"Women in Science and Non-Traditional Settings"

Friday, 9 November 2012 Tirana International Hotel, Abreti room

Since its establishment in 2001, UNESCO's World Science Day for Peace and Development is celebrated worldwide each year on 10 November. This Day is an occasion to recall UNESCO's and its Member States' commitment to science. In close cooperation with Its members States UNESCO has made significant progress in also promoting gender equality (a global priority for the Organization) and is strongly oriented towards empowering girls and women in the creation of scientific knowledge.

Although there are encouraging signs, women are still under-represented in science whether in basic scientific research or at higher decision-making levels. Science cannot continue to deprive itself of the full scientific potential of over half the world's population. Science is a key to knowledge; for women to gain access to knowledge and achieve gender equality, women must have access to science. It has been noted that women are responsible for half of the human knowledge and technical expertise as informal agriculturalists, gardeners, animal-breeders, managers of their community resources as well as technological innovators and agents of change. But unfortunately, failure to recognize women's scientific know how and inputs even in daily life situations has led to a noticeable lack of confidence in their academic capacities and career choices.

Within Albania's centennial celebrations, the UNESCO World Science Day will place the spotlight on the important contributions Albanian women make to science. In close cooperation with the Ministry of Education and Science and the Ministry of Labor, Social Issues and Equal Opportunities of Albania, Director of the UNESCO Regional Bureau for Science and Culture in Europe, Venice (Italy) is organizing a Conference "Albanian Women in Science and non-traditional settings" in the framework of the GoA-UN Program of Cooperation.

Important Albanian women scientists and international guests will share their professional and educational experiences and answer questions from the public. It is hoped that these "science spokespersons" will be reference points for future generations of young Albanian women interested in science.
