


Investing in girls is the right and smart thing to do

Investing in education and health yields significant returns for children.



EVERY \$1 INVESTED

in reducing chronic undernutrition can result in a return of up to \$30.1



By reducing health

The returns on investing in girls' education and health have a positive economic impact.




A child whose mother can read is

50% MORE likely to survive past the age of five.4



Each extra year of a mother's schooling reduces the probability of an infant dying

BY 5% TO 10%





The risk of maternal death is

2.7 TIMES

higher among women with no education than among women with more than 12 years of education.6

A girl multiplies the impact of an investment made in her future by extending benefits to the world around her.





When girls and women earn income, they are likely to
