MESSAGE FROM MS IRINA BOKOVA, DIRECTOR-GENERAL OF UNESCO ON THE OCCASION OF THE INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR UNIVERSAL ACCESS TO INFORMATION 28 September 2016

Over two thousand years ago, Aristotle wrote: "All human beings by nature desire to know."

To know requires having access to information – this fundamental human right is part of what makes us human, it is essential for inclusion and dialogue, it is a foundation for the rule of law and good governance, and it is vital for crafting new paths to sustainable development.

This is the message of the first *International Day for Universal Access to Information*, as decided by UNESCO Member States -- this is why access to information is a key driver for taking forward the *2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development*, to promote human rights and dignity, to eradicate poverty, to build inclusive knowledge societies.

Equal and universal access to information is a powerful engine for positive change, widening opportunities to overcome inequalities, to reach the marginalised, to create and share knowledge, to discover other cultures, to strengthen the foundations of democratic institutions. In a globalising world, this right must be respected offline and online – the digital revolution must be a development revolution, drawing on the empowering force of new information and communication technologies, for inclusion and innovation.

This means breaking down all barriers to access, in connectivity, in skills. This is the importance of strong freedom of information laws and their effective implementation. It was 250 years ago that contemporary Sweden and Finland adopted the world's first right to information legislation, as recognised in the 2016 World Press Freedom Day Finlandia Declaration. To move forward, we must empower all women and men with awareness of their right of access to information, and we must advance media and information literacy skills so that all can harness this right for sustainable development.

These goals guide all of UNESCO's action, to support governments and societies, to ensure every woman and man enjoys full and equal access to information that is essential for their rights, dignity and empowerment.

This is UNESCO's message on this inaugural International Day for Universal Access to Information.

SDG 1 | End poverty in all its forms everywhere

Mr. Palagummi Sainath

Mr. Sainath is currently rural reporter, writer and journalism lecturer at the Sophia Polytechnic University in Chennai, India and previously at Princeton University. As a rural reporter, Mr. Sainath is considered an influential



voice in the public discourse on rural poverty with his ground-breaking work on farmer suicides. Mr. Sainath is founder of the People's Archive of Rural India, <u>www.ruralindiaonline.org</u>, which strives to serve as "an archive and living journal of history of rural India". He has won over 40 global and national awards for his reporting on rural poverty.

Mr. Sainath will elaborate on the importance of journalism and public access to information in ending poverty.

SDG 2 | End hunger, achieve food security and improved nutrition and promote sustainable agriculture

Ms. Alexandra Silfverstolpe Tolstoy

"My passion is to make sure that development resources are spent in the most effective ways to achieve greater impact in the world."

In her two decades of experience working with global development issues, Ms. Tolstoy often felt that decisions about how to spend resources were made in isolation of important facts that were essential to creating intended results. As an aid practitioner she lacked easy ways to access and analyse development data. She created Data Act Lab to assist governments, organizations, think tanks and the public to make sense of complex data in order to drive better decision making and in the end create a better world.

Ms. Tolstoy has been working with development issues for 20 years with the Swedish Ministry for Foreign Affairs, Sida, the UN, the EU Commission and civil society organizations. She also holds a Masters in Development Management from the London School of Economics.

SDG 3 | Ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages

Ms. Daniela Bas

"My mission is to use information as a platform to enhance the well-being of people through promoting an inclusive and an accessible society."

Ms. Bas is the director of the Division for Social Policy and Development in the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs since May 2011. She previously served as senior consultant on human rights for the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Presidency of the Council of Ministers in Italy; member of the Board of Directors of the E.U. Agency of Fundamental Rights; Special Advisor to the Vice President of the European Commission on social policies and democracy, and Italian representative at the European Commission on "Tourism for All." She also worked in the private sector as CEO and in radio and television as a broadcaster.



Ms. Bas was six years old when doctors found a tumor pressing on her spine. Beating the odds, she survived but became paraplegic. Her family and teachers never saw her as a child with a disability but rather as a person who could overcome any challenge, which was the starting point that built a solid foundation for a successful future.

Ms. Bas will elaborate on the importance of public access to information in the achievement of good health and well-being for all.

Ms. Sanchaita Gajapati Raju

"Nothing ravages human dignity more than having to drink contaminated water & defecate in the open every day."

Sanchaita Gajapati is the Founder and Managing Trustee of SANA, a non-profit that uses technology to provide safe drinking water and sanitation to the marginalized, bolstering its mission with capacity building and motivational workshops. SANA's latest initiative in Delhi, Toilet to Tap, converts sewage waste into safe drinking water. Ms Gajapati Raju has been presented in various national and international fora and was selected as among the Women of Pure Wonder by the Vodafone Foundation in March 2016. She is a qualified lawyer and has extensive media experience.

"In my work experience I have realized early on that Water & Sanitation go hand in hand. One without the other is not an option. The poor do not need poor solution. We use Technology to transform lives. But Technology by itself is only an enabler. To have sustainable solutions for social issues you need a holistic vision. One that involves stake holders from the early planning stages and gives them a sense of ownership of the social intervention. Empowerment truly become powerful when the beneficiaries not only undergo an attitudinal change but also a behavioural change."

Ms. Gajapati Raju will be sharing her first-hand experiences on promoting good health and wellbeing, and the importance of access to information in her line of work.

As Director of Open Education at Creative Commons (CC), he promotes the well-known suite of open licenses that have become the global standard to promote sharing, collaboration and innovation. The CC licenses - numbering 1.3+ billion across 9 million websites – make it easy for anyone to freely access and use open educational resources.

Mr. Green will highlight the key role that access to information plays in ensuring quality education the world around.

13.00 – 15.00 LAUNCH OF THE EXHIBITION ON THE 250TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE FREEDOM OF THE PRESS ACT FOLLOWED BY A LIGHT LUNCH

On the occasion of the first celebration of the International Day for the Universal Access to Information, the Permanent Delegations of Sweden and Finland jointly launch an exhibition to commemorate the 250th Anniversary of the Freedom of the Press Act passed in 1766. The Freedom of the Press Act was enacted in what is today Sweden and Finland.

The exhibition presents the origins of the Freedom of the Press Act and focuses on the events, people, as well as the advances and setbacks that shaped it since the late 15th century until today.

It also presents personalities, which were influential in the process of the adoption of the act, in particular Anders Chydenius, a Member of the Parliament which passed the Act.

Her work has a particular focus on the Alliance for Affordable Internet project and the Web We Want campaign for human rights on and through the Web. She is also deeply involved in driving forward the open data agenda across Africa. Ms. Nwakanma in recent years co-founded The Free Software and Open Source Foundation for Africa, and has served as a board member of the Open Source Initiative.

Ms. Aziza Chaouni

"Practicing architecture in deserts and in oasis settings has been a very humbling and enlightening process [...]. It allowed me to better grasp the fragile balance between a building, natural resources, surrounding landscape and fauna, and users."

Ms. Chaouni's architectural designs seek to integrate architecture and landscape to build and develop a sustainable dialogue between her work, the environment and local communities in the Middle East. Ms. Chaouni's practice, research and teaching focus on sustainable design and construction in the developing world. She is an associate professor of the University of Toronto, founder of her own firm Chaouni Projects and author/editor of three books. Ms. Chaouni has been awarded numerous top awards for her work, published and exhibited internationally. Ms. Chaouni is furthermore known for having designed a music school in Morocco, empowering 2000 local children through music education programming.

Ms. Chaouni will elaborate on the role of access to information in making cities and communities inclusive, resilient and sustainable.

"Always ask the question you want to put aside: the one you think is too much, too silly, too simple, too brazen. It could get you what you seek."

Neela Banerjee is a Washington, DC-based reporter for Inside Climate News. Before joining ICN, she spent four years as the energy and environmental reporter for the Los Angeles Times' Washington bureau. The 2015 series she co-authored at ICN about Exxon's early climate change research has won more than 10 national journalism awards. ICN's work has now spurred several investigations by state Attorneys General into Exxon.

Ms. Banerjee will present on the value of journalism and media in generating information to tackle climate change.

Mr. Carlos Lopes

"The world of labour is changing fast. As it has happened many times before, there is a fear that technologies will reduce the need for as many people to produce what humans need. One more time, history will prove the doomsayers wrong."

Dr. Lopes is the Executive Secretary of the Economic Commission for Africa at the level of UN Under Secretary-General. He has more than 25 years of senior leadership experience at the United Nations that include serving as Executive Director of the United Nations Institute for Training and Research, Director of the UN System Staff College, Director for Political Affairs in the Executive Office of the Secretary-General, all at the level of Assistant Secretary-General; and UN Resident Coordinator in Zimbabwe and Brazil. Specialized in development and strategic planning, he has been an author or editor for over 22 books and has also taught at various academic institutions. In combination with his longstanding career as a civil servant, Dr. Lopes' personal experiences show how important it is for public access to information for the African continent.

Mr. Rutger Bregman

"The news is, and I'm not exaggerating here, the most common and dangerous addiction in the world."

Mr. Bregman is one of Europe's most prominent young thinkers. The 28-year-old historian and author has published four books on history, philosophy, and economics. His History of Progress was awarded the Belgian Liberales prize for best nonfiction book of 2013. The Dutch edition of Utopia for Realists became a national bestseller and sparked a basic income movement that made international headlines. Mr. Bregman has twice been nominated for the prestigious European Press Prize for his journalism work at De Correspondent. His work has been featured in The Guardian and the Washington Post and on the BBC.

As one of the recognized influential leaders on human rights and development in The Netherlands, Farah Karimi has been constantly fighting for humanity in the world, and for a just world without poverty. She believes that

Ms. Karimi is currently the Executive Director of Oxfam Novib and member of the Executive Board of Oxfam International, but has in the past been a Member of the Lower House of Parliament of The Netherlands for the Green Left, and worked as a consultant for UNDP among others.

THE IPDC: AN INTRODUCTION

The IPDC is the only multilateral forum in the UN system designed to mobilize the international community to discuss and promote media development in developing countries. The Programme promotes an enabling environment for free, pluralistic and independent media and for safety of journalists while supporting concrete media development projects related to this mission.



IPDC

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AREAS OF WORK

- o Supporting and contributing to grassroots media development projects around the globe
- Promoting the safety of journalists and the end of impunity of crimes committed against them globally through monitoring and reporting on the judicial follow-ups of the killings of media professionals world-wide.
- Assessing national media landscapes in order to identify strengths and weaknesses and propose recommendations on how to strengthen press freedom, media pluralism and independence.
- Contributing to improve journalism education in developing countries by proposing curricula and syllabi to journalism schools.
- Serving as a platform for knowledge-driven media development, by collecting data to follow-up on the implementation of SDG Goal 16, Target 10.

IPDC AND THE SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS

The IPDC has been a key actor in ensuring that freedom of expression and media development issues are included into the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Along with partners, it contributed to the drafting of two media-related indicators to support SDG 16 under target 10. Furthermore, the IPDC will contribute to monitoring this target by reporting on progress made on indicator 16.10.1 (safety of journalists) and indicator 16.10.2 (public access to information).

THE INFORMATION FOR ALL PROGRAMME

The Information for All Programme (IFAP) is an intergovernmental programme of UNESCO established in 2001 to provide a platform for international policy discussions and guidelines for action in the area of access to information and knowledge and to support the participation of all in the knowledge societies. IFAP's programme focuses on strategic



priority areas: (i) Information for development; (ii) Information literacy; (iii) Information preservation; (iv) Information ethics and (v) Information accessibility (VI) Multilinguism in Cyberspace. These areas are an important area of contribution to UNESCO's programme of work and other international action plans such as the Plan of Action and Declaration of the World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS). IFAP therefore represents a credible and important response to the challenges of digital divide and attaining the objectives of internationally adopted human development goals.
