#### VI. Transportation

#### 1. From Kansai International Airport (OSAKA) to JR Kyoto Station

#### (1) Arrival

- When arriving in Japan, please take a direct flight into Kansai International Airport (OSAKA).
  - Note: Please note that there are two airports in the Kansai Area; the Kansai International Airport (OSAKA) and the Osaka International Airport (ITAMI). When buying your flight ticket, please buy a ticket bound for Kansai International Airport (OSAKA). If you must change flights at Narita, please arrange to take a domestic flight bound for Kansai International Airport (OSAKA) from Haneda Airport. All entry formalities should be completed at Narita International Airport. An Airport Limousine Bus runs between Narita and Haneda (three buses per hour). The bus fare is 3,000 yen and it takes approximately 75 minutes to get to Haneda Airport (time may vary according to traffic conditions).
- Upon arrival at Kansai International Airport, claim luggage and complete any necessary inspections. The JR Kansai Airport Station is located in the terminal. From there board the JR West Japan line and go to JR Kyoto Station individually.
- The meeting point for this conference is JR Kyoto Station.

#### (2) Kansai International Airport → JR Kyoto Station

For arrivals on an international flight directly into Kansai International Airport (OSAKA):

Participants entering Japan arriving on an international flight directly bound for Kansai International Airport will be arriving at the International Arrivals Lobby on the 1<sup>st</sup> Floor. Please exit through either the North Exit or the South Exit, and use an escalator or elevator to go to the Domestic Departures & Arrivals Lobby on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Floor.

#### For arrivals on a domestic flight into Kansai International Airport (OSAKA):

Participants who will enter into Japan via a different international airport, such as Narita, should board a domestic flight bound for Kansai International Airport (OSAKA). Participants will be arriving at the Domestic Departures & Arrivals Lobby on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Floor.

#### For all participants:

- From the Domestic Departures & Arrivals Lobby on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Floor, go through the concourse to the JR Kansai Airport Station. (The blue counter in the back is where the JR ticket vending machines are.)
- Please board the JR Kansai Airport Express "Haruka" (a direct line connecting Kansai Airport Station and Kyoto Station; all reserved seats) bound for JR Kyoto Station. "Haruka" runs twice an hour.
- There are two kinds of seats (regular seat and Green Car) available on "Haruka." A one-way ticket to Kyoto is 3,490 yen for a regular seat and 4,220 yen by Green Car.
- After buying a one-way ticket to Kyoto, go through the entrance and use the escalator to go down to the platform. Board the assigned train and get off at the last stop, Kyoto Station. It takes approximately 75 minutes from Kansai Airport Station to Kyoto Station.


(Reference) It takes approximately 2 hours (according to traffic conditions, it may take longer) by car from Kansai International Airport to Kyoto Station. The cost is approximately 34,000 yen by taxi.

An information desk for the 22<sup>rd</sup> Session of the World Heritage Committee will be set up on platform 30, the arrival platform of JR Kansai Airport Express "Haruka." There, you will be shown to the bus which will take you to your hotel.

Note: Participants who arrive at a platform other than platform 30 should also please come to "The 22™ Session of the World Heritage Committee" information desk.



#### 3. From Accommodations to Kyoto International Conference Hall

#### (1) Transportation from the hotel to the conference venue

From each hotel, with the exception of Kyoto Takaragaike Prince Hotel, bus transportation will be provided to the conference venue every morning.

#### (2) Transportation from the conference venue to the hotel

We will be giving out a pre-paid subway card which will cover the costs of subway rides between the conference venue and your hotel for you to return to your hotel. Please use this pass to go from Kokusai-kaikan Station on the Karasuma Line to the station closest to your hotel.

#### VII. Information on Japan

#### 1. Visa Requirements

Nationals from some countries are required to obtain a visa to enter into Japan. For further information, please contact the Japanese Embassy in your country.

#### . 2. Formalities after Entering Japan

#### (1) Entry formalities:

At the immigration counter, visitors are requested to produce a valid passport and a Disembarkation Card (should be filled in on the plane, prior to arrival) for examination by the immigration inspector.

#### (2) Customs:

- A visitor carrying goods that have not exceeded the duty-free allowance limit should go to the green inspection counter.
- A visitor carrying goods that have exceeded the duty-free allowance limit should go to the red inspection counter and declare his/her belongings in the following process.

#### **Declaration Process**

- 1) "Declaration of Accompanied Personal Effects and Unaccompanied Articles" form should be presented if any of the following apply to you.
- If you have exceeded the duty-free allowance limit, 1 form is required.
- If you have any firearms, 1 form is required.
- If you have unaccompanied luggage, 2 copies of the form are required.
- 2) "Report of Physical Transportation of Means of Payment" form should be presented if any of the following apply to you.
- If you transport means of payment (cash, Japanese or foreign currency, traveler's checks, promissory notes and securities) exceeding 1,000,000 yen or its equivalent or precious metal (only more than 90% purity for gold) exceeding 1 kg in total weight.

#### Prohibited articles

- Opium, ether narcotic drugs and instruments for opium smoking, and stimulants (including Vicks inhalers
  and Sudafed), psychotropic substances (excluding those designated by an ordinance of the Ministry of
  Health and Welfare).
- Firearms (pistols, rifles, machine guns), ammunition (bullets) and parts of a pistol.

#### 3. Currency

#### (1) Unit of currency: yen (¥)

Types

coins 1, 5, 10, 50, 100, 500

notes 1,000, 5,000, 10,000

#### (2) Money exchange

Foreign currencies can be exchanged for yen at exchange counters in airports, hotels and banks. Bank Hours: Business hours typically are Mon.-Fri., 9:00-15:00.

#### (3) Payment method

Cash is the most typical method of payment.

#### (4) Credit cards

Credit cards can be used at most hotels, department stores and restaurants, as well as at most stores. However, at some small stores, credit cards may not be accepted.

#### (5) Traveler's checks

With the exception of hotels and large department stores, traveler's checks are not accepted at most commercial establishments. For foreign currency-denominated traveler's checks, it will be necessary to cash and convert them to yen at a foreign exchange-capable bank, hotel or department store. Yen-denominated traveler's checks can be cashed at banks, hotels or department stores.

Note: Also, personal checks are not accepted.

#### 4. Postal and Telephone Services

Stamps may be purchased at postal offices or at hotel reception desks. Please post letters from postal offices or from hotel reception desks, as they need to weighed in order to determine the correct postal charge. Postcards that have a stamp affixed may be posted from red mailboxes. Postal offices are closed on Saturdays and Sundays. There is no post office at the conference venue.

#### (2) Telephones:

Phone calls can be made from public telephones. Public telephones are either pink, green or gray. Pink telephones only accept coins, whereas green and gray telephones accept 10 yen coins, 100 yen coins and pre-paid phone cards. Pre-paid phone cards are available from vending machines, hotel shops, kiosks at railway stations, etc. Some public telephones that do not accept pre-paid phone cards. Note that change is not returned for a 100 yen coin, even if the call cost less.

From gray and some green public telephones that indicate "International and Domestic Telephone," international calls can be placed using coins or pre-paid cards. Some telephones will only accept coins when placing an international call. Public telephones which accept credit cards are available in airports and hotels, but they are rare in cities.

#### How to place a call

#### Domestic calls:

- 1) Pick up the telephone and insert the coin or pre-paid card into the appropriate slot on the telephone and dial the number. If the call is within the city limit, the city code can be omitted.
- 2) For long distance calls, insert coin or pre-paid card and dial the number beginning from the city code (city code for Tokyo is 03; Kyoto 075; Nara 0742; and Osaka 06).

#### International calls:

- 1) Direct-dial calls: If placing a call directly, pick up the telephone, and insert a coin or pre-paid phone card and dial an international phone access number+country code+area code+telephone number. International access numbers vary according to phone companies; you can choose from either 001 (KDD), 0041 (ITJ) or 0061 (IDC). (There are rate explanations on some public telephones.) Calls placed from 23:00 until 8:00 are charged at a late-night rate (40% discount).
- 2) Operator-assisted calls: For person-to-person calls or collect calls, dial 0051 (KDD) and you will be connected to an operator.

#### 5. Dining and Shopping

A 5% consumption tax is added to the cost of good and services. There is no custom of tipping in Japan. If the meal cost exceeds 7,500 yen per person, then a 3% special local consumption tax is also levied.

Business hours: Most restaurants and stores are open on Saturdays and Sundays.

Most stores are open from 10:00 - 18:00 while department stores are generally open from 10:00 - 20:00.

#### 6. Usage of Electrical Appliances

Electric current is 60 Hz in Kyoto (the eastern side of Japan is 50 Hz), and the voltage is 100V AC. 2-prong blade type plugs are used.

### VIII. Information on Kyoto

#### 1. General Information about Kyoto

The city of Kyoto is the seat of the capital of Kyoto Prefecture. It is located in the southeastern part of Kyoto Prefecture and experiences cold winters and rather hot summers. Average annual temperature is 15 degrees Celsius (59.4 degrees Fahrenheit). Kyoto receives 1,600 millimeters (63 inches) of rainfall annually. The development of modern industry in Kyoto was slowed in part by its geographical location. The city has no port and has little flat land in its surrounding areas. However, today it comprises part of the Hanshin industrial belt and is home to manufacturing industries, including those producing electrical products, machinery, chemicals and textiles, as well as numerous wholesale and retail businesses. Kyoto has a population of approximately 1,400,000 and covers an area of 610.21 km².

Kyoto (then known as Heiankyo) was the capital of Japan from 794 until 1868, and thus has a deep-rooted connection with the Imperial Family of Japan. The city is home to Kyoto Imperial Palace (the former Imperial Palace), Sento Gosho, Omiya Gosho, Shugaku-in Imperial Villa and Katsura Imperial Villa. Kyoto is a cultural center which, since the Heian Period, has produced representative works in the areas of painting, sculpture, architecture and the industrial arts. Kyoto is home to many shrines, temples and museums, and as of 1 August 1998, Kyoto Prefecture houses 243 national treasures (23% of the national total) and 2,112 important cultural properties (17% of the national total). In addition, Kyoto is a center of education, with 47 universities and junior colleges being located in the area. Kyoto is simultaneously a city of great religious and cultural significance, tourism and education. The older, central part of town boasts a grid-like road system.

The City of Kyoto is currently carrying out various projects aimed at reconciling development of and preservation of the venerable old former capital. These projects include those concerned with the conservation of the beautiful vistas surrounding the city and the development of a favorable residential environment, and the comprehensive development of the traffic system, including highways and subway lines.

Kyoto is a center for the arts of the tea ceremony and flower arranging, as well as being the birthplace of noh, kyogen, kabuki and other traditional performing arts.

October - Jidai Matsuri (The Festival of Eras) (A festival held at the Heian Shrine which includes a procession depicting the changes which occurred throughout the many periods in the history of Japan from the Heian Period until the Meiji Restoration.)

#### 2. Transportation within Kyoto

#### (1) Buses:

It is possible to visit most of Kyoto's sightseeing spots by bus. Due to the many different and complicated routes involved, for foreigners, buses are somewhat difficult to use and it is recommended that you carefully check the bus number and destination prior to boarding. There are six different types of buses operating within Kyoto. The Kyoto Municipal Bus is the most convenient type, as it runs through most of Kyoto City and has approximately 100 routes. Kyoto Bus covers the area from the center of Kyoto to Rakusai, Rakuhoku, Ohara and Hieizan. Keihan Bus runs from Sanjo to Rakunan and Kyoto Kotsu Bus connects Oharano and Kameoka. In response to the needs of foreign visitors in the Kyoto area, municipal buses have announcements and maps in English.

How to use the buses: Wait at the bus stop for a bus traveling the route to your destination. Note that
more than one bus number may share the same bus stop. There is no need to raise your hand for the bus to
stop. A bus ride within Kyoto City costs 220 yen, which you need to pay as you get off the bus.

#### (2) Subway and train:

The railway system is also a useful mode of transportation in Kyoto. The municipal subway, the Karasuma Line, runs from Takada Station in south Kyoto through Kyoto Station and goes to Kokusai-kaikan Station in north Kyoto via Shijo Station. The Tozai Line connects Nijo Station with Daigo, located in Rakunan, via Karasumaoike and Sanjyou-Keihan. The Rakuhoku area is serviced by the Eizan Electric Railways and Keifuku Electric Railway. Eizan Electric Railway connects to Keihan Electric Railway at Demachiyanagi Station and runs through to Yase-yuen Station via Ichijoji Station and Shugaku-in Station. Furthermore, the Kurama Line runs to Kibune-guchi and Kurama from Takaragaike Station.

How to use the trains: Buy a ticket at a vending machine; the fare should correspond to the one printed
next to your destination. If you are unsure of what the cost is, ask at a ticket window. Wait at the platform
for a train that travels the route to your destination. Keep in mind that there are express trains which do
not stop at all stations.

Note: One-Day Pass (for municipal bus and subway) and Free Ticket (for bus only): It is also possible to obtain One-Day Passes or Free Tickets issued by various railway and bus companies.

#### (3) Taxi:

Make sure to pay the full taxi fare that is displayed on the meter next to the driver. Note that if you ride on highways, any additional highway tolls will be added to this amount.

- Fare: small-size taxis charge 640 yen for the first 2 km with a subsequent 80 yen increase for every additional 385 m; mid-size taxis charge 650 yen for the first 2 km with a subsequent 80 yen increase for every additional 339 m.
- How to ride taxis: Taxis can be halted at taxi stands (at hotels, railway stations, etc.) or flagged down on
  the street (a red light in the front window indicates availability). Note that the passenger-side back door
  opens and closes automatically, as it is controlled by the driver.

#### 3. Places of Interest

#### Kyo-oh-gokokuji Temple (Toji Temple) / National Treasure Excursion Course A

History & Features: The temple was built in the Heian Period and the architecture has Chinese and Indian influences. The five-storied pagoda, Goju-no-to, has become a widely recognized symbol of Kyoto.

Admission Hours: 9:00-16:30

Admission Fee: ¥500

Access: Close to Toji-tomon-mae stop on the City Bus Service route (Bus numbers: 18, Toku 18, 71, 207).

5 minute walk from Toji Station on the Kintetsu Kyoto Railway Line.

#### Sanjusangen-do

History & Features: The temple was built by Taira no Kiyomori at the request of Emperor Goshirakawa in 1164. The name comes from the 33 spaces between the pillars. It has a seated Kannon with a thousand arms, Senju Kannon Zasho, which is 3.4 meters tall, and 1,000 smaller statues of the same Kannon standing up, Senju Kannon Risho, making a total of 1,001 statues lined up in a row.

Admission Hours: 9:00-16:00

Admission Fee: ¥600

Access: Close to Hakubutsukan Sanjusangen-do-mae stop on the City Bus Service route

(Bus numbers: 100, 206, 208).

#### Nijo Castle Excursion Course C

History & Features: The Tokugawa Shogunate built the castle in 1603 (Edo Period). The castle is facing Horikawa Road and the castle grounds cover an area of about 275,000 square meters. The entire site represents splendid architectural beauty.

Admission Hours: 8:45-17:00

Admission Fee: ¥600

Access: Close to Nijojo-mae Station on the Tozai Subway Line.

Close to Nijojo-mae stop on the City Bus Service route (Bus numbers: 9, 50).

#### Kamo-mioya Shrine (Shimogamo Shrine) Excursion Course G

History & Features: This shrine dates back to the Asuka Period and is one of the oldest shrines in Kyoto.

Admission Hours: 9:00-16:00

Admission Fee: ¥500

Access: Close to Shimogamo-jinja-mae stop on the City Bus Service route (Bus numbers: 4, 205).

#### Jishoji Temple (Ginkakuji Temple—Silver Pavilion) Excursion Course B

History & Features: This was built in 1482 (Muromachi Period) as a villa by Ashikaga Yoshimasa, and was converted into a temple. It is the epitome of the Higashiyama Culture, and represents *shoin-zukuri* style of residential architecture.

Admission Hours: 8:30-17:00; 9:00-16:30 (1 December - 14 March)

Admission Fee: ¥500

Access: Close to Ginkakuji-mae stop on the City Bus Service route (Bus numbers: Kaisoku 5, Toku 5, Toku 32). Close to Ginkakuji-michi stop on the City Bus Service route (Bus numbers: 5, Toku 5, 17, 32, 203, 204) and on the Kyoto Bus Service route (Bus number: 20).

#### Kiyomizu Temple Excursion Course A

History & Features: This temple was built in 780 (Nara Period). In your approach to the temple, you will see Nioh-mon Gate, Sanju-no-to (a three-storied pagoda), Kaisan-do, Hon-do (the Main Hall) and so forth. The Main Hall, standing on a cliff, has a wooden verandah which projects over the cliff, providing a panoramic view of Kyoto and its surrounding areas.

Admission Hours: 6:00-18:00

Admission Fee: ¥300

Access: 15 minute walk from either Kiyomizu-michi or Gojo-zaka stop on the City Bus Service route

(Bus numbers: 100, 206, Toku 207).

15 minute walk from Higashiyama-gojo stop on the Kyoto Bus Service route (Bus number: 18).

#### Kamowake-ikazuchi Shrine (Kamigamo Shrine) Excursion Course G

History & Features: This shrine dates back to the Asuka Period and is one of the oldest shrines in Kyoto.

Admission Hours: 9:00-18:00

Admission Fee: Free

Access: Close to Kamigamo-jinja-mae stop on the Kyoto Bus Service route (Bus numbers: 32, 35, 36, 37) and the

City Bus Service route (Bus numbers: 37, 54).

#### Sanzen-in

History & Features: Kyaku-den, a reception hall of Sanzen-in's Imperial Abbot, and the adjoining Shinden (Imperial Hall) are two buildings within the temple. There are two gardens, Shuheki-en and Yusei-en. The roof of the Main Hall (Hon-do), called the Ojo Gokuraku-in (the Temple of Rebirth in Paradise) is constructed of wood of the persimmon tree. This hall enshrines the statue of Amida Sanzo Zasho.

Admission Hours: 8:30-16:30; 8:30-16:00 (1 December - 28 February)

Admission Fee: ¥550

Access: 10 minute walk from Ohara stop on the Kyoto Bus Service route (Bus numbers: 17, 18) and the City Bus Service route (Bus number: Kita 6).

Rokuonji Temple (Kinkakuji Temple—Golden Pavilion) Excursion Course D

History & Features: This was built in 1397 (Muromachi Period) as a villa by Ashikaga Yoshimitsu, and was converted into a temple. With Mt. Daimonji in the background, the temple grounds consists of gardens incorporating the refined and artistic life of the shogun. Beyond the central pond, Kyoko Pond, rises the Golden Pavilion, a gilded three-storied hall. The elegant, harmonious building incorporates three styles of architecture. The first floor is *Shinden-zukuri*, the palace style. The second floor is *Buke-zukuri*, the style of the *samurai* house. The third floor is *Karayo* style or *Zen* temple style. Both the second and third floors are covered with gold-leaf on Japanese lacquer, which reflects the brilliant sunlight.

Admission Hours: 9:00-17:00

Admission Fee: ¥400

Access: Close to Kinkakuji-michi or Kinkakuji-mae stop on the City Bus Service route

(Bus numbers: 52, 59, 205, Toku 205).

#### Ryoanji Temple Excursion Course D

History & Features: The temple was founded in 1450 (Muromachi Period). The temple is well-known for its rock garden, Sekitei, in which 15 rocks of various sizes are arranged on white sand.

Admission Hours: 8:00-17:00; 8:30-16:30 (1 December - 8 February)

Admission Fee: ¥400

Access: Close to Ryoanji-mae stop on the City Bus Service route (Bus number: 59).

#### **Arashiyama**

Points of Interest: The area around Ooikawa (Katsuragawa), Togetsukyo and Nakanoshima is called Arashiyama.

The main area of Arashiyama and Sagano is famous for its cherry blossoms in the spring and vibrant autumn foliage in the fall.

Access: Close to Arashiyama Station on the Keifuku Arashiyama Line.

Close to Arashiyama-mae stop on the City Bus Service route (Bus number: 28) and on the Kyoto Bus Service route (Bus numbers: 71, 72, 73, 80, 87).

#### Tenryuji Temple Excursion Course F

History & Features: In 1339 (Muromachi Period), Ashikaga Takauji requested the erection of the Gozanzenshu Buddhist temple.

Admission Hours: 8:30-17:30; 8:30-17:00 (December - March)

Admission Fee: Free

Access: Close to Arashiyama Station of the Keifuku Arashiyama Railway Line.

Close to Keifuku Arashiyama-eki-mae stop on the City Bus Service route (Bus number: 28) and the Kyoto Bus Service route (Bus numbers: 71, 72, 73, 80, 87).

#### **Heian Shrine**

History & Features: The shrine was built in 1895 (28th year of the Meiji Period) to commemorate the 1,100 year anniversary of the foundation of Kyoto. The shrine and its grounds are a reproduction of the Emperor's Palace of ancient Japan. The gaily painted vermilion shrine, and the geometrically concise layout of the site provides us with an image of the refined style of the Heian Period.

Admission Hours: 8:30-17:30; 8:30-17:00 (1 March - 14 March, September and October);

8:30-16:30 (November - February)

Admission Fee: Free entry into the park. Entry into the shrine itself is ¥600.

Access: 3 minutes from Kyotokaikan-Bijutsukan-mae stop on the City Bus Service route

(Bus numbers: 5, 27, 32, 46).

#### Toei Uzumasa Eigamura Movie Museum

Points of Interest: This is a movie theme park which has a replica of a typical Edo-style town. The theme park covers an area of about 36,000 square meters in which an open set for historical movies has been constructed. You can experience many different aspects of filming at this park.

Admission Hours: 9:00-17:00; 9:30-16:00 (December-February); Closed on New Year's Eve and New Year's Day.

Admission Fee: ¥2,200

Access: 5 minute walk from Uzumasa Station on the Keifuku Arashiyama Railway Line.

#### **Kyoto National Museum**

Points of Interest: Continuously since its founding, the museum has exhibited and preserved a range of cultural assets centering on the thousand years of the former capital of Kyoto, and it also supports research activities. There are various types of exhibition rooms for antiquities, porcelain and pottery, sculpture, painting, calligraphy, dyeing and weaving, lacquerwork, and metalwork. The exhibitions are changed every one to three months. In this way, superb articles which are national treasures or important cultural assets are assembled, and are systematically exhibited and explained in each room so that anyone can develop a familiarity with these cultural assets.

Admission Hours: 9:00-16:30 (admission until 16:30); Closed on Mondays (the Museum is open when Monday is a national holiday, then closed the next day) and also closed between 26 December to 3 January.

Admission Fee: ¥400

Access: Close to Higashiyama-Shichijo stop on the City Bus Service route (Bus numbers: 206, 207, Toku 207, 208). Close to Shichijo Station on the Keihan Electric Railway Ohtoh Line.

#### The Kyoto City Archaeological Museum

Points of Interest: The Archaeological Museum was opened in November 1979 in order to make widely accessible to the citizenry the important archaeological remains of each Period, which had been discovered in excavation projects. A particularly unique experience is provided by a section where you are actually able to touch Jomon earthenware, unglazed ceramic vessels, roof tiles, etc. Thus, the archaeological relics are not simply viewed through a glass window, but can be experienced through a combination of senses.

Admission Hours: 9:00-17:00 (admission until 16:30); Closed on Mondays (the Museum is open when Monday is a national holiday, then closed the next day) and also closed between 26 December to 3 January.

Admission Fee: Free

Access: Close to Imadegawa-Omiya stop on the City Bus Service route (Bus numbers: 51, Toku 51, 59, 201, 203.)

#### **Kyoto City Library of Historical Documents**

Points of Interest: Located on the east side of Kyoto Imperial Palace in a verdant, tranquil spot, opened in 1982.

Planned exhibitions and theme exhibitions are held throughout the year so that you can get a concrete feel for the many changes Kyoto has undergone in its long history, through the historical materials.

Admission Hours: 9:00-17:00; Closed Mondays, national holidays, and New Year's holiday (28 December - 3 January) Admission Fee: Free

Access: Close to Marutamachi Station on the Keihan Electric Railway Ohtoh Line.

Close to Kawaramachi-Marutamachi stop on the City Bus Service route (Bus numbers: 1, 3, 4, 10, 14, 17, Toku 17, 24, 37, 54, 59, Toku 59).

#### The National Museum of Modern Art, Kyoto

Points of Interest: The National Museum of Modern Art was started as the branch of the National Museum of Modern Art, Tokyo on 27 April 1963. In June of 1967, the museum became the independent National Museum of Modern Art, Kyoto, as it remains today. The museum has focused on craft works, but at the same time, striving to be a complete modern fine art museum has made it possible for the National Museum of Art, Kyoto to offer features not found at other museums.

Admission Hours: 9:30-17:00; Closed Mondays (the museum is open when Monday is a national holiday, and then closed the next day) and also closed between December 28 to January 4.

Admission Fee: ¥400

Access: Close to Kyotokaikan-Bijutsukan-mae stop on the City Bus Service route

(Bus numbers: 5, Toku 5, 27, 32, 46).

#### **Kyoto Municipal Museum of Art**

Points of Interest: This museum has a 60-year history, and has become a place where fine art can be appreciated. New works are made known to the public and the museum features an outstanding collection of modern Japanese art focusing on works from Kyoto artists since the Meiji Era (1868-1912).

Admission Hours: 9:00-17:00 (admission until 16:30); Closed Mondays (the museum is open when Monday is a national holiday) and New Year's holiday (28 December - 4 January).

Admission Fee: Price depends on the exhibition.

Access: Close to Kyotokaikan-Bijutsukan-mae stop on the City Bus Service route

(Bus numbers: 5, Toku 5, 27, 32, 46).

#### Gion/Shijo-kawaramachi Districts

Gion: Gion represents one of Kyoto's most interesting and flourishing districts. It takes its name from the Gion Shrine, which was the old name for Yasaka Shrine. On the south side of Shijo-hanami-koji and around Shirakawa-shinbashi on the Shirakawa River side, old teahouses line the street. The lattice doors and the bamboo blinds seem to blend in with the flow of the river, and the scene evokes such a serene and tranquil feeling—such is the atmosphere of Kyoto. You will also find many high-class restaurants in the area.

Shijo-Kawaramachi: This is one of Kyoto's most vibrant districts. It boasts modern boutiques and is a lively shopping area. This area is full of fashion shops and restaurants, and the variety of restaurants and prices are extensive.

Access: Close to Shijo-Kawaramachi stop on the City Bus Service route (Bus numbers: 4, 5, Toku 5, Rin 5, 14, Toku 17, 42, 205).

Close to Gion stop on the City Bus Service route (Bus numbers: 100, 206, Toku 207).

Close to Shijo Station on the Karasama Subway Line.

Close to Kawaramachi Station on the Hankyu Electric Railway Ohtoh Line.

- \* There are many other museums and art galleries not mentioned above. There are also sites of interest which need prior application and approval for admission which are thus not included above.

#### 4. Souvenir Guide

Kiyomizu-yaki ceramics: Porcelain produced in Kyoto is known as Kyo-yaki and Kiyomizu-yaki is the name given to ceramics produced in the Kiyomizu and Gojo area. It is colorful and elegant, characterized by the simple designs of bamboo, maple and other natural illustrations. Many wares such as vases and dishes, covering a wide price range, are produced.

Japanese confections: Wagashi is the name given to traditional Japanese confections. Among the defining characteristics of wagashi are their distinctive ingredients. The principal ingredient is an, a sweet paste made of red azuki beans, white bush beans, sugar and water, which was first developed in the Kamakura Period. Wheat flour and rice flour are also used, but dairy products and vegetable oils are not. Instead, ingredients such as walnuts, peanuts and sesame provide oil. Artificial flavoring is not added, and even natural flavorings with strong aromas are avoided. Another characteristic is the way seasonal change is incorporated in the shapes and colors of wagashi, as well as in the names chosen for each variety. Since wagashi contain no preservatives, it is important that they are eaten within one to two days from the time they are prepared.

Sake (Japanese rice wine): Japanese wine is made of rice and is brewed in a unique Japanese style. Brewing centers are located where there is good water and good rice, and in Kyoto, the Fushimi area is most distinguished for brewing sake.

Nishijin-ori: Woven silk textiles that originate in the Nishijin district of Kyoto City are called Nishijin-ori. The unique patterns are especially attractive and they are all hand woven by artisans.

Japanese tea: *Ujicha* is an especially delicious kind of tea produced in the Uji district of Kyoto. Since the Muromachi Period it has been used in tea ceremonies. There are many types, which sell for a range of prices.

Folding fans: Ogi are folding fans used to cool oneself off in hot weather, but are also used as part of etiquette and as props in certain dances. Different from Chinese fans, ogi were invented in Japan in the early Heian Period. Their distinguishing characteristic is the use of strips of bamboo or other wood as a frame, using the base of the frame as a pivot and affixing paper to the arranged strips. The fan is opened and closed by folding and unfolding. Types and prices of ogi are numerous and varied.

#### 5. Cuisine

Kyoto, like other cities in Japan, offers an abundance of Chinese, Korean, French, Italian and other non-Japanese restaurants. As for Japanese food, Kyoto boasts numerous establishments, from restaurants which provide traditional Japanese cuisine (honzen ryori, chakaiseki ryori and kaiseki ryori) to simple eateries, so you will be able to find something that fits your budget. Sushi, tempura, sukiyaki, shabu-shabu (thin-sliced beef and vegetables boiled in soup stock then dipped in sauces and spices), yakitori and oden are typical examples.


Kyoto is famous for two types of local cuisine: shojin-ryori and tofu-ryori.

Shojin-ryori developed among the samurai and Buddhist monks (especially the Zen monastery) during the Kamakura Period and later spread to ordinary citizens. It is served without any meat or fish products, but instead draws out the intrinsic flavors of various vegetables, grains and seaweed. Oil is drawn from sesame, beans and vegetables. Shojin-ryori came to be eaten at Buddhist rituals as well as at everyday meals. However, you will not find it at an ordinary restaurant.

Try some *yudofu* and savor the simple taste of tofu. This is made by boiling tofu and vegetables in seaweed soup stock. It makes a delicious meal in Kyoto, where the water is really clean. There are also many other tofu dishes to sample at tofu specialty restaurants located all around Kyoto, and these have become quite popular since tofu is highly nutritious and suitable for people who are dieting.


## Map of Kyoto




## Kyoto International Conference Hall 1st Floor
