Seminar of African Clubs for UNESCO

Commemoration of the 60th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights

15-16 December 2008, Bamako, Mali

■ Project Background

The UNESCO Club movement was born in 1947 with the creation of the first Club for UNESCO in Japan. Today, the movement is very active in the African region, particularly in the French speaking countries. There are about 1300 Clubs for UNESCO most of which is established by youth and students in schools and universities. The regional coordinating body of these Clubs is the African Confederation of UNESCO Clubs (CACU) established in 1999. The current President of CACU is Mr Désiré Aroga from Cameroon, who is also a Vice-President of the World Federation of UNESCO Clubs, Centres and Associations (WFUCA), a NGO with formal associate relations with UNESCO.

UNESCO's Mid-Term Strategy continues to accord **priority to Africa** and wishes to organize a **2-day Regional seminar of Clubs for UNESCO** in Bamako within the framework of the **60**th **anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights** in December 2008 that addresses Human Rights issues most particularly in the fields of competence of UNESCO, i.e. combating HIV/AIDS, fight against racism and achieving universal education in rural areas. This seminar will then reflect upon how Clubs for UNESCO can assist UNESCO at the grass-roots level.



The UN Secretary-general appealed for a year-long United Nations system-wide campaign to celebrate this anniversary. Its commemoration was launched by UNESCO's Director-General on 10 December 2007, Human Rights Day. The motto of this campaign coordinated by the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights is "Dignity and Justice for All of Us".

This seminar is entitled "Mandela Challenge" with the agreement from the Nelson Mandela Foundation, as a way to pay tribute to Mr Nelson Mandela, the UNESCO Goodwill Ambassador for Human Rights and a symbol of freedom and equality in Africa and worldwide, and promote his ideals at the grass-roots level in Africa.

- Enhanced understanding among UNESCO Club members of President Mandela's vision and UNESCO's initiatives for Human Rights;
- Financing possibilities identified;
- Good practices of different Clubs shared and the network of UNESCO Clubs in the Africa region reinforced:
- Action plan to disseminate the Clubs Movement in the Africa region, especially in the English Speaking countries elaborated.
