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Introduction to the Programme





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Why?

- Rapid ratification (178 States to date), but:
 - Key concepts of the Convention not clear
 - The **opportunities** for ICH safeguarding and State **obligations** under the Convention are not clear
 - Communities and other stakeholders dispersed, **not connected**
 - New needs for capacity building arise as implementation advances, i.e. sustainable development; gender, monitoring (ORF)



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Goal



- Create **institutional and professional environments for ICH safeguarding** and harnessing its potential for **sustainable development**
- Promote broad **public knowledge and support** for the Convention's concepts and objectives

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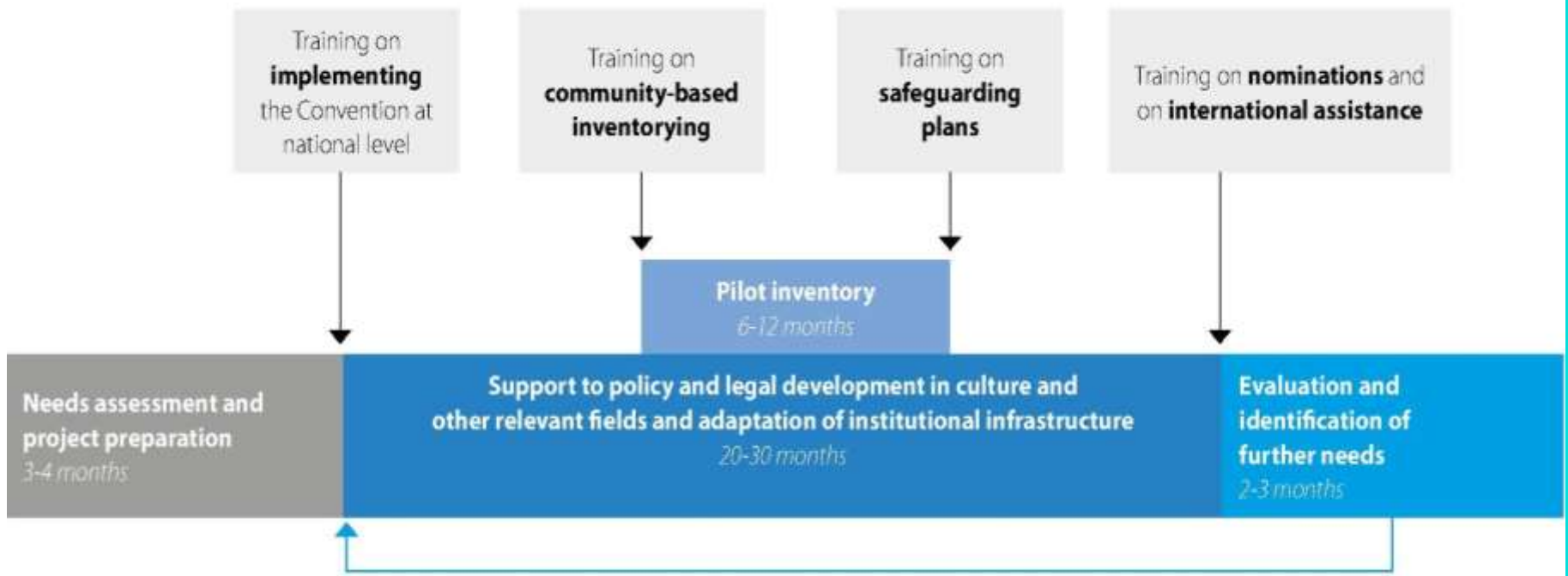

- Improved policies and strategies for safeguarding in relevant policy areas
- Improved infrastructure for safeguarding and strengthened human resources
- Availability of community-based inventorying and safeguarding methodology

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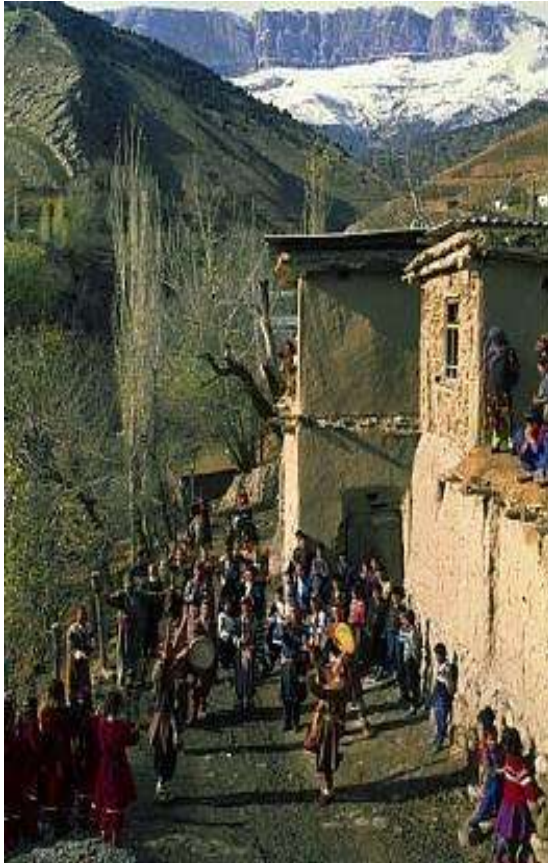

Initially 65 experts trained from all regions
25 % from Africa, 40% women

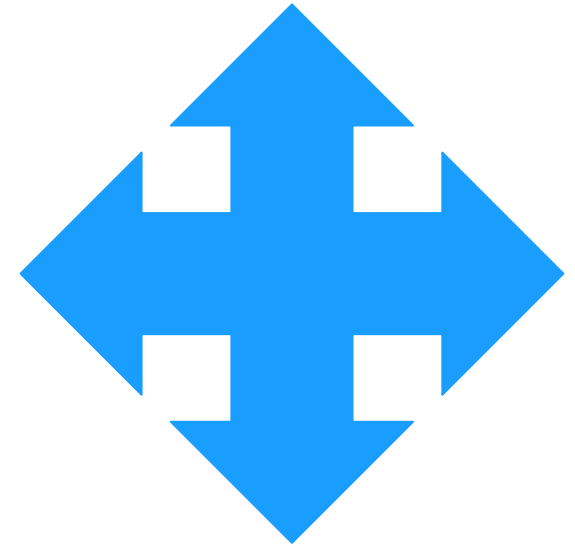

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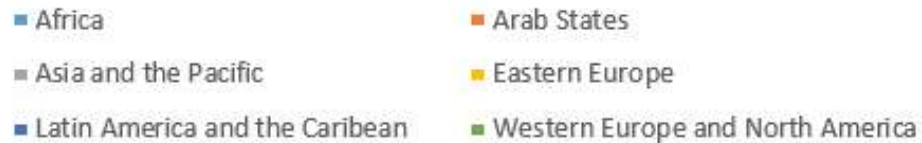
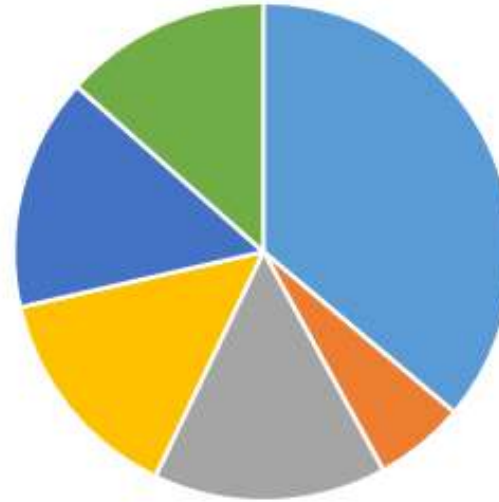
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The network today

- 35% from Africa and 49% are women

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- Started as trainer to deliver on specific themes by adapting content and pedagogy
- Broadened to also include needs assessment, advisory services and pilot activities
- Today agents for implementing the Convention



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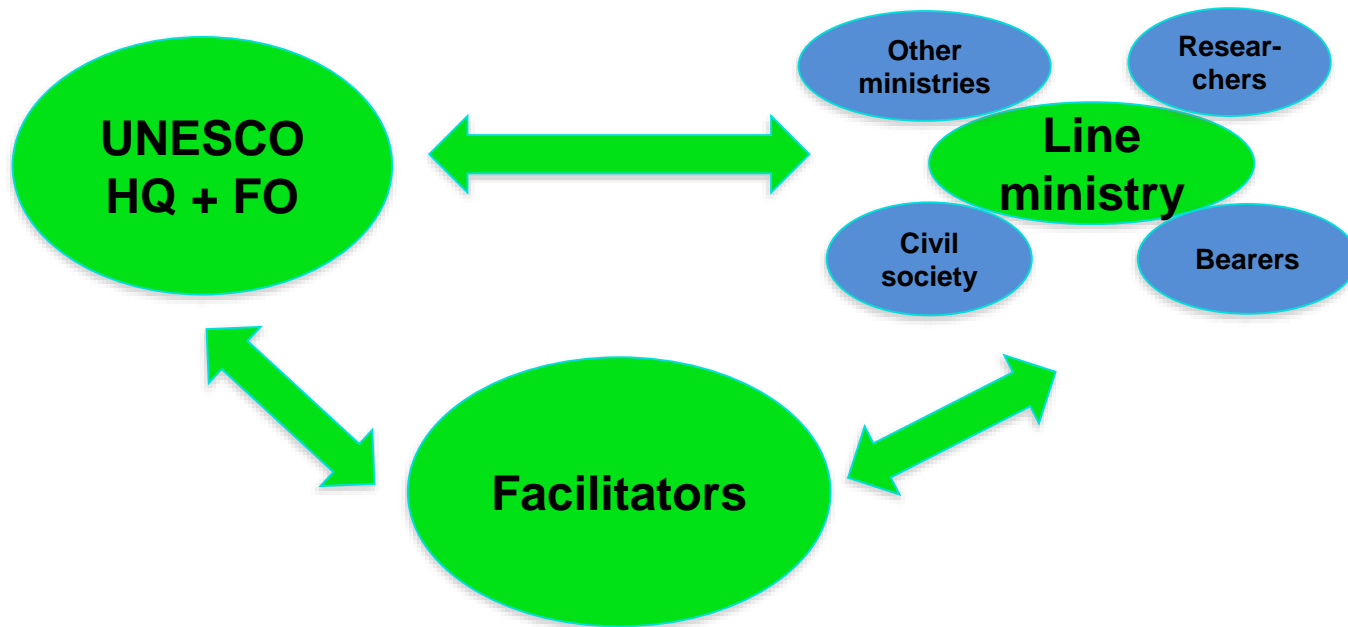

Priority 1

Strengthening capacities to safeguard intangible cultural heritage and contribute to sustainable development



Priority 2

Safeguarding intangible cultural heritage in formal and non-formal education





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CAP to be continued with strategic reorientation

- New focus on building national networks of trainers
- Stronger partnerships with relevant institutions at national level
- Implementing “new” topics (gender, sustainable development, ...)
- Developing CAP for emerging priorities (periodic reporting, INV in cities, emergencies, ...)
