



This is the first "science-based storybook" about the endangered wildlife in Guizhou for children ages 9-15. It can be used as a model to educate children about their local wildlife using their native language.




Fig. 5 Illustrations in the book: ① Guizhou snub-nosed monkey (© K. Ding), ② Chinese giant salamander (© X. Chen), ③ mandarin ducks (© X. Chen), ④ butterfly (© X. Mi), ⑤ Fanjingshan landscape (© D. Chen), and ⑥ Chinese giant salamander cartoon (© Y. Zeng)

The story's central character is a wildlife enthusiast named Xingda. While exploring Fanjingshan, he befriended several scientists and learnt about the biology and threats to many amazing wildlife species.

Four species were highlighted in the book. In addition to the Guizhou snub-nosed monkey, Chinese giant salamander (*Andrias davidianus*), mandarin duck (*Aix galericulata*) and butterflies (*Papilio polytes and other spp. were included also.*


