There was previously 2 quarries in exploitation outside the limits of the property. They do not affect the integrity or authenticity nor the outstanding universal value of the property. They are located outside of the property boundaries. They have a negative visual effect from some viewing points. A report was sent to the World Heritage Centre and an ICOMOS report. There was previously a military training field. There is active coordination with the Ministry of Defence to prevent damages.

In 2007, the Regional Government declared Atapuerca site as a Cultural Space, a legal category created for those Sites of Cultural Interest -the highest legal protection for cultural siteswhich need preferential measures for its management. Its boundaries are larger than the WH site's. The Management and Use Plan provides condition areas as protection environment also.

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4.2. Protective Measures

4.2.1 - Protective designation (legal, regulatory, contractual, planning, institutional and / or traditional) The property was declared a Site of Cultural Interest (Bien de Interés Cultural) under the provisions of the Spanish Historic Heritage Law of 1985. This imposes strict control over the protected area, requiring official authorization for survey and excavation and for transfer of ownership.

Law of The Regional Government: -Law 12/2002 of 11 July regarding Cultural Heritage in Castilla y León. -Decree 273/1994 of 1 December on competencies and procedures regarding Historical Heritage matters in the Autonomous Community of Castilla y León. - In 2007 Atapuerca was declared as a Cultural Space - In 2009 it was created the system Atapuerca culture's evolution, integrated management system of Atapuerca, whose head is the Museum of human evolution, led by a Manager-Director.

4.3. Management System / Management Plan

4.3.1 - Management System

Ownership of the lands covered by the property is partly public and partly private. Overall supervision of activities within the prescribed area rests with the national Ministry of Education and Culture, located in Madrid. Much of this is delegated to the Council for Education and Culture, Directorate General of Heritage and Cultural Promotion of Castille and León, based in Valladolid, which in turns involves the municipal administrations of Atapuerca and Ibeas de Juarros in the conservation and protection of the sites.

A Management Plan (*Plan Director*), commissioned by the *Junta* (Government of the Autonomous Community) of Castille and León, was completed in April 1993. This detailed plan begins with an analysis of the present situation and goes on to take account of the basic aspects of the protection, conservation, investigation, and presentation of the sites. It is not confined to the cultural sites alone, however, but contains a section detailing measures to protect the ecology of the Sierra de Atapuerca. It was prepared because of the lack of planning provisions relating to the sites in the two municipalities.

Comment

Since 2007 Atapuerca System has a Manager designated by the Regional Government (He is assisted by scientific team of Atapuerca who were already working in the Management Plan and Director Plan of Atapuerca Sites). It also creates a Governing Board (advice on management) and a Scientific Committee (scientific advisory) of Museum of Human Evolution. Since 2013 there is a scientific-Director in the Atapuerca.System. There is a Management Plan for Use and Management of Atapuerca, 2009
