#### **Executive Summary**

**Disclaimer:** The objective of the Executive Summary is to highlight salient issues and not to provide a comprehensive coverage of all topics discussed in the report.

#### **Media and Major Events**

June was an exceptional month for UNESCO in terms of press coverage, with several major events attracting press attention, including the presentation of the Félix Houphouët-Boigny Peace Prize to French President Francois Hollande; the Memory of the World meeting in South Korea, and the addition of over 50 new items to the Memory of the World Register; the Chengdu international conference on Intangible Cultural Heritage and the annual meeting of the World Heritage Committee in Phnom Penh.


These events generated headline news in top tier media in all regions, with over 23,000 articles monitored in leading international and national media outlets (over 88,100 sources).




#### **UNESCO Website and Social Media Channels**

Usually web traffic drops during the summer period, and this trend is confirmed by the last two years figures. This month, the web traffic peaked not surprisingly on 25 June with almost 140K visits to the World Heritage Centre website, and especially to the new inscribed properties on the World Heritage List. As every year, the World Heritage Committee meeting represents a source of web traffic to the unesco.org website.

On our specialized web sites: on "unesco.int" visits are steadily increasing (+13% from last month); visits to "Unescommunity" increased this month by 18%, pages views by 33% with a particular interest for the "message from the Director-General" referring to ISAU's message.




Social media channels buzzed all throughout June. World Heritage-related news generated exceptional enthusiasm on all platforms. Social media's special contribution to this Session was the production of an infographic on Rhinos (visual.ly/last-rhinos-find-refugeworld-heritage-sites), designed and translated entirely by UN Volunteers. June also saw the release of our Pinterest channel. A valuable addition to our communciations toolkit, Pinterest is uniquely positioned as a visual catalogue of our varied activities; each image helps audiences instantly identify and understand what we do, and our impact. As social media becomes increasingly visual, people are relying more on images to filter the information they want to learn about. It has proven helpful in our communications on for initiatives such as the "1% for Creativity" (Intl Fund for Cultural Diversity) & a live tweet from UN HQ featuring the Director-General on "The Power of Culture & Education in a New Age of Limits"



#### **UNESCO Publications**


Online viewing of UNESCO top ten publications has dropped compared to April (-18%) and May (-15%) this year, and June of 2012 (-6%). In spite of this, viewing of Portuguese publications in the top ten has risen by 68%. The EFA Global Monitoring Report and the World Water Development Report 4 continue to feature in the top 10 as does the General History of Africa in Portuguese (first 2 volumes). For the second month running a special mention should go the top place which is the SHS publication *Philosophy: a School of Freedom*. This month there are no figures for UNESCO Publications on Google Books due to a technical problem with their site. Bookshop sales were again heavily dominated by titles largely from the Culture Sector on World Heritage (coinciding with the World Heritage Committee). The heavily promoted title Journeys to School in French and English continues to sell well on-line.



#### **UNESCO** Visits

The number of visitors received this month declined by almost 50%, while since January 2013 every month more than 1,100 visitors had been offered a tour of the Organization.

The absence of the only staff guide for two weeks significantly impacted the amount of visits offered to the public. In addition, June being an exam period for students (70% on average of the visits) the number of requests for visits were reduced.



#### Major events:

#### I. Félix Houphouët-Boigny Peace Prize Award Ceremony (05 June 2013)

The Félix Houphouët-Boigny Peace Prize has been awarded to Mr François Hollande, President of the French Republic on 5 June 2013 at UNESCO Headquarters, in recognition of his contribution to peace and stability in Africa. The Ceremony took place at UNESCO Headquarters on 5 June 2013.

Several presidents of West Africa and countries of the Sahel region attended the ceremony: Thomas Boni Yayi of Benin; Blaise Compaoré of Burkina Faso; Alassane Ouattara of Côte d'Ivoire; Dioncounda Traoré of Mali (interim); Mohamed Ould Abdel Aziz of Mauritania; Idriss Déby Itno of Chad; Ali Bongo Ondiba of Gabon and Macky Sall of Senegal. Niger was represented by its Prime Minister, Brigi Rafini. Several representatives of the French Government were present as well.

President Hollande was presented with a peace diploma, a gold medal, and \$150,000. He will donate the money to two charities – one to support women in Africa and one to assist war veterans. In his acceptance speech, he underscored the urgency of the French intervention in Mali, and praised the strength of UNESCO's work.

The ceremony was webcast live on UNESCO website and Africa 24 who used our images.

According to the implementation procedures of the Prize, after the ceremony, the Prize website has been updated. A booklet and a DVD are under preparation and will be distributed to the Heads of State present at the event.

The Félix Houphouët-Boigny Prize - created in 1989 and awarded annually by UNESCO - is intended to honor living individuals, institutions or organizations that have made a significant contribution to promoting, seeking, safeguarding or maintaining peace, in conformity with the Charter of the United Nations and the Constitution of UNESCO.

Former laureates of the Prize include Nelson Mandela, Frederik De Klerk, Yitzhak Rabin, Shimon Pérès, Yasser Arafat; former US President Jimmy Carter, former Finnish President Martti Ahtisaari, and former Brazilian President of Brazil Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva.

**Website statistics:** On dedicated website: 354 visits / 1,452 page views; Press release: 427 visits / 1,082 page views; Web releases: 04/06/2013: 1,340 visits / 3,256 page views, 05/06/2013: 775 visits / 2,195 page views.

**Press coverage:** Working in close collaboration with the Elysée Palace, the Media Relations team accredited 180 journalists for the prize ceremony (52 accompanied visiting Heads of State). A satellite feed of the ceremony was offered to television stations and news agencies around the world. Media interest in the event was significant, with some 589 articles about or referencing the Prize monitored throughout the month. Most of these stories were published by French and African media, however the story was also reported in media in all other regions as well.

**Social media:** Interest for this award generated medium interest on our social media channels. Interest was highest on the French language channels, because of President Hollande's fame and influence in the French-speaking world. 2 feature stories were written for social media/web to explain why Mr Hollande's actions in Mali are important from UNESCO's perspective. The articles were promoted on all social media channels, including Facebook where they averaged 190 likes each: <a href="Pre-event">Pre-event</a> / <a href="Post-event">Post-event</a>.

The event received live coverage on Twitter in English and French. Messaging focused on advocacy for protecting culture in times of war. The share rate was lukewarm, between 5 to 20 RTs.

#### II. Awards Ceremony: Fly Your Ideas with Airbus (14 June 2013)

To stimulate interest in engineering among youth, UNESCO partnered with Airbus on the Fly Your Ideas (FYI) competition. Five finalist teams were selected for a week long introduction to Airbus and a presentation of their projects in front of a panel of five judges comprised of members from UNESCO and Airbus. The winners of the competition were announced at the Awards Ceremony which was the culmination of weeks events, at UNESCO HQ on 14 June 2013.

The Awards Ceremony was opened by ADG/SC, Gretchen Kalonji, who welcomed the guests and Airbus and complimented the 5 finalist teams on the high standard of competition. Charles Champion, Executive Vice President



Engineering at Airbus and Fly Your Ideas Patron, thereafter introduced the FYI competition and the collaboration with UNESCO. Lidia Brito, DIR/SC/PCB, described her involvement in the competition and what a great opportunity but also a difficult choice the jury had to make to decide on the final winner.

The Fly Your Ideas Competition aimed to stimulate the youth to create solutions for the future of aviation. The students are encouraged to come up with imaginative and original ideas that could be implemented in the near future. This exciting competition challenged students across the globe to develop ideas for a greener aviation industry.

Through this competition, Airbus offers students an insight into the world of aviation. It is one means to boost their interest in the industry. UNESCO is supporting Airbus' Fly Your Ideas challenge, designed to inspire a new generation of engineers as there are not enough aviation engineers currently graduating to meet industry needs and nearly half of them switch to other careers once they qualify.



This third edition of the competition saw over 600 teams from around the world submit a proposal responding to one of six challenges set out by Airbus for aviation in the 21st century. Over 60 Airbus assessors evaluated the submissions for quality, environmental benefits, and for the level of innovation demonstrated by the team. The jury was composed of 5 members from UNESCO and Airbus.

The five finalist teams were selected by Airbus from a global pool of creative, engineering and design talent - this year's challenge inspired over 6,000 students from 82 countries to register with 618 teams submitting a proposal.

A team of students from the University of São Paulo in Brazil claimed the top prize of €30,000 as winners of Airbus Fly Your Ideas 2013. Team Levar won with their proposal for a luggage loading and unloading system for airplane cargo compartments to reduce the workload of airport baggage handlers with an air cushion solution inspired by air hockey tables.

**Press coverage:** A press release announcing the Brazilian winners of the Airbus/UNESCO Fly Your Ideas competition was given wide coverage throughout Latin, Central and North America. Most articles appeared in industry and financial news outlets, such as Yahoo Finance, and were based almost entirely on the press release.

In addition to the journalists invited by UNESCO, Airbus had paid for journalists to attend from India, Italy, Brazil, Australia and Malaysia.

**Social media:** Low response to all posts (3 tweets and 1 Facebook post), probably because our audience generally does not associate us with science

Airbus did not share UNESCO content through social media, despite requests made to their communications representative. This should be corrected in the future edition.

#### III. Chengdu International Conference on Intangible Cultural Heritage (14-16 June 2013)

The Chengdu International Conference on Intangible Cultural Heritage was held from 14 to 16 June 2013, in Chengdu, China. Dedicated to the theme, 'The Intangible Cultural Heritage Convention: its first decade', the conference marked the high point of our year-long celebrations of the Convention's tenth anniversary. The Director-General provided video greetings for the Conference and appeared in person to open the Fourth Chengdu International Festival of Intangible Cultural Heritage on 15 June.



More than 300 experts came together for debates on the achievements and challenges of the first decade of the Convention and on its opportunities and

perspectives for coming decades. The conference was enriched by the participation of a number of persons who had played key roles at the time the Convention was drafted at the turn of the 21st century. The conference arranged for discussions focussing on subjects such as 'Achievements of the Convention: changing the discourse of ICH and implanting new concepts', 'Inventorying and listing', Parallel universes: intellectual property, world heritage and cultural goods and services' and 'Open questions and future directions'.

The Chengdu Recommendations adopted in the Conference's final session called upon the international community to renew its commitment to the Convention's fundamental premise that intangible cultural heritage is a guarantee of sustainable development and a powerful force for fostering creativity, dialogue and mutual respect, and to acknowledge the role of intangible cultural heritage in the future framing of the post-2015 agenda for sustainable development.

Participants: More than 300 experts

**Public:** One-third of the 300 experts were from China and the remainder from more than fifty countries. The opening ceremony on 14 June was attended by high level Chinese leaders such as H. E. Ms Zhao Shaouhua, Vice-Minister of Culture, H. E. Mr Hao Ping, Vice-Minister of Education and Chairperson of the Chinese National Commission for UNESCO, H.E. Mr Ge Honglin, Mayor of Chengdu Municipal Government.

**Press coverage:** The Chengdu conference received exhaustive and very positive coverage throughout China, but was not picked up by media elsewhere.

**Social media:** No specific coverage of the event per se, as the event was not open to the general public. This said, social media channels regularly cover intangible heritage, by posting for example links to videos of existing listings.

#### IV. 37th Session of the World Heritage Committee (17-27 June 2013)

The 37th session of the World Heritage Committee was held in Phnom Penh, Cambodia from 16 to 27 June. During the session the Committee reviewed 141 state of conservation reports (concerning 169 sites) for sites already inscribed on the World Heritage List, and added 19 new sites to the List (14 cultural and 5 natural). Three extensions were added to existing sites. Seven sites were added to the List of World Heritage in Danger, and one was removed. The World Heritage List now numbers 981 properties: 759 cultural, 193 natural and 29 mixed, in 160 States Parties. Qatar and Fiji had sites inscribed on the List for the first time, as did Lesotho, whose first World Heritage site was inscribed as an extension to uKhahlamba Drakensberg Park in South Africa.

This was the second session to be live webstreamed via the World Heritage Centre website, with all Committee documents available to the public.

There was also extra media attention during the session due to the return to Cambodia of two 10th century Khmer Pandava statues by the Metropolitan Museum of New York on 11 June. This was marked during the opening ceremony with comments by the DG.

**Participants:** 4,977 badges were distributed in total, including 1,425 website registration and 191 international journalists attending the Committee.

**Webcast/Live streaming connections:** High and low resolution transmissions were made available in English and French, as well as audio transmission with no interpretation. Since 16 June the webcast received 20,195 visits in 143 countries. 33% came from Japan. Most visits happened during the inscriptions on 22 and 23 June 2013.

**Website statistics:** On World Heritage website: 1,045,525 visits / 3,725,993 page views with double the usual number of visits during the inscriptions of new sites between 22 and 24 June (on average: 46,923 visits / 201,582 page views/day). On dedicated webpage: 20,622 visits / 77,307 page views with a peak on 22 June (6,465 visits / 14,575 page views). Media advisory: 1,146 visits / 3,685 page views.

**Press coverage:** The World Heritage Committee meeting is the biggest media event on UNESCO's annual calendar, and this year was no exception. The press service, which sent two colleagues to Phnom Penh for the meeting, wrote media advisories announcing the event and press releases on all of the changes to the world heritage List and the world heritage list in danger. Two press conferences and several media briefings were also organized, and information provided to several hundred journalists, covering the event from a distance.

Over 34,000 stories on the meeting were monitored in the media worldwide in June. Coverage peaked during the week when the decisions were made concerning danger listings, state of conservation reports and new sites. The lion's share of these stories was published in media based in North America (mainly international agencies). Debate over the Great Barrier Reef, the inscription of East Rennel Island (Solomons) as heritage in danger, and the addition of Levuka (Fiji) on the List, resulted in extraordinary coverage in Australia/Oceania. In Australia, where the status and health of the Reef has become a major political issue – dividing Federal and State governments - the decision to defer danger listing was greeted mainly with relief on all sides. The inscription of Syrian sites on the list in danger also received major coverage in all regions, as did the inscription of the new sites of Mt Fuji (Japan) and Mt Etna (Italy). The only story that really drew any negative press concerned the Committee's decision on Jerusalem, which sparked some reactionary, anti-UNESCO stories in extreme right-wing media in the U.S. Surprisingly, the story did not go much farther than that.

**Social media:** This session generated easily the year's top performing social media content, with many posts in the month's top 10 tweets and Facebook posts. Top posts included photo galleries of the new site inscriptions, and feature stories that provide a deeper understanding of our WH program's work, such as the restitution of Khmer Statues by the NY Met & the restoration of Vietnam's My Son Sanctuary. Social media's special contribution was the production of an infographic on Rhinos, designed and translated entirely by UN Volunteers. It was also published as a poster in the print version of the number 67 of the World Heritage magazine, dedicated to Best Practices for World Heritage Management. Yet the potential could have been multiplied if all nominated sites were obliged, prior to inscription, to promote UNESCO's posts through the social media/web channels of the sites, the local & national governments, and also national cultural agencies. This expectation should be included in the future. Most World Heritage Sites do not mention UNESCO, or promote the values of scientific conservation or shared heritage, in their social media sites. They can help us considerably in reinforcing this message.

### V. 11th Meeting of the International Advisory Committee for the Memory of the World Programme (18-21 June 2013)

The 11th International Advisory Committee meeting of the Memory of the World Programme took place in Gwangju Metropolitan City, Republic of Korea from 18 to 21 June 2013. The IAC meeting began with an orientation session for the new members of the IAC which was organized by the Secretariat.

During its deliberations in the closed session, 55 new items were recommended to the Director-General for inscription on the MoW international register and another item has been provisionally recommended. This is an overall record for the number of inscriptions recommended for inscription at any one session and attests to the efficacy of the training workshops that have been organized by the secretariat during missions and by those funded by Korea.

UNESCO presented a report on the achievements of MoW during the past 2 years especially related to the commemoration of the 20th anniversary. All IAC members received a copy of the book and commended the secretariat for its work in this domain. Congratulations were also extended to Luciana Duranti and Jonas Palm for their hard work as Programme Chairs in the organization of the Vancouver Conference.

The IAC was presented with the Action Plan approved by the Executive Board and asked to indicate those areas which should receive the highest priority in the light of the current financial situation of UNESCO. It further discussed promotion and development of the Programme and agreed to the creation of a new Subcommittee on Education and Research.

**Press coverage:** The 2013 inscriptions on the Memory of the World register received very good coverage, with over 1,000 articles monitored in the days following addition of the new items. Coverage was especially dense in Latin America, where press reported exhaustively on the addition of Che Guevara's writings. Indeed this particular item was the top story in almost all regions.

Media were informed about the inscriptions via a media advisory ahead of the Memory of the World meeting, and then via a press release detailing the 54 items added to the Register. Coverage was undoubtedly boosted by the rich website prepared for the event, which provided detailed descriptions and photos of the new items and was easily consultable.

**Social media:** This event suffered on social media because of World Heritage content which was being posted at the same time. 6 tweets were published, with 50 more scheduled to be published throughout summer. As is usual with Memory of the World tweets, the RT rate is low (averaging 10 per message) but the click rate is higher than average (usually 30 page views per tweet). 2 Facebook posts: 134 and 252 likes.


Both a communication and a knowledge management tool, UNESCO's websites, with over 2.7 million pages of content, are today a key component of its public information strategy. Maintained by Corporate Web Services in close collaboration with the Programme Sectors, the main site is updated continually in all 6 UN languages (with some subportals also in Portuguese, Vietnamese, et al).

Web traffic shown here (page views, visits, visitors, country and language of visit, etc) has been measured since September 2011 with the free Google Analytics toolset via tags embedded in pages. 








This graph shows the number of articles monitored in national and international media, in which "UNESCO" appeared in the title or first paragraph of a story in June (Source: Meltwater News)

June was an exceptional month for UNESCO in terms of press coverage, with several major events attracting press attention, including the presentation of the Félix Houphouët-Boigny Peace Prize to French President Francois Hollande; the Memory of the World meeting in South Korea, and the addition of over 50 new items to the Memory of the World Register; the Chengdu international conference on Intangible Cultural Heritage and the annual meeting of the World Heritage Committee in Phnom Penh.

These events generated headline news in top tier media in all regions, with over 23,000 articles monitored in leading international and national media outlets (over 88,100 sources).



A valuable addition to our communciations toolkit, Pinterest is uniquely positioned as a visual catalogue of our varied activities; each image helps audiences instantly identify and understand what we do, and our impact. 





An application has been specially developed for conducting the statistical consultation of electronic files (PDFs) from 1 January 2006.


In June there were **137 558** records available online in PDF format (**137 044** in May), including documents, publications, communication material and other working documents.






The UNESCO Library collections offer an overview of the Organization's current and past activities and programmes as recorded in print publications and other resources.


'UNESCO publications' cover the output of the programmes of the Organization and feature in the biennial Publications Plan. They are produced in a variety of formats (books, CD-ROMs, ebooks, etc.) and are classified into different categories (global and regional reports, monographs, reviews, technical studies, atlases, etc.). They are distributed for free via UNESCO's networks and on-line, or as sales products under the 'UNESCO Publishing' imprint.

Online viewing of UNESCO top ten publications has dropped compared to April (-18%) and May (-15%) this year, and June of 2012 (-6%). In spite of this, viewing of Portuguese publications in the top ten has risen by 68%. The EFA Global Monitoring Report and the World Water Development Report 4 continue to feature in the top 10 as does the General History of Africa in Portuguese (first 2 volumes). For the second month running a special mention should go the top place which is the SHS publication Philosophy: a School of Freedom. This month there are no figures for UNESCO Publications on Google Books due to a technical problem with their site. Bookshop sales were again heavily dominated by titles largely from the Culture Sector on World Heritage (coinciding with the World Heritage Committee). The heavily promoted title Journeys to School in French and English continues to sell well on-line.






#### 9.1. Patronage

UNESCO's patronage is granted to a range of activities, such as cinematographic and audiovisual productions, publications, meetings, conferences and cultural performances, award ceremonies, as well as a range of other events of regional and international scale. Information on patronage requests and their follow-up is recorded in a central database managed by ERI/DPI/PBM. The database is updated daily and shared with the focal points for UNESCO name and logo use of each Sector.
