I am Ban Ki-moon, Secretary General of the United Nations.

In a globalized world, more and more of the problems we face can be solved only by governments working together.

But there is one terrible problem that we can address as individuals:

Violence against women.

Millions of men and boys, in many countries, are stopping this violence just by lifting one finger.

When they suspect that they hear the sounds of a woman or girl being abused...

They ring the doorbell and ask an innocent question like, "Can you tell me the time?"

This is a simple step – but a very effective one.

It interrupts what's happening.

It shows that people are watching and listening.

It may give a woman the chance to escape.

It helps to stop the violence.

It's a powerful way for men and boys to make a difference.

The idea began in India. In Hindi, it's called Bell Bajao, which means "Ring the Bell."

Now we want the whole world to join us. Violence against women takes place in all countries and across all cultures.
