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UNESCO'S STATEMENTS

- "This session will examine the state of the art in the area of culture-induced economic growth and cultural employment"
- "A country's GDP does not automatically trickle down to the poor and reduce poverty."



GOVERNMENT'S OPTIONS

- Implement policies that "tax the rich and feed the poor"!
- Implement policies that help the poor to help themselves:
 - Education
 - Culture and Creative Industries



AREAS OF WIPO WORK THAT RELATES TO CULTURE

- Culture and Creative Industries
- Traditional Knowledge (TK) and Traditional Cultural Expression (TCE)



TK and TCEs

- TK and TCEs are cultural and economic assets.
- Indigenous people rely on these assets.
- These assets are unprotected in the IP sense
- WIPO's activities include the promotion and protection of TK, TCEs as IP (while recognizing UNESCO's role in safeguarding and preserving).



TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE: CULTURE

- Creative Industries Focus:
 - Encourage developing countries to use the copyright system (IP) to exploit the economic potential of their culture.
 - Ensure that participating developing countries take responsibility for producing practical and measurable results from technical assistance inputs.



CHALLENGES FOR CULTURE

- Digital Technology creation, distribution, reproduction
- Global market place, national laws
- Tendency for users to disregard copyright protection restrictions
- "The crisis of copyright concerns essentially the question of the financing of culture in the 21st Century" – WIPO Director General



WIPO's MANDATE & MISSION

Mandate

To promote the protection of intellectual property throughout the world

Mission

The promotion of innovation and creativity for the economic, social and cultural development of all countries, through a balanced and effective international intellectual property system.



CULTURAL POLICY STATEMENT

- "Copyright policy is like two sides of a coin, Just as economic value is created when two different sides of a coin exist, copyright policy can provide cultural value to society only when it has dual aspects of rights protection and facilitation of the use of works." – Minister of Culture, Sports and Tourism, Republic of Korea September 2012
- Creation, Protection, Utilization



CULTURAL POLICY STATEMENT

"To establish an infrastructure which will facilitate the development of the economic potential of the cultural sector, promoting cultural industries and entrepreneurship and emphasizing the importance of intellectual property." – National Cultural Policy for Barbados 2010



THAILAND

- Comprehensive creative industries strategy adopted in 2009.
- Established a National committee on Creative Industries, chaired by the Prime Minister.
- Allotted 20 million Baht for implementing the strategy.
- Target increase contribution of the creative sector from 12% to 20% of the GDP within the next three years.
