IADAA research shows the size of the legitimate ancient art market* to be Euro 150 – 200 million per year

Achieving this figure is only possible with objects that have provenance and are presented in elegant galleries, glossy catalogues and expensive art fairs.







As the UNESCO convention is not self executing, it becomes valid in the year of ratification or acceptance and can **NOT be retroactive back to 1970**.

- Search of objects < 5.000 with Art Loss Register (including INTERPOL database) obliged



The IADAA Archive



- •Database of all newly acquired objects over € 3.000
- •First searched by the Art Loss Register
- •Pictures, description and provenance information.
- •Login and password for ALL interested parties
- •Authorities in source countries will be notified of new entries
- •Recovering stolen objects not known by INTERPOL or ALR
- •Claims should be based on UNESCO 1970 or EU 2014/60



Lets all work together

- The trade is as horrified by the destruction and iconoclasm as anyone else and we share a common cause in wishing to defeat it.
