
- Web traffic is up again after three slower months. With a 23% growth compared to August 2016, almost 7.2 million page views and 3 million visits were reached this month. Compared to same month last year, visits increased by 7% while page views dropped by 4%.
- A peak in traffic was reached as last year on 8 Sept. on the occasion of International Literacy Day, with more than 139,034 visits/day vs 134,451 on 8 Sept. 2015.
- As social media transforms the global conversation and changes the way we stay informed, learn and engage in debates, it becomes an indispensable tool for UNESCO's institutional communications. New creative solutions for digital components of communications strategies are encouraged and spearheaded.
- 5.1 million followers were reached this month on key social media accounts across 6 languages. Consequently, @UNESCO account was listed among the TOP 10 most followed international organizations on Twitter and made its way to the TOP 50 international organizations on Facebook according to the Twiplomacy.org ranking.




- September 2016 figures for the Top 10 online viewing are significantly higher than in August this year (+46%) and much better than in 2015 in the same period (+40%). Figures show a large interest for Spanish titles (57%) even over English (34%).
- The English version of the new flagship publication GEM Report, 2016 represents an amazing 25% of all the views in the Top 10.
- Publications page views on Google Books in September 2016 are stable after 3 slower months for reasons which are not yet clear. Sales in the bookshop and internationally online were mainly on World Heritage.






Major events:

I. Launch of the 2016 Global Education Monitoring Report (06 September)

This year the report was launched at 4 global launch events in Jakarta, Indonesia; Kigali, Rwanda; London, United Kingdom; and Medellín, Colombia. Around 1,000 people attended the events, with over 10,000 watching online. At the end of the month, a high profile event was also held in New York at the United Nations General Assembly. The GEM Report also held its first ever digital youth launch on Google+, watched by over 300 people so far. This brought together a panel of youth advocates from seven countries to discuss how the Report relates to youth.

The four global launch events, and the event in New York at UNGA included high level speakers such as Jeffrey Sachs, Professor, Forest Whitaker, UNESCO Special Envoy for Peace and Reconciliation and SDG Advocate; Gordon Brown, UN Special Envoy for Global Education; Angel Gurría, OECD Secretary-General; Ambassador Marie Chatardova, Vice-President of ECOSOC; Yannick Glemarec, Deputy Executive Director, UN Women, David Nabarro, Special Adviser on the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, H.E. Dr Papias Malimba Musafiri, Minister of Education of the Republic of Rwanda, Vivian Onano, WaterAid America Youth Ambassador and Women Deliver Young Leader, Kevin Watkins, Executive Director of the Overseas Development Institute, Dr Sakena Yacoobi, Chief Executive Officer for Afghan Institute of Learning, Mundiya Kepanga, Indigenous Chief from Tari, Papua New Guinea,



Federico Gutiérrez, Medellín Mayor, Juan Eduardo Garcia Huidobro, Division Chief of General Education, Ministry of Education of Chile; Ana Cecilia Tamayo, Chief Adviser Office of Planning and Finance, Ministry of Education, Republic of Colombia.

In addition to the 4 global launches, 28 regional and national launch events have taken place in September, attracting thousands of participants and worldwide media attention. At least ten press conferences were held, including in London, Brazil, Senegal, Rwanda and Indonesia. Ten Ministers of Education attended events over the course of the month. Seven events were streamed online.

There has been a successful transition from the previously branded GMR to the newly branded GEM Report series. The 2016 GEM Report achieved more media coverage than any previous GMR, with around 1,900 articles recorded so far. The GEM website and online report received a combined total of 95,000 page views over the month, from a combined total of over 30K unique visitors. During the first 7 days after launch, tweets from @GEMReport reached 16.3 million accounts, up from 10.7 million last year and received 256.7 clicks, up from 154.4K clicks last year. The hashtag for the Report (#sdq4all) reached 115 million users in total for the month (46 million for the first week only), down slightly from 56.4 million last year.



Press coverage: Around 1,900 articles were written in the launch month about the 2016 GEM Report. Opinion pieces were sourced in the names of the Director-General of UNESCO, an Indigenous leader from Papua New Guinea, and Aaron Benavot, the director of the Report. Broadcast coverage was extensive and included feature-length packages on channels such as Al Jazeera, BBC, France 24. CNBC and M6. Interviews on the Report ran in other major channels, including Xinhua TV, Russia Today and NDTV, Citizen TV, Atlantic Radio Morocco and SAFM.

Social media: On the day of the launch the GEM Report received 156,541 organic impressions and reached a total of 16,338,634 accounts with 85,967 clicks on Twitter. The hashtag: #sdg4all was used 1,993 times reaching 25.5m accounts. Over the month, the hashtag made over 115m impressions, with over 3.000 people participating. In total for September on Twitter the GEM Report received 789,451 organic impressions with 10,729 engagements and 2,153 new followers, reaching a potential 45,7m accounts. On Facebook 151,031 people were reached.

II. International Meeting on "International Decade for People of African Descent (2015-2024): Ten Years to Take Action" (19 September)




In December 2014, the UN General Assembly, in its Resolution 68/237, proclaimed the International Decade for People of African Descent (2015-2024) under the theme "Recognition, Justice and Development".

This Decade provides an operational framework to encourage Member States to eradicate social injustices inherited from history and to fight against racism, prejudice and racial discrimination to which people of African descent are still subjected. It aims to strengthen actions and measures to ensure the full enjoyment of the economic, social, cultural, civil and political rights of people of African descent, as well as their full and equal participation in society.

The meeting held on 19 September at UNESCO Headquarters was organized in collaboration with the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights and the Frantz Fanon Foundation. The main goal of the event was to raise awareness about the objectives and challenges of the Decade, to share national experiences regarding its activities, and to discuss strategies to improve synergies between key stakeholders.

Some 300 people, including representatives of intergovernmental organizations, UNESCO's regional groups – Mr Jacques Kabale, Africa Group and Mr Marco Tulio Chicas Sosa, Latin America and the Caribbean Group-, the Working Group of Experts on People of African Descent – Mireille Fanon-Mendes-France –, non-governmental organizations, as well as researchers, civil society activists and 26 journalists from international media participated in the meeting. Lilian Thuram, famous French football player and Rokhaya Diallo, well known journalist and activist participated as panelist and moderator.





The key challenge of the Decade is to contribute to improvement by 2024 of the conditions of people of African descent would. To that end, there is an urgent need to revisit public policies and upon lessons learnt, define more appropriate strategies to ensure the full enjoyment by people of African descent of all their human and citizens' rights. The meeting reaffirmed that the Durban Declaration and Programme of Action remain the basis for the implementation of the Decade by the Members States through national policies. The participants also highlighted to necessity for civil society organizations to join their efforts with governmental and professional institutions and to establish fruitful partnership to combat racism and dissemination against people of African descent.

After the one-day meeting the participants proposed the following actions:

- Launch an international/regional competition to select best projects contributing concretly the decade;
- Promote national plans of action;
- Organize periodical meetings at national level to review achievements and to discuss further actions;
- Create an application for smartphone and tablets based on the Agenda for the Decade;
- Use presidential campaign to submit to the candidates the Decade's Programme of activities and objectives and ask them to clearly pronounce themselves on their support to the Decade;
- Plan communication actions: article in major newspaper to explain the Decade; create a Facebook page; organize an event for the media; hire celebrities as spokespersons; establish a network of organizations.

During the meeting a short video for the promotion of the International Decade for People of African Descent produced by UNESCO was presented.

III. International Meeting on the Protection of Underwater Cultural Heritage Sites (22-23 September)

An International Meeting on Underwater Cultural Heritage Sites Protection was held on 22 and 23 September 2016 at UNESCO Headquarters.

The purpose of the meeting was to support the implementation of UNESCO's 2001 Convention on the Protection of the Underwater Cultural Heritage. Participants included State delegations as well as leading underwater archaeology experts. among them James Delgado of the US National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), Ricardo Duarte, of the Eduardo Mondlane University (Mozambique), Michel L'Hour of the Department of Underwater Archaeological Research of France's Ministry of Culture, and underwater archaeologist Michael Pateman from the Bahamas. Organizations such as INTERPOL, NATO and ICOMOS were equally present.



The participants examined questions concerning the monitoring of sites, pillaging and the trade in illegally or unscientifically salvaged cultural artefacts. There were also presentations concerning recent examples of pillage such as the case of the Nuestra Señora de las Mercedes.

Advances in diving equipment have placed underwater remains within the reach of archaeologists and treasure hunters alike and the pillaging of such sites is spreading. While many States have reinforced the protection of their heritage on land, most underwater heritage remains unprotected.

UNESCO's 2001 Convention on the Protection of the Underwater Cultural Heritage has been designed to improve the protection of submerged heritage, in line with what is done on land.

Recommendations were adopted at the end of the meeting, including on the creation of a special police group under the oversee of Interpol, on the introduction of underwater cultural heritage protection in navy operations, on training and on sanctions.

IV. 4th Session of the Subsidiary Committee of the Meeting of States Parties to the 1970 Convention (26-28 September)

The purpose of the Subsidiary Committee is to promote the objectives of the Convention and its efficient implementation among the Member States.

The Secretariat began the 3-day meeting held at UNESCO Headquarters by brief oral reports on previous meetings that are relevant in the area of illicit trafficking of cultural property. This included a report on the joint meeting of Chairpersons of the UNESCO Culture Conventions, an oral report on the synergies between the 1970 and 1954 Conventions and oral reports on the informal reflection group meetings that took place in preparation for the Subsidiary Committee.

Furthermore, the Secretariat gave the Committee an overview of the activities undertaken in the past year to better implement the 1970 Convention. Emphasis was placed on emergency actions particularly in Iraq, Syria and Libya. Details on other activities undertaken were discussed including capacity building and awareness-raising initiatives to effectively fight against the illicit trafficking of cultural property.



In addition, the Committee also gave Member States the opportunity to share their good practices and submit their recommendations on effective ways to implement the Convention.

The Fourth Subsidiary Committee invited experts from various organizations to give informative presentations and opened the floor for useful discussions on various issues pertaining to the illicit trafficking of cultural property. Speakers included representatives from the UN Sanctions Monitoring Team, Council of Europe, Financial Action Task Force and a representative from the International Indian Treaty Council.

20th Session of the Intergovernmental Committee for Promoting the Return of Cultural Property to its Countries of Origin or its Restitution in case of illicit Appropriation (ICPRCP) (29-30 September)

The functions of the ICPRCP essentially comprises of facilitating bilateral negotiations for the return and restitution of cultural property to its countries of origin. The Secretariat opened the meeting with a report on the follow-up Recommendations and Decisions adopted during the 19th Session of the ICPRCP. This included reference to successful cases of return and restitution, such as the case of the Buddha statue between Norway and Myanmar. Furthermore, the return of various significant cultural property to Egypt from both France and the UK was recognized.

The Secretariat gave the Committee a short informative presentation on the correct procedure to submit a case for return and restitution to the Committee. Questions were welcomed and some States proposed submitting new cases to be addressed in the next ICPRCP Session such as the return of the Broken Hill Skull from the United Kingdom to Zambia. One of the main issues discussed was the pending case of the Parthenon Sculptures (Greece vs United Kingdom). There was also a short presentation on the ArThemis Database which was created by the University of Geneva and records cases of return and restitution of cultural objects solved without litigation. The ArThemis database is an open source available to the public. Finally, an example of good practice of return and restitution of the Matisse was demonstrated to the Committee by the director of the Heni Onstad Art Centre, Norway.

Other than discussions regarding cases of return and restitution, the Committee also deliberated two important issues, the regulation of metal detectors and underground scanners, which addressed the importance of archaeological context and the way that metal detectors could have an impact on cultural heritage. As well as free ports in relation to cross border trade and security of global supply chains and the effect it has on illicit trafficking of cultural property.



V. 50th International Literacy Day (8 September) – Main Figures

This year marks the 50th anniversary of International Literacy Day (ILD) celebrated under the banner "Reading the Past, Writing the Future". The main global event took place on 8-9 September 2016 at UNESCO Headquarters, Paris in the form of a two-day global conference including the awarding of the Literacy Prizes, and the launch of the Global Alliance for Literacy (GAL) and the Global Report on Adult Learning and Education.

Focus on UNESCO Liaison Office in New York

To highlight the outreach efforts of Field Offices/Institutes, the report focuses each month since January 2014 on one of them, and publishes the results of their public information activities. For further details, please contact directly the Office/Institute concerned.

Since 1946, the UNESCO Liaison Office in New York (NYO) has been working on maintaining an effective cooperation between UNESCO and the United Nations, its Governing Bodies, the UN Secretariat and the UN Funds and Programmes based in New York. The NYO's core tasks include inter alia institutional representation; information analysis and brokering/interface, developing and building partnerships and advocacy and outreach.

To improve the visibility of the work of the Office and UNESCO's contribution to the work of the UN, NYO developed its website in February 2016. The website has proven to be an efficient and valued tool for communication and outreach. In September 2016, NYO has actively promoted the engagement of UNESCO in the 71st session of the UN General Assembly. In collaboration with UNESCO's Headquarters, NYO organized a number of high level events to promote the priorities of the Organization. Some examples are given below.



18 September - Scientists call for a greater place for science in decision-making

The Scientific Advisory Board of the United Nations Secretary-General presented its summary report to the SG at the UN Headquarters. The report entitled "The Future of Scientific Advice to the United Nations" argues that STI can be a game changer in dealing with nearly all the most pressing global challenges and have a key role to play in accomplishing the 2030 Sustainable Development Goals.




18 September - Connecting all to a better future

The 14th meeting of the Broadband Commission on Sustainable Development took place in New York in the presence of the Co-chairs of the Commission -- HE Mr. Paul Kagame, President of Rwanda and Mr. Carlos Slim, President of the Carlos Slim Foundation. The meeting focused on the vital question of reaching the remaining 1.5 billion and the need for the broadest possible approach to broadband roll-out, connecting health, education and efforts for gender equality.



20 September - Preventing Violent Extremism with Skills, Education & Dialogue

A high level event "Countering and preventing violent extremism through education", was co-organized by UNESCO, Albania, Jordan and the Holy See to discuss the role of education, skills, jobs, freedom of expression and culture as the best responses to tackling violent extremism. The event promoted awareness raising campaigns against hate speech and highlighted the need for social inclusion of children and youth at risk of radicalization.



22 September - Countering destruction and trafficking of cultural property

Ensuring protection of cultural heritage and acting together against destruction and trafficking of cultural property by terrorist and organized crime groups were key topics of the ministerial high-Level meeting jointly organized by UNESCO, INTERPOL, Italy, Jordan and UNODC. The meeting resulted in renewed commitment to scale up response to counter attacks against culture by combining the full range of "soft power" in fight against radicalization.



23 September - Education for people and planet

UNESCO and the Government of France co-hosted a high level roundtable to discuss the key recommendations from the 2016 Global Education Monitoring Report. The GEM Report found that effectively designed civic, peace and sustainability education programmes can ensure more equitable justice systems and help to prevent violence. Speakers also highlighted the need for education itself to transform in order to meet the challenges of our future.




Both a communication and a knowledge management tool, UNESCO's websites, with over 2.7 million pages of content, are today a key component of its public information strategy. Maintained by Corporate Web Services in close collaboration with the Programme Sectors, the main site is updated continually in all 6 UN languages (with some subportals also in Portuguese, Vietnamese, et al). Web traffic shown here (page views, visits, visitors, country and language of visit, etc) has been measured since September 2011 with the free Google Analytics toolset via tags embedded in pages. More detailed statistics on specific programmes can be made available to the responsible officers upon request (contact: v.pham@unesco.org).

With the numerous events held this month, <u>UNESCO Public website</u> saw - as each year in September- a strong increase in traffic. Almost 3 million visits - of which 65% new visitors-, and 7.2 million page views were registered. Visits rose by 23% compared to the slower month of August, and by 7% compared to the same month last year.

A peak in traffic was registered on 8 September, notably with the high number of visits for International Literacy Day (ILD) pages. <u>International Literacy Day (ILD) 2016 dedicated page in Spanish</u> was the third most visited page this month after our homepage, and the World Heritage List in English; its <u>English version</u> ranked at the seventh position after our homepage in Spanish, the World Heritage homepage and UNESCO Careers in English.





Traffic indicators explained:

¹ Page views: The page view is the most widely used indicator to reflect the level of traffic to a website. A page view is counted when the page requested by the user is loaded into the internet browser. Note: Page views are very different from the outdated concept of 'hits'. A 'hit' is counted for each of the many elements in a Web page (i.e. image, animation or video are all counted as separate 'hits', while a page view counts all elements on a page as one page view).

² Visits (or sessions): A visit is defined as a series of page requests from the same uniquely identified client with a time of no more than 30 minutes between each page request.

³ Visitors: A visitor counts once within the timescale of 30 minutes. A visitor can make multiple visits. Identification is made to the visitor's computer, not the person, usually via cookie and/or IP+User Agent. Thus the same person visiting from two different computers will count as two Visitors.





2.2. Statistics on articles referring to UNESCO

This graph shows the number of articles monitored in all media sources, in which "UNESCO" appeared in the story in September (Source: CISION)



More than 60,000 articles mentioning UNESCO were monitored worldwide in September. Chief among the most covered events was the release of the <u>2016 Global Education Monitoring Report</u> on 6 September with nearly 2,000 articles published. Coverage of the GEM Report peaked on the 7th, but there was enough reserve interest in the story to create a tail of an additional one to two days. Immediately following, International Literacy Day (8 Sept.) received, as well, extensive coverage with more than 1,100 articles, which also reference figures taken from the GEM Report.

Another peak in articles occurred at the end of the month (27 Sept.) with the sentencing by the International Criminal Court (ICC) of Ahmad al-Faqi al-Mahdi, for his role in the destruction of cultural heritage in Timbuktu, Mali. On this occasion, the role and the actions of UNESCO for the preservation of cultural heritage were mentioned.



3. UNESCO Social Media Channels

In September 2016, UNESCO acquired a total of 5.1 million followers on key accounts across 6 languages, showing a 38% increase compared to September 2015. Twitter represent almost half of our total followers. Our English account is still maintaining an impressive growth, with 740,000 new followers since January 2016. Consequently, @UNESCO account was listed among the Top 10 most followed international organizations on Twitter and made its way to the list of Top 50 international organizations on Facebook according to the Twiplomacy.org ranking. Twiplomacy is the leading global study of world leaders/international organizations on social media, which aims to identify the extent to which world leaders/organizations use social media and implement digital diplomacy in their communication efforts. Twiplomacy's study on the use of social media in China has concluded that UNESCO account - @SinaWeibo - is the second most followed account among international organizations.

As social media transforms the global conversation and changes the way we stay informed, learn and engage in debates, it becomes an indispensable tool for UNESCO's institutional communications. New creative solutions for digital components of communications strategies are encouraged and spearheaded. This month, DPI social media team together with the GEM team used Facebook Live as an alternative to live webcast for the launch of the 2016 Global Education Monitoring Report (6 Sept.). This tool offered the opportunity to engage with our audience live, respond to their questions and provide background materials. The initiative turned up to be a success, with 504,691 reach and 10,635 views, compared to the 64 simultaneous connections for last year's webcast.

The social media campaign #50ILD for International Literacy Day was another highlight of the month, with strong engagement on Twitter in English and Spanish (see top 10 posts next page). Education sector together with DPI social media team worked on visual templates in order to give the same look and feel to all 50th Anniversary of Literacy Day messages posted across UNESCO official channels – with various interesting and informative materials on the subject DPI was covering the celebration of the Day live via Twitter accounts and Periscope. Twitter helped generate significant visibility to the celebration. Retweets and tweets by other UN Agencies, Delegates, Diplomats and Stakeholders helped to drive traffic and interest.







3.4. Content shared by UNESCO on Wikimedia

Wikipedia and other Wikimedia projects receive 15 to 20 billion page views per month from 500 million visitors in 285 languages. The websites are created by tens of thousands of volunteers working together with the aim of bringing free educational content to the world. As part of UNESCO's Open Access Policy it began to share content on Wikimedia projects in December 2014 to increase UNESCO's visibility and share educational content. UNESCO has uploaded around 1,000 media files to Wikimedia including photographs, videos and illustrations and made them available under a Creative Commons Attribution ShareAlike IGO 3.0 license. The number of Wikipedia articles using UNESCO content has been growing over the past year and are now being used on 40 different language Wikipedias.

In September 2016 UNESCO content received over 897,000 page views, more than 3 times as many as last year during the same period. In total, since September 2015, UNESCO content received 7.3 million page views on Wikipedia. It is expected the usage and viewing figures of UNESCO content on Wikimedia projects will increase significantly as larger volumes of content will be added in the coming months.

Descriptions of the MAB Biosphere Reserves - made available in June 2016 under the same Creative Commons Attribution ShareAlike IGO 3.0 license and used by Wikimedia volunteers to create 69 new Biosphere Reserve English Wikipedia pagesreceived over 13,000 page views in September 2016.

In September Unite4Heritage promoted **Wiki Loves Monuments**, a built heritage photography competition organized by Wikimedia volunteers. Wiki Loves Monuments is the largest photography competition in the world and has produced 320,000 open access images in 2015 (1.4 million photos over the past 4 years). Wiki Loves Monuments supports the goals of Unite4Heritage through:

- Encouraging people to explore built heritage in their local communities and share images of it online.
- Supporting the creation of very high quality open access photographs that are free for everyone to reuse.
- Spreading the Unite4Heritage message to a larger audience through Wikimedia.

Social media promotion on UNESCO Facebook, Twitter and Instagram accounts (in all languages) used both #Unite4Heritage and #WikiLovesMonuments hashtags, as well as winning images from previous Wiki Loves Monuments competitions.

Impact:

- Unite4Heritage was featured on UNESCO social media accounts for most days in September.
- UNESCO messages were shared widely by Wikimedia groups and individuals on social media bringing Unite4Heritage to a new audience.
- Unite4Heritage was featured on the front page of the Wikimedia blog and Wiki Loves Monument blog.
- UN Twitter account with its 7.68M followers tweeted about the project twice and retweeted UNESCO once.
- The project was added to the UN weekly DPI Heads Up bulletin.
- The project was featured on the Unite4Heritage website.
- 3,700 users clicked on the "UNESCO" link to enter the competition, this was most popular in the US, France and Italy.

Reach across social media platforms

- Twitter: tweets got 575,500 impressions. The 6 most popular Wiki Loves Monuments tweets were by UN and UNESCO.
- Instagram: posts got 875,600 impressions and 58,800 likes. The 3 most popular Wiki Loves Monuments posts were by UNESCO.
- Facebook: posts reached 300,300 people and got 5,112 likes.

Competition outcomes

 During the 2016 competition 10,648 participants produced over 270,000 open access photographs of built heritage sites in 43 countries. The winning photographs for each country will be announced on the 31 October 2016.

4. UNESCO Photobank (under construction, N/A for September)

The UNESCO online repository of photos offers over 25 000 photos for free download. Subject matter spans all areas of activity of the Organization, including events at Headquarters and in the different regions of the World. Separate photobanks in the sectors are not tracked but also get significant downloads.

The **UNESDOC** database -managed by KMI/MSA Knowledge-Sharing & Open Access Unit - contains the full text and bibliographic records of documents and publications published by UNESCO since 1945 as well as bibliographic records of library acquisitions. These documents and publications are produced by UNESCO Headquarters, UNESCO Offices and Institutes and cover all areas of its activities: education, natural sciences, social and human sciences, culture, communication and information. An application has been specially developed for conducting the statistical consultation of electronic files (PDFs) from 1 January 2006.


In September 2016, there were **154 194** records available online in PDF format (**153 672** in August 2016), including documents, publications, communication material and other working documents.






The UNESCO Library collections offer an overview of the Organization's current and past activities and programmes as recorded in print publications and other resources.


'UNESCO publications' cover the output of the programmes of the Organization and feature in the biennial Publications Plan. They are produced in a variety of formats (books, CD-ROMs, ebooks, etc.) and are classified into different categories (global and regional reports, monographs, reviews, technical studies, atlases, etc.). They are distributed for free via UNESCO's networks and on-line, or as sales products under the 'UNESCO Publishing' imprint.

The September 2016 figures for the Top 10 online viewing are significantly higher than in August this year (+46%) and much better than in 2015 in the same period (+40%). The figures show a large interest for Spanish titles (57%) even over English (34%). The English version of the new flagship publication <u>GEM Report, 2016</u> represents an amazing 25% of all the views in the Top 10. Publications page views on Google Books in September 2016 are stable after 3 slower months for reasons which are not yet clear. Sales in the bookshop and internationally online were mainly on World Heritage.







9.1. Patronage

Patronage is UNESCO's most prestigious form of moral support. It is granted to demonstrate UNESCO's endorsement of an activity organized under the responsibility of an external organization. UNESCO's patronage is granted to a range of activities, such as cinematographic and audiovisual productions, publications, meetings, conferences and cultural performances, award ceremonies, as well as a range of other events of regional and international scale. Information on patronage requests and their follow-up is recorded in a central database managed by ERI/DPI/PBM. The database is updated daily and shared with the focal points for UNESCO name and logo use of each Sector.

10. Media and Communication Partnerships

UNESCO has partnership agreements with the media, such as newspaper companies (Asahi Shimbun / Japan, Dong-A Daily and The Chosun Ilbo / Korea) and TV networks (TBS / Japan).
