3 EXECUTION OF THE PROGRAMME

3.1.1 Report by the Director-General on the execution of the programme adopted by the General Conference (159 EX/4 (Part I and Corr. and Part II) and Add., 159 EX/INF.3 and Add., 159 EX/INF.4, 159 EX/43 and 159 EX/44)

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- 1. <u>Having examined</u> documents 159 EX/4 (Part I and Corr. and Part II) and Add., 159 EX/INF.3 and Add., 159 EX/INF.4,
- 2. <u>Recalling 154 EX/Decision 3.1</u> with particular reference to paragraphs 4 and 6 of that decision,

- 3. <u>Takes note</u> of the information provided by the Director-General in documents 159 EX/4 (Part I and Corr. and Part II) and Add., 159 EX/INF.3 and Add. and 159 EX/INF.4;
- 4. <u>Further notes</u> the improved financial situation of the Organization with regard to contributions by Member States and <u>encourages</u> the Director-General to continue his efforts in this respect;
- 5. Requests the Director-General to submit to it, in each of his reports on the execution of the programme and budget, a detailed table showing the budgetary situation by object of expenditure under Parts I, III, IV and V and staff costs for each main line of action under Part II, in addition to the information already provided;
- 6. <u>Calls upon</u> the Member States to pay their contributions in full and on time and <u>invites</u> the Member States in arrears to comply with payment plans.

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Alexandria Library

- 1. <u>Having examined</u> the report by the Director-General on the execution of the programme adopted by the General Conference (159 EX/4 Part I, para. 140),
- 2. <u>Recalling</u> the Project Agreement between the Government of the Arab Republic of Egypt and UNESCO concerning the implementation of the Project for the Revival of the Ancient Library of Alexandria (Bibliotheca Alexandrina) signed on 26 October 1990,
- 3. <u>Bearing in mind</u> that the architectural and technical work is being finalized, and that the Library is due to be inaugurated in early 2001,
- 4. <u>Considering</u> that the Library is intended to be an international centre for knowledge, contributing to building up regional and national knowledge societies through lifelong learning and research work,
- 5. <u>Considering with gratitude</u> the wish of the Egyptian Government to make the Library accessible and useful to the whole world by establishing an international Board of Trustees to enhance its international dimension.
- 6. <u>Considering also</u> that both the Egyptian Government and UNESCO wish to continue their joint strong support for the project,
- 7. <u>Urges</u> the international community to continue its involvement in and support for the revival of the Alexandria Library, in accordance with the Appeal launched by the Director-General of UNESCO on 22 October 1987 in support of the rebirth of the Alexandria Library;
- 8. <u>Calls upon</u> the Director-General to renew the Bibliotheca Alexandrina Project Agreement with the Egyptian Government and to continue UNESCO support for

the Library after its official opening and <u>expresses the wish</u> that the Board of Trustees of the Library be composed of eminent personalities from Egypt and from different regions of the world and of representatives of UNESCO and the other international organizations concerned.

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UNESCO-UNICEF Joint Committee on Education

The Executive Board,

- 1. Having examined paragraph 7 of document 159 EX/INF.3,
- 2. Recalling 157 EX/Decision 3.2.1,
- 3. <u>Aware</u> of the need to strengthen cooperation between UNESCO and UNICEF in support of education for all,
- 4. Invites the Director-General:
 - (a) to pursue more earnestly with the Executive Director of UNICEF the recommendations of the Joint Committee on Education with a view to obtaining substantive progress;
 - (b) to report to it on this matter at its 160th session.

3.1.2 Report by the Director-General on the reform process (159 EX/5 and Add., 159 EX/INF.7, 159 EX/INF.8 Rev. and 159 EX/45)

The Executive Board.

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- 1. <u>Having examined</u> documents 159 EX/5 and Add., 159 EX/INF.7 and 159 EX/INF.8 Rev.,
- 2. <u>Recalling</u> Articles IV.B.2 and V.B.6(b) of the Constitution relating to the functions of the General Conference and of the Executive Board,
- 3. <u>Further recalling</u> the provisions of paragraphs (l) and (p) of the Appropriation Resolution for 2000-2001 (30 C/Resolution 1),
- 4. Recalling also 30 C/Resolution 70, 30 C/Resolution 72, 30 C/Resolution 83 and 30 C/Resolution 84 concerning staff questions and the methods of work of the Organization,
- 5. <u>Thanks</u> the Director-General for the measures taken to date in order to develop a reform strategy aimed at making the Organization more efficient and ensuring that it performs more successfully;

6. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to continue his work to this effect taking duly into account the views expressed on the subject by the Executive Board at its 159th session;

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- 7. <u>Takes note</u> of the information concerning reclassifications, promotions and appointments decided upon in 1998-1999 as well as of their implications for the staff costs budget of the biennium in question and of the current biennium;
- 8. <u>Expresses concern</u> that in a great number of cases the procedures and criteria for such appointments and promotions were not followed;
- 9. <u>Thanks</u> the Director-General for the steps taken in order to maintain staff costs for the 2000-2001 biennium within the budget ceiling specified in document 30 C/5;
- 10. Expresses its support for the measures taken by the Director-General to suspend a number of staff decisions taken between 1 October and 14 November 1999, in line with the requirements expressed by the General Conference at its 30th session (30 C/Resolution 70 and 30 C/Resolution 72);
- 11. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to reduce as rapidly as possible the number of staff in higher level posts in order to achieve a more balanced post structure, and <u>requests</u> him to report to it at its 160th session on the results achieved;
- 12. <u>Takes note</u> of the fact that the Director-General is experiencing difficulties in applying 30 C/Resolutions 70 and 72 concerning the competitive process with regard to renewal of appointments (Staff Regulation 4.2) and the 90-day advertising period for posts in the General Service and National Professional Officer categories, and <u>requests</u> that, in the case of renewals of appointments, proof of wholly satisfactory service will be required;
- 13. <u>Requests</u> the Director-General to ensure that the criterion of competence remains at all times the paramount consideration when recruiting staff to posts, while at the same time establishing a more equitable geographical distribution and gender balance of Secretariat staff;
- 14. <u>Takes note with satisfaction</u> of the Director-General's intention to develop ongoing training within the Organization;
- 15. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to review the entire promotion system, and to devise new career development opportunities for the staff of the Organization;
- 16. <u>Further invites</u> the Director-General to present detailed proposals concerning the new recruitment methods contemplated, and more particularly the use of consultants under renewable contracts for a maximum duration of two years, and to report to it at its 160th session;

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17. <u>Expresses its support</u> to the Director-General in respect of the establishment of the Office of Human Resources Management, and <u>requests</u> him to strengthen the

- machinery for both human and financial resources planning with an eye to the next Programme and Budget;
- 18. <u>Takes note with gratitude</u> of the Director-General's proposal to set up a single internal oversight service bringing together the audit, inspection, investigation, management improvement and evaluation functions;
- 19. <u>Decides</u> to consider at its 160th session the Director-General's proposals on the UNESCO internal oversight system, taking into account the forthcoming reports by the Joint Inspection Unit and the International Institute of Internal Auditors;

20. <u>Requests</u> the Director-General to provide it with detailed information on the volume, source and allocation of extrabudgetary resources, having regard to the priorities defined by the General Conference, on the administrative costs relating thereto and on the types of arrangements entered into between the donors and the Organization;

- 21. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to submit to it at its 160th session a report containing his conclusions on the management reform process in three separate documents relating to staff policy, the structure and systems of management of the Secretariat, and decentralization;
- 22. <u>Urges</u> the Director-General to present to it, at its 160th session, a timetable for the implementation of the proposed reforms, with all relevant financial aspects and their impact upon the Organization's next budgets.

3.1.3 Proposal by the Director-General on adjustments to the Approved Programme and Budget for 2000-2001 (159 EX/6 and 159 EX/45 Add. and Corr.)

- 1. Recalling paragraphs A(a), (b) and (c) of the Appropriation Resolution for 2000-2001 (30 C/Resolution 1) wherein:
 - "(a) For the financial period 2000-2001 the sum of \$544,367,250 is appropriated (...) subject to adjustments authorized in accordance with paragraphs (b) and (c) below:
 - (b) The Director-General is authorized to prepare, within the framework of the above-mentioned financial limit, any adjustment to the appropriations of paragraph (a) above, taking into account the findings of the Executive Board (30 C/6, Part II, Annex, ...) and to submit such adjustments to the Executive Board for examination and approval at its 159th session.
 - (c) The Director-General is authorized to find savings of at least \$10 million in order to strengthen the Organization's activities, in particular in the following areas:

- Participation Programme,
- the E-9 countries,
- new management and monitoring requirements,
- statutory requirements of the Medical Benefits Fund, and
- Young Professionals Programme.",
- 2. <u>Having examined</u> the proposals of the Director-General in this regard contained in document 159 EX/6 and <u>taking into consideration</u> the views expressed by its Members at the 159th session,
- 3. <u>Approves</u> the measures proposed in Part I and Annex II of that document for refocusing certain priority areas in the Approved Programme and Budget for 2000-2001;
- 4. <u>Approves also</u> the measures proposed in Part II and Annexes I and III of that document aimed at redeploying identified savings of \$10,761,100 to further strengthen the activities indicated by the General Conference in paragraph A(c) of the Appropriation Resolution for 2000-2001.

3.2 Education

3.2.1 United Nations University (UNU): Report of the Council of the University and the Director-General's comments thereon (159 EX/7 and Add. and 159 EX/44)

- 1. Having examined document 159 EX/7 and Add.,
- 2. Recognizing the efforts made by the Council and the Rector of UNU to renew the structures and programmes of the institution and reinvigorate its management in line with the recommendations put forward by the United Nations Joint Inspection Unit (JIU/REP/98/3),
- 3. <u>Expresses its appreciation</u> of the active participation of UNU in UNESCO's activities and programmes;
- 4. <u>Expresses its satisfaction</u> at the development of the programme and activities of UNU;
- 5. <u>Expresses its gratitude</u> to the Government of Japan for the financial and intellectual support that it gives to UNU, particularly through its funds-in-trust;
- 6. Expresses its gratitude to the Member States in which the research and training centres (RTCs) and programmes (RTPs) are located for their financial and intellectual support;
- 7. <u>Thanks</u> the governments and organizations that have contributed to the University's funds-in-trust and have provided support for the research and training centres and programmes;

- 8. <u>Expresses its renewed support</u> to the Rector of UNU Professor Hans van Ginkel and <u>encourages</u> him in his efforts to raise extrabudgetary funds for UNU, particularly in aid of developing countries;
- 9. <u>Reaffirms</u> its previous recommendations for the continuation of cooperation between UNESCO and UNU, mainly through the UNITWIN/UNESCO Chairs Programme, follow-up to the World Conference on Higher Education and the World Conference on Science, and the programmes for the promotion of human rights, peace, conflict resolution, the environment and the social and human sciences;
- 10. <u>Urges</u> the University to continue to implement the recommendations of the report of the United Nations Joint Inspection Unit, in particular by increasing its activities in the developing countries, especially in the Latin America and the Caribbean region, in order to reduce the current imbalances and to include a specific reference to this issue in its next report;
- 11. <u>Also urges</u> the University to improve the flow of information provided to Member States;
- 12. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to communicate to the Chair of the Council of UNU and to the Rector the terms of this decision.

- 2. Having examined document 159 EX/8,
- 3. <u>Decides</u>:
 - (a) that invitations to participate in the 46th session of the International Conference on Education with the right to vote will be sent to all Member States and Associate Members of UNESCO;
 - (b) that invitations to send observers to the Conference will be sent to the States mentioned in paragraph 6 of document 159 EX/8, which are not Members of UNESCO but are members of another organization of the United Nations system, and to any other State that becomes a member of one of the organizations of the United Nations system before the opening date of the Conference;
 - (c) that an invitation to send observers to the Conference will be sent to Palestine, as mentioned in paragraph 7 of document 159 EX/8;

- (d) that invitations to send representatives to the Conference will be sent to the organizations of the United Nations system with which UNESCO has concluded mutual representation agreements and which are listed in paragraph 8 of document 159 EX/8;
- (e) that invitations to send observers to the Conference will be sent to the organizations, foundations and institutions listed in paragraph 10 of document 159 EX/8;
- 4. <u>Authorizes</u> the Director-General to send out any other invitations he may deem useful for advancing the work of the Conference, notifying the Executive Board thereof.

- 3. <u>Acknowledging UNESCO</u>'s lead role in the follow-up to the Dakar Framework for Action,
- 4. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to submit to it at its 160th session a concrete Plan of Action for the implementation of and follow-up to the Dakar Framework for Action on the basis of Annex II of document 159 EX/41.

3.3.1 UNESCO's contribution to poverty eradication (159 EX/9 and Corr., 159 EX/INF.6 and 159 EX/44)

- 1. Having examined documents 159 EX/9 and Corr. and document 159 EX/INF.6,
- 2. <u>Welcomes</u> the efforts made by the Secretariat to develop a framework for UNESCO's strategy on development and poverty eradication;
- 3. Notes the work in progress;
- 4. <u>Reaffirms</u> its commitment to the importance of poverty eradication in UNESCO's programming;
- 5. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to elaborate a strategy and preliminary programme for UNESCO on development and poverty eradication, through a strong

- interdisciplinary approach coordinated by the MOST Programme that includes the examination of education as a tool;
- 6. <u>Requests</u> that this strategy take into account the views expressed during the debate on this topic and outline modalities for its implementation, and that it be submitted to it at its 160th session.

3.4 Culture

3.4.1 Jerusalem and the implementation of 156 EX/Decision 3.5.1 (159 EX/10 and 159 EX/44)

- 1. Recalling the provisions of the 1954 Hague Convention and the Protocol thereto, the fourth Geneva Convention of 1949 and its Additional Protocols, the 1972 Convention for the Protection of the World Cultural and Natural Heritage, the relevant United Nations Security Council and General Assembly decisions and resolutions on the status of Jerusalem, and the inscription of the Old City of Jerusalem on the World Heritage List and the List of World Heritage in Danger,
- 2. Recalling 30 C/Resolution 28,
- 3. <u>Concerned</u> at the measures which continue to impede the free access of Palestinians to Jerusalem and to the Holy Places of the Old City of Jerusalem (see the report contained in document 30 C/12),
- 4. <u>Thanks</u> the States, organizations, institutions and individuals that have made financial contributions to the Special Account for the Safeguarding of the Cultural Heritage of the City of Jerusalem, and in particular the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia for its generous contribution;
- 5. <u>Thanks</u> the Director-General for his praiseworthy and unceasing efforts to ensure full implementation of UNESCO resolutions and decisions concerning the monuments, characteristics and cultural property of the Old City of Jerusalem;
- 6. <u>Welcomes</u> the Director-General's choice of Professor Oleg Grabar to prepare the report to be submitted at its 160th session in pursuance of 30 C/Resolution 28;
- 7. <u>Requests</u> the Israeli authorities to implement the relevant resolutions and decisions of UNESCO;
- 8. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to continue his efforts with a view to ensuring the implementation of the resolutions and decisions of UNESCO concerning the City of Jerusalem, in accordance with its basic texts and the 1972 Convention, and thus to pay due attention to compliance with all decisions and resolutions relating to Jerusalem with regard to cultural, architectural, historical and demographic features and the restoration work;
- 9. <u>Decides</u> to include this item in the agenda of its 160th session.

3.4.2 Proposals for the implementation of an interdisciplinary Arabia Plan programme (159 EX/11 and 159 EX/44)

The Executive Board,

- 1. <u>Having examined</u> document 159 EX/11 on the proposals for the implementation of an interdisciplinary Arabia Plan programme,
- 2. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to finalize his proposals in accordance with the spirit and the letter of 30 C/Resolution 30, in close cooperation with the Arab Group;
- 3. <u>Decides</u> to include this item in the agenda of its 160th session.

3.4.3 Strategy regarding the completion and follow-up of the general and regional history projects (159 EX/12 and 159 EX/44)

- 1. Recalling the provisions of paragraph 05300 of document 30 C/5 Approved,
- 2. <u>Noting</u> the progress made in the preparation and publication of the five general and regional histories and the African language versions of the General History of Africa,
- 3. Recognizing the need to complete the five history projects as soon as possible in order, in particular, to improve clarification and understanding of the processes of intercultural dialogue and cultural pluralism and considering that historical publications can provide a basis for writing history textbooks and for facilitating their revision,
- 4. Recognizing also the need for follow-up activities relating to the General History of Africa, as defined at the last meeting of the International Scientific Committee for the drafting of a General History of Africa (Tripoli, 10-13 April 1999),
- 5. <u>Acknowledges</u> the efforts and dedication of the presidents of the respective international scientific committees of the general and regional history projects;
- 6. <u>Thanks</u> the Governments of Côte d'Ivoire, France and the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya, and also the Holy See, the World Islamic Call Society (WICS) and the Agence de la Francophonie for their generous contributions to the general and regional history projects;
- 7. <u>Approves</u> the measures proposed under the strategy for completion of the five general and regional history projects and for carrying out the follow-up activities of the General History of Africa;
- 8. <u>Urgently appeals</u> to Member States and to public and private institutions to make voluntary contributions to these projects;

- 9. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to do his utmost to mobilize the necessary resources, to take appropriate measures for the completion of the five general and regional history projects and to consider including in document 31 C/5 an allocation under the regular programme for any projects not completed during the current biennium;
- 10. <u>Further invites</u> the Director-General to explore the possibility of resorting to an international bid with the aim of reducing publishing costs and to submit to it a report thereon at its 161st session;
- 11. <u>Also invites</u> the Director-General to submit to it at its 161st session, in the same report, an account of progress on these projects and an assessment of results achieved.

- 3. <u>Decides</u> to replace the General Information Programme (PGI) and the Intergovernmental Informatics Programme (IIP) by a new programme;
- 4. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to submit to it at its 160th session the new programme and the statutes of its intergovernmental body.

- 1. Having examined document 159 EX/15,
- 2. Reiterating that UNESCO should play a leading international role in promoting equal access to information that falls in the public domain, especially by encouraging linguistic and cultural pluralism on the global information networks,

- 3. <u>Encourages</u> the continuation of work with a view to drawing up a list of specific projects within the framework of "Initiative B@bel" communicated by the Director-General, in accordance with 30 C/Resolution 37;
- 4. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to continue the elaboration of this strategy with a view to including it in the draft recommendation to Member States on the promotion of multilingualism and equal access to information on the global networks to be submitted for adoption by the General Conference at its 31st session, in conformity with the applicable rules of procedure, and to submit a progress report on the matter to it at its 161st session;
- 5. <u>Invites</u> Member States, non-governmental organizations and the world intellectual community to encourage and support the development of this programme by strengthening linguistic and cultural pluralism on the national sites of the global information networks.

- 1. <u>Having examined</u> the issue of the Legal Adviser to the Executive Board in the light of Part A of document 159 EX/13,
- 2. <u>Emphasizing</u> the need for the Executive Board to have recourse to independent and impartial legal advice from the Legal Adviser,
- 3. <u>Requests</u> that the Director-General take the decisions concerning the appointment, tenure and termination of appointment of the Legal Adviser of the Organization in consultation with the Executive Board;
- 4. <u>Recommends</u> that the General Conference amend the Staff Regulations accordingly;
- 5. <u>Notes</u> that 30 C/Resolution 78, which provides that the Legal Committee can now meet whenever necessary if convened by the President of the General Conference, on his own initiative or at the request of the Executive Board, offers an alternative recourse for the Board to seek legal advice;

6. <u>Having examined</u> Part B of document 159 EX/13 relating to the mode of election of the Chairperson and Vice-Chairpersons of the Executive Board,

- 7. <u>Considers</u> that the current Rules of Procedure of the Executive Board governing the election and replacement of the Chairperson of the Executive Board provide adequate guidance;
- 8. <u>Considers also</u> that the current practice of electing the Chairperson of the Executive Board as governed by the Rules of Procedure of the Executive Board is adequate;
- 9. <u>Decides</u> not to amend the Rules of Procedure of the Executive Board to provide for the replacement of the Chairperson who becomes a candidate for the post of Director-General:

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- 10. <u>Having examined</u> Parts C and D of document 159 EX/13 and, also, document 159 EX/38,
- 11. <u>Considering</u> that the two interlinked issues of the structure of the subsidiary organs of the Executive Board and of the relations between the three organs of UNESCO require in-depth, substantive examination by the Executive Board,

- 3. <u>Having examined</u> the Director-General's report on the budgetary situation of the Organization in 1998-1999 and on the adjustments and transfers made by him at the end of the biennium for the purpose of closing the accounts (159 EX/19),
- 4. <u>Takes note</u> of the fact that the Director-General has increased the appropriations to the regular budget for 1998-1999 by a total amount of \$4,074,811 by accepting donations and contributions from governments and institutions, as well as contributions towards the running costs of established field offices;
- 5. <u>Expresses its appreciation</u> to the donors mentioned in Annex I to document 159 EX/19;
- 6. <u>Notes</u> that the actual expenditure under staff costs remained within the approved allocation;
- 7. <u>Also notes</u> that undischarged obligations of funds increased significantly in relation to the previous biennium;
- 8. <u>Takes note</u> of the transfers made between appropriation lines to close the accounts for 1998-1999.

6.3 Financial Regulations of the Special Account for the UNESCO International Institute for Capacity-Building in Africa (IICBA) (159 EX/20 and 159 EX/43)

- 1. Recalling 156 EX/Decision 6.5, paragraph 4, and 30 C/Resolution 8,
- 2. <u>Having examined</u> document 159 EX/20,
- 3. <u>Takes note</u> of the Financial Regulations of the Special Account for the UNESCO International Institute for Capacity-Building in Africa (IICBA) annexed hereto.

Annex

Financial Regulations of the Special Account for the UNESCO International Institute for Capacity-Building in Africa (IICBA)

Article 1 - Creation of a Special Account of UNESCO

- 1.1 In accordance with Article 6, paragraph 6, of the Financial Regulations of UNESCO, there is hereby created a Special Account for the UNESCO International Institute for Capacity-Building in Africa (IICBA), hereafter referred to as "the Institute".
- 1.2 The following regulations shall govern the operation of the Special Account.

Article 2 - Financial period

The financial period shall begin on the first day of January and end on the thirty-first day of December each year.

Article 3 - Income

- 3.1 As provided in its Statutes, the income of the Institute shall consist of:
 - (a) a financial allocation determined by the General Conference to cover staff costs, as well as direct and indirect programme costs;
 - (b) voluntary contributions from States, international agencies and organizations, as well as other entities allocated to it for purposes consistent with the policies, programmes and activities of UNESCO and the Institute;
 - (c) such subventions, endowments, gifts and bequests as are allocated to it or purposes consistent with the policies, programmes and activities of UNESCO and the Institute;
 - (d) fees collected in respect of the execution of projects entrusted to the Institute, from sale of publications, or from other particular activities; and
 - (e) miscellaneous income.
- 3.2 The Director may accept income as set forth in Article 3.1 on behalf of the Institute, provided that, in any case which would involve the Institute in an additional financial liability, the Director shall obtain the prior approval of the Institute's Governing Board (hereafter referred to as "the Board") and the consent of the Executive Board of UNESCO.
- 3.3 The Director shall report to the Board on any subventions, contributions, grants, gifts or bequests accepted.

Article 4 - Budget

- 4.1 The Director shall prepare, in a form to be determined by the Board, an annual programme and budget and shall submit it to the Board for approval.
- 4.2 The appropriations voted in the budget shall constitute an authorization to the Director to incur obligations and to make expenditures for the purposes for which the appropriations are voted and up to the amounts so voted.
- 4.3 The Director is authorized to transfer funds between activities under the same appropriation line. The Director may be authorized by the Board to transfer funds, when necessary, between appropriation lines within the limits established by the Appropriation Resolution voted by the Board and shall report to the Board on all such transfers.
- 4.4 The Director is required to maintain obligations and expenditures within the level of the actual resources that become available to the General Account mentioned in Article 5.1 below.
- 4.5 Appropriations shall remain available for obligation during the financial period to which they relate.
- 4.6 The Director shall make allotments and any modifications thereon, within the limits of the Appropriation Resolution, which shall be communicated, in writing, to the officials authorized to incur obligations and make payments.
- 4.7 Appropriations shall remain available for 12 months following the end of the financial period to which they relate to the extent that they are required to discharge obligations for goods supplied and services rendered in the financial period and to liquidate any other outstanding legal obligations of the financial period.
- 4.8 At the end of the 12-month period provided for in Article 4.7 above, the then remaining unspent balance of obligations retained shall revert to the General Account mentioned in Article 5.1 below.

Article 5 - The General Account

- 5.1 There shall be established a General Account, to which shall be credited the income of the Institute as described in Article 3 above and which will be used to finance the approved budget of the Institute.
- 5.2 The balance remaining in this General Account shall be carried forward from one financial period to the next.
- 5.3 The uses to which this balance may be put shall be determined by the Board.

Article 6 - Trust Funds, Reserve and Subsidiary Special Accounts

6.1 In addition to a Working Capital Fund, the Director shall establish a Reserve Fund to cover end-of-service indemnities and other related liabilities; the Fund shall be reported annually to the Board at the time of the yearly budget approval.

- 6.2 Trust Funds, Subsidiary Special Accounts and any other Reserve Accounts may be established by the Director, who shall report thereon to the Board.
- 6.3 The Director may, when necessary, in connection with the purpose of a Trust Fund, Reserve or Subsidiary Special Account, prepare special financial regulations to govern the operations of these funds or accounts and shall report thereon to the Board. Unless otherwise provided these funds and accounts shall be administered in accordance with these Financial Regulations.

Article 7 - Accounts

- 7.1 The UNESCO Comptroller shall maintain such accounting records as are necessary and shall prepare, for submission to the Board, annual accounts showing, for the financial period to which they relate:
 - (a) the income and expenditure of all funds;
 - (b) the budgetary situation including:
 - (i) original appropriations;
 - (ii) the appropriations as modified by any transfers;
 - (iii) the amounts charged against these appropriations;
 - (c) the assets and liabilities of the Institute.
- 7.2 The Director shall also give such other information as may be appropriate to indicate the current financial position of the Institute.
- 7.3 The annual accounts of the Institute shall be presented in dollars of the United States of America. Accounting records may, however, be kept in such currency or currencies as the Director may deem necessary.
- 7.4 Appropriate separate accounts shall be maintained for all Trust Funds, Reserve and Subsidiary Special Accounts.

Article 8 - External audit

The audited accounts of the Institute, which constitute an integral part of the statement of the financial position of UNESCO, and the report of the External Auditor of UNESCO on the Institute, shall be submitted to the Board for approval. However, as the accounts of UNESCO are not audited on an annual basis, the Board may ask for the annual accounts of the Institute to be submitted for examination to the External Auditor of UNESCO.

Article 9 - General provision

Unless otherwise provided in these Regulations the Special Account shall be administered in accordance with the Financial Regulations of UNESCO.

6.5 Financial Regulations of the Special Account for the restoration and improvement of UNESCO Headquarters (159 EX/22 and Corr. and 159 EX/43)

The Executive Board,

- 1. Having considered document 159 EX/22 and Corr.,
- 2. Recalling 30 C/Resolution 76, Part II, paragraph 7,
- 3. <u>Takes note</u> of the Financial Regulations of the Special Account for the restoration and improvement of UNESCO Headquarters annexed hereto.

Annex

Financial Regulations of the Special Account for the restoration and improvement of UNESCO Headquarters

Article 1 - Creation of a Special Account

1.1 In accordance with Article 6, paragraph 6, of the Financial Regulations of UNESCO, there is hereby created a Special Account for the restoration and improvement of UNESCO Headquarters, hereinafter referred to as the "Special Account".

1.2 The following regulations shall govern the operation of the Special Account.

Article 2 - Financial period

The financial period shall correspond to that of UNESCO.

Article 3 - Purpose

The purpose of the Special Account is to group funds available, including any loans, for the restoration and improvement of UNESCO Headquarters irrespective of their source.

Article 4 - Income

The income of the Special Account shall consist of:

- (a) amounts provided from the regular budget of the Organization as authorized by the General Conference:
- (b) voluntary contributions from States, international agencies and organizations, as well as other entities;
- (c) appropriate amounts provided from the Headquarters Utilization Fund;
- (d) miscellaneous income, including any interest earned on the investments referred to in Article 7 below.

Article 5 - Expenditure

The Special Account shall be debited with the expenditure relating to its purpose as described in Article 3 above, including administrative and staff expenses as well as any interest that might be payable on any loans specifically relating to it.

Article 6 - Accounts

- 6.1 The UNESCO Comptroller shall maintain such accounting records as are necessary.
- 6.2 Any unused balance at the end of a financial period shall be carried forward to the following financial period.
- 6.3 The accounts of the Special Account shall be presented for audit to the External Auditor of UNESCO, together with the other accounts of the Organization.
- 6.4 Contributions in kind shall be recorded outside the Special Account.

Article 7 - Investments

- 7.1 The Director-General may make short-term investments of sums standing to the credit of the Special Account.
- 7.2 Interest earned on these investments shall be credited to the Special Account.

Article 8 - Closure of the Special Account

The Director-General shall decide upon the closure of the Special Account at such time as he deems that its operation is no longer necessary, and inform the Executive Board accordingly.

Article 9 - General provision

Unless otherwise provided in these Regulations, the Special Account shall be administered in accordance with the Financial Regulations of UNESCO.

- 6. <u>Takes note</u> of the Director-General's efforts to strengthen UNESCO's contribution to the fight against AIDS in partnership with UNAIDS, other partners in the United Nations system and the World Foundation for AIDS Research and Prevention;

- 6. <u>Thanks</u> the Director-General for the implementation of the preparatory work relating to the third phase of the UNESCO Programme for Palestine (UPP);
- 7. <u>Requests</u> the Director-General to submit to the Executive Board at its 160th session the final version of the third phase of UPP;
- 8. Expresses the hope that the Arab-Israeli peace negotiations will be resumed and that a just and comprehensive peace will be speedily brought about in accordance with the United Nations resolutions, to which UNESCO adheres, particularly Security Council resolutions 242, 338 and 425, based on withdrawal from the occupied Arab territories and the principle of land for peace;

- (a) to continue the efforts he is making vis-à-vis the Israeli authorities with a view to preserving the human and social fabric and safeguarding the Syrian Arab cultural identity of the occupied Syrian Golan, in accordance with the relevant resolutions adopted in this regard;
- (b) to continue his efforts vis-à-vis the Israeli authorities so that they cease imposing Israeli curricula on the students of the occupied Syrian Golan, to offer more grants to those students and to provide special assistance to the educational institutions of the Golan:

- 10. Reiterates all its previous decisions relating to the occupied Syrian Golan;
- 11. <u>Decides</u> to include this item in the agenda of its 160th session.

8.2 Report by the Director-General on the choice of the location of the UNESCO Institute for Statistics (159 EX/36 and 159 EX/45)

The Executive Board,

- 1. Recalling 157 EX/Decision 3.1(III) and 30 C/Resolution 44,
- 2. <u>Having examined</u> document 159 EX/36 concerning the report of the Director-General on the choice of the location of the UNESCO Institute for Statistics (UIS),
- 3. <u>Considering</u> that the bidding process was conducted in an open and transparent manner by the Secretariat,
- 4. <u>Congratulates</u> the Governing Board of UIS and its ad hoc Committee for the rigour of the procedure that they established to conduct the bidding process, the quality of the report submitted and the timeliness of the recommendation;
- 5. <u>Expresses</u> the Organization's sincere and deepest gratitude to Canada, France, Netherlands and the United Kingdom for the quality of the bids and the strong commitment shown to the mission and the development of UIS;
- 6. <u>Decides</u> that UIS, wherever located, should function mainly as a centre for active and close networking with leading national and international statistical institutions, particularly those in developing countries; and may at the same time continue, wherever necessary, its functional relationship with entities engaged in relevant data collection and analysis;
- 7. <u>Decides also</u> that UIS should be located in Montreal (Canada), provided that the Director-General determines that the agreement negotiated with Canada is based on the assumptions underlying the evaluation;
- 8. <u>Invites</u> the Director-General to proceed with the negotiation for an appropriate agreement with Canada, taking into account the assumptions underlying the evaluation and the views expressed by the Governing Board of the Institute in its recommendation to the Director-General;
- 9. <u>Also invites</u> the Director-General to report to it on this subject at its 160th session.

 - (b) UNESCO's contribution to the United Nations Year of Dialogue among Civilizations (2001) and the International Decade of the World's Indigenous People (1994-2004).
