The outcomes of the following Regional expert consultations on ethics teaching and bioethics for Central and Eastern Europe (2005, Moscow, Russian Federation) served as a reference point for the development of regional strategies and ethics teaching and provided a framework for practical cooperative actions to promote principles and ethical norms of scientific and technological development and social transformation, also through awareness-raising at the regional level on the UNESCO programme on bioethics. Besides, at this meeting a national discussion on the draft Universal Declaration on bioethics and Human Rights was arranged. The experts' comments were submitted to the International Bioethics Committee (IBC) Drafting Group as a contribution of the Russian federation to the consultation process. The discussion on the UNESCO Universal Declaration on Bioethics and Human Rights, mainly on the realization of the Declaration's principles was continued after its adoption, during the next Moscow **Conference "Social Justice in Healthcare: Bioethics and Human Rights" (2005).** This meeting was aimed to promote a broad social dialogue on health care between the Government and civil society, by giving the general public the possibility to participate and become informed about the necessary reforms. This kind of dialogue is the primary condition for the effectiveness and quality of reforms and social transformation.

2002

The International Conference on Bioethics in Central and Western Europe (2002, Vilnius, Lithuania) demonstrated the need for increased education and information throughout the region. Follow-up the recommendations worked out by the participants of the conference, where the special emphasis was placed on knowledge sharing and information exchange instruments, the UNESCO Moscow cluster office supported the establishment of the **Regional bioethics Information and Education Centre in Vilnius** (2004). Hosted by the Department of medical History and Ethics (medical faculty of Vilnius University) and designed to be a model regional centre, it acts as an information resource for scientists, students and the concerned society in the region. Along with the Vilnius Center, the bioethical electronic discussion forum in Russian www.bioethics.ru was created (2006) as a universal discussion forum and cultural, informational and educational bioethical Internet resource.

HUMAN RIGHTS

European Coalition of Cities against Racism (ECCAR)

The European Coalition of Cities Against Racism (ECCAR) was launched in December 2004 under the auspices of Nuremberg that acted as the Lead City for Europe. This first regional Coalition already has some 67 cities coming from 15 countries in Europe.

The European Coalition held its **first General Conference from 10 to 12 May 2007 in Nuremberg** (See below). The European Commission financially supported the Conference within the context of the EU Year 2007. The conference welcomed 350 participants including the representatives of 125 cities coming from 20 countries, as well as civil society organizations and European organizations. The Conference focused on the question how municipalities and civil society could effectively fight against racism and discrimination and promote people living together with equal opportunities and mutual respect.

On this occasion, there was an election of the new Steering Committee and the following 18 members have been elected: Bologna (Italy), Botkyrka (Sweden), Frankfort (Germany), Galway (Ireland), Gent (Belgium), Graz (Austria), Grenoble (France), Halle an der Saale (Germany), Liège (Belgium), London (UK), Lyon (France), Madrid (Spain), Malmö (Sweden), Nantes (France), Nürnberg (Germany), Potsdam (Germany), St. Petersburg (Russia) and UNESCO.

The Conference was an occasion to establish promising contacts with the major EU institutions, namely with the European Commission, the Council of Europe and the European Network Against Racism, ENAR. SHS follows up the possibility of cooperation discussed with the representatives of these institutions in order to establish closer cooperation with European organizations.

Canadian Coalition of Municipalities against Racism and Discrimination (CMARD)

The Pan-Canadian Working Group led by the Canadian Commission for UNESCO (CCU) with the help of its partners across Canada developed a "Call for a Canadian Municipalities against Racism and Discrimination". The Call was launched at the **Canadian Association of Statutory Human Rights Agencies (CASHRA) Annual Meeting in June 2005 in Saskatoon**. This initiative obtained the support from the Federation of Canadian Municipalities in September 2005, the Union of Municipalities of Quebec and the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association in 2006.

In close cooperation with Human Rights Commissions in the provinces of Ontario, Alberta and Saskatchewan, the Canadian Race Relations Foundation (CRRF), associations of municipalities in different provinces as well as the National Association of Friendship Centres for aboriginal peoples, CMARD continues to extend across Canada.

On June 1, 2007 in Calgary, 13 municipalities from across Canada formed a coalition and signed a declaration against racism and discrimination on the occasion of the Annual General Meeting of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities. David A. Walden, Secretary-General of the Canadian Commission for UNESCO, stated, "These municipalities are leading the country in taking concrete action to create more equitable communities where everyone can participate. They are now part of UNESCO's International Coalition of Cities against Racism and Discrimination."

The 13 municipalities are: Brooks, Alberta; Calgary, Alberta; Drayton Valley, Alberta; Edmonton, Alberta; Gatineau, Quebec; Halifax, Nova Scotia; Lion's Bay, British Columbia; Montreal, Quebec; Oshawa, Ontario; Thunder Bay, Ontario; Toronto, Ontario; Windsor, Ontario; and the Region of Wood Buffalo and Fort McMurray, Alberta.

Within CMARD, a research agenda is developing through a consultative process with partners in order to help build tools to support municipalities' effort in monitoring progress in the fight against racism and discrimination. The Centre de recherche sur l'immigration, l'ethnicité et la citoyenneté (CRIEC) of the University of Quebec in Montreal, has carried out a preliminary study analyzing the indicators used by the big cities of the world, called: "Indicators for the evaluation of municipal politics fighting discrimination". The study examined the possibilities of comparison and the sharing of experiences between policy makers at the local level within the framework of the Coalition. New areas for research will be further explored in 2007-2008 to respond to the needs identified in the consultations.

2004-2005 Two International Conferences on tolerance and the struggle against discrimination and xenophobia in the context of the fight against international terrorism (Caucasus dimension) held respectively in Tbilisi, Georgia in 2004 and in Yerevan, Armenia in 2005 provided a platform for human rights experts to identify adequate security measures to address terrorist threats without compromising the basic freedoms of individuals. The events served as forums to exchange best practices and expertise, and to identify future challenges in the region. The cooperation with the Ombudsman Institution in Armenia within the project was continued by conducting the International Conference in Yerevan (2006), raising the bioethics aspects of the human rights in educational programmes.

2004-2007: HIV and AIDS related stigma and discrimination projects – UNESCO Moscow cluster office project

This project by content addresses four main priorities – human rights, gender, bioethics and HIV. It started in 2004 and contains a number of surveys. The first one was targeted the sensitive issue of pregnancy and HIV-positive women. The goal of the project was to obtain data on the awareness level of HIV-positive women (HPW) in Russia on their reproductive rights in order to define focuses to further promote their active and conscious attitude towards the possibility of safe child-bearing.

The goal of the second survey (2005) was to assess the needs of target groups of the youth organizations (people living with HIV/AIDS – PLWHA, adolescents) in the field of human rights education and awareness-raising, and the reduction of HIV/AIDS-related stigma and discrimination. The survey's results has provided a wide range of information on the matter and shows that stigma and discrimination are still wide-spread while basic information on HIV/AIDS is not available for people at large.

This range was continued by the next two researches conducted in 2006-2007. The first of them provided the analysis of normative instruments for regulating biomedical practices in the context of human rights. It was aimed at assessing the state of biomedical legislation in Russia and contributing to filling gaps in current legislation. The second one was targeted the issue of Human Rights Education (HRE) in the context of HIV and ethical aspects of providing social services to people living with HIV in the Russian Federation, focusing on the state of legislation, regulations, policies.

The results of these surveys were published in the form of report with information materials, sociological data and recommendations that can be used for further elaboration of strategies and trainings aimed at these target groups.

The European Experts meeting on Combating Racism, Discrimination, Xenophobia and Related intolerance in Europe held in Moscow in March 2003 gave a European Dimension to these problems. The meeting was attended by representatives of five countries, the UN Special Rapporteur of the Commission on Human Rights on the Contemporary Forms of Racism, Racial Discrimination, Xenophobia and Related Intolerance (UN, Geneva) and representatives of the European Monitoring Center on Racism and Xenophobia (EU, Vienna). The recommendations worked out by the participants for UNESCO and Member States on how to implement the Durban Declaration and Programme of Action were included in UNESCO's Strategy on the Fight Against Racism and Discrimination adopted in 32nd session of the General Conference of UNESCO.

SOCIAL TRANSFORMATIONS

2003-2007: In 2003 in close cooperation with the Central and Eastern European Network on Migration Research (CEENOM) and national institutions on studies and analyses of migration the UNESCO Moscow cluster Office initiated a project aimed at developing more effective policy on regulating international migration flows, the peaceful integration of migrants in society and improving countries' capacities to tackle negative impact of migration on social development, particularly with regard to the global campaign for the ratification of the UN International Convention on the Protection of the Rights of All Migrant Workers and Members of Their Families.

The project was composed of a series of the international conferences, seminars and publications. It started in 2003 in the Republic of Moldova with the International conference «Migration and the Labour Market in the Countries of Central and Eastern Europe» (2003, Chisinau). The conference was focused on the development of labour migration in the current economic climate, the globalization process and the changing demographic situation in the region. As a follow-up of this international conference the UNESCO Moscow Office in cooperation with the National Commission of the Republic of Moldova for UNESCO organized the seminar "Population of the Republic of Moldova in the Context of International Migration" (2005, Chisinau). An analysis of migration flows of Moldavian population to the CIS and EU was performed with further development of institutional and legislative framework to regulate migration and ensure the repatriation of migrants. Through the elaboration of a National action Plan to reduce illegal migration, the project promoted better management of labor and economic activities, and ensured that best practices and experience acquired by legal labor migrants can be applied back in Moldova. This part of the project resulted in the two-volume publication "Population of the Republic of Moldova in the Context of the International Migration Processes" collected the reports dedicated to the most topical issues of the modern migration processes of the Moldavian population, as well as the statistics and the results of the sociological studies.

Following the recommendations of the participants of the Moldova meeting 2003 to "train the qualified experts in the field of migration policy" the cooperation with CEENOM was continued in 2006-2007 by organizing the training project "Migration as the resource of the social development: positive effect and risks". The project's goal was to expand knowledge of qualified experts in the field of migration policy from CIS on role of migration in the contemporary world (in global and national aspects), on international approach to migration processes management and control and to protection of migrants as well as on possible ways of achieving a greater tolerance and a better prevention of xenophobia and extremism. This two-year activity was composed of preparing and publishing the interdisciplinary educational manual on the methods and the methodology of the study of the migratory processes and organizing the International Summer School "Migration and Discrimination: Protection of Migrants Human Rights and Promotion of Tolerance" (2007, Moscow) on the basis of the above mentioned educational manual.

2007

5-7 February 2007: meeting of the International Convention Against Doping in Sport, Paris

The 41 States Parties to the International Convention Against Doping in Sport met in Paris last February for the first time to discuss implementation of the Voluntary Contribution Fund for the elimination of doping in sport. South Africa and China taken apart, Denmark, Spain, Greece, Luxembourg, Netherlands and Sweden contributed to the Fund (*Source: SHS Views September-November 2006, N°16 p.28*)

March 2007: at this date, 6 countries signed the international Convention against Doping

30-31 October 2006: First "Landscape and Environment" Forum at UNESCO Headquarters in Paris, France.

It was organized to cope with such contemporary challenges. The Seminar was organized with the European Economic and Social Committee, the network European Institute (EUNIC) and the European Older People's Platform (AGE). Under the aegis of the MOST Program, it was the occasion for the panelists to deal with ageing, especially in the North American and Europe region.

15-20 October 2006: in Brussels, Belgium, MOST program organized a meeting to bring officials and civil servants from Latin America (Chile, Ecuador, Colombia and Mexico) to share experiences with European counterparts, such as, South East France (Provence-Alpes-Côte d'Azur region), European Commission's Directorate General for Regional Policy, the Economic and Social Committee, and the Committee of the Regions (CoR).

2006: Chair in Urban Policy to be set in France at the Ecole nationale des travaux publics (ENTP) in Lyon. Chair at the University in Venice linked to the Urban Policy and international migration program, created at the University of Venice in Italy. The Chair carries out interdisciplinary research.

2005

January – June 2005- 20 young people from Montreal North suburb (Canada) participated in a research/action project deriving from the "Growing up in cities" programme of the UNESCO Chair of Cornell University (USA). The Planning Faculty of the University of Montreal, the City of Montreal and local communities bodies were also partners. The aim is to present young perspective on urban design. The work produced an exhibition of drawings, photos, models and plans, which was presented in the district sports stadium and later in a local shopping mall.

Coordination of UNESCO's efforts to fight against extreme poverty

In Europe, UNESCO organized, from 27 February to 2 March 2007, a meeting in Lisbon, Portugal, to report on the Small Grants programme on poverty eradication. The findings of almost 40 researchers from Africa, Latin America and Asia were presented at this international meeting. With recommendations addressed to those who develop and implement public policy, the unanimous view was that the only way to fight poverty is through a human rights-based approach.

The best research, selected by the international advisory committee of UNESCO's programme on poverty, will be published shortly. At the close of this international meeting, the Portuguese Government announced it would be giving three research grants to Portuguese-speaking countries. This comes in addition to the three grants already proposed by the Calouste Gulbenkian Foundation. So in Portuguese-speaking countries the research will continue.

Extra-budgetary programme for the Education of Children in Need

The "Children in Need" programme is entirely funded by private donations to a special account, with the programme chaired by UNESCO Goodwill Ambassador Ms Ute-Henriette Ohoven.

Financed exclusively by donations from the private sector with UNESCO acting as coordinator, the programme was designed in order to receive, analyse and evaluate project proposals from UNESCO's vast network, with funds and partners being mobilized to support the best proposals. In emergency situations (earthquakes, floods, etc.) this programme can intervene within a matter of days. Every year, US \$2 million are collected in order to successfully implement the 20 to 50 projects that are subsequently carried out by local NGOs within periods of 6 months to 3 years.

In Europe and North America, the Programme has implemented 31 projects in 12 countries from 2002 till today, among which the Russian project supervised by UNESCO Moscow Office "Promoting the right to education for children in need in rural areas of the Arkhangelsk Region".

By promoting the right to education for children in need, the project aims at promoting the creation of friendly environment for children and teenagers living in the very poor rural areas of the region, at ensuring their right to quality education taking into account their ethno cultural, confessional and language features, and also, at the developing of the living environment and overcoming of poverty. US\$ 150.000 have been transferred from 2004 to 2006.
