needs of learners with HIV through school-based interventions. The session will also report back on the pre-Conference Summit between Ministers of Health and Ministers of Education from Latin America and the Caribbean to discuss the multi-sectoral response to HIV and AIDS in the region.

Responsible Media Coverage: Culture, Gender and Human Rights in HIV and AIDS Reporting

How can the media better address the challenges of HIV and AIDS? Do the voices of affected communities receive sufficient coverage? Learn, debate and build partnerships at UNESCO's workshop on responsible HIV and AIDS reporting.

UNESCO provided a financial contribution to the Mexico YouthForce for its scholarship programme and technical assistance and capacity-building in media and communications with public relations firm Burson-Marsteller. In addition, UNESCO facilitated a session at the Mexico YouthForce Pre-conference on sex, relationships and HIV education.

UNESCO's Response to HIV and AIDS

UNESCO's distinctive mix of competencies in education, natural science, social and human sciences, culture, and communication and information gives it a unique interdisciplinary, organizational and technical capacity to support the broader effort by UNAIDS to move towards universal access to comprehensive HIV prevention programmes, treatment, care and support.

Within the UNAIDS technical division of labour, UNESCO is designated as the lead organization for HIV prevention for young people in education institutions. UNESCO's work in other areas is also appreciated and acknowledged in the division of labour; UNESCO has been designated as a main partner in eight other technical support areas, such as development, planning, workplace programmes, nutrition support, and displaced populations.

The importance UNESCO attributes to education on HIV and AIDS is reflected in UNESCO's Strategy to Respond to HIV and AIDS. Within this strategy, **EDUCAIDS**, the UNAIDS Global Initiative on Education and HIV & AIDS, led by UNESCO, plays a central role. EDUCAIDS has been designated by UNESCO's Executive Board as one of three core initiatives for the achievement of Education for All, the other two focusing on literacy and teacher education.

The UNAIDS Inter-Agency Task Team (IATT) on Education, convened by UNESCO, is also an important coordination mechanism for moving towards universal access to prevention programmes, treatment, care and support.
