PERIODIC REPORTING FOR WELL PLANNED HERITAGE PRESERVATION

Background

The twenty-ninth General Conference of UNESCO, held in 1997, decided to activate Article 29 of the World Heritage Convention concerning the submission of periodic reports on the state of implementation of the World Heritage Convention (Section I) and the State of Conservation of World Heritage properties (Section II). The national authorities are invited to report on Section I, while Section II shall be prepared for each property inscribed on the World Heritage list by the person(s) directly in charge of the property's management.

The periodic reports prepared by the States Parties will serve a three-fold purpose:

- * to assess the current state of all World Heritage related issues in a State Party,
- * to help focus the Committee's as well as the State Party's future activities and funds,
- to strengthen sub-regional and regional co-operation between States Parties.

The Periodic Reporting Questionnaire

In 1998, at its twenty-second session, the World Heritage Committee approved Explanatory Notes, designed to be read in conjunction with the Periodic Reporting Format, in order to outline the information expected to flow from the periodic reporting exercise. To facilitate the preparation of the report, a Questionnaire was developed that the States Parties are encouraged to use. It closely follows the subjects referred to in the Explanatory Notes, but in contrast to the latter splits the subjects up into short questions to be answered in a few sentences or paragraphs. A second type of question requires the indication of YES or NO by circling or underlining the appropriate answer. All questions are clearly identified with a little number in the right hand column of the Questionnaire. To make the reporting results meaningful every one of these questions has to be answered. If no answer is possible, the reasons should be given. If the available space is not sufficient for the answer, the response should be continued on a separate sheet of paper, clearly indicating the number of the question the text refers to (e.g. 006).

Benefits for the States Parties

The Questionnaire was developed in such a way as to allow to extract and compile or compare relevant information from different States Parties or properties, facilitating the process of preparing the regional synthesis report to be presented to the World Heritage Committee. The YES / NO questions make it possible to evaluate the reports quantitatively, but only the details that should be supplied in the related 'open question' make the answers meaningful and can be the basis for concerted actions to preserve a State Party's most valuable heritage for its transmission to future generations.

The information collected in this way will help the States Parties to assess their own strengths and weaknesses concerning the implementation of the World Heritage Convention, putting them in a position to (re)define policies and to request assistance in order to finance projects and / or training. On the other hand it allows the World Heritage Committee to collect information needed to devise Regional Action Plans, give well-informed advice to States Parties and to focus funds as well as attention on the region(s), States Parties and / or properties that need the collective support of the international community.

The preparation process of the regional periodic report will furthermore enhance regional cooperation through information meetings as well as through the better availability of regularly up-dated information on activities as well as contact addresses etc. The identification of the State Party's strengths makes it possible to exchange experiences and look for solutions to problems (e.g. of site conservation) within the region.

Conclusion

Periodic Reporting is a participatory exercise, aiming to collect information on World Heritage related issues on a national as well as on the property level. The individual State Party reports will be collated into a regional synthesis report to be presented to the World Heritage Committee. This information will enhance cooperation between the Committee and the States Parties and allow to focus funds and activities more efficiently, allowing the States Parties to protect their most valuable heritage more effectively for transmission to future generations.

specific values are that distinguish the property as well as what its relationship with its setting is, etc.: The universal value of the Gunung Mulu World Heritage site lies in its fulfillment of all the four criteria required for inscription. It is an outstanding example representing major stages of earth's history, on-going ecological and biological process, area of exceptional natural beauty and significant natural habitat for in-situ conservation of biological diversity. Its geological feature reflects the history of the region over the past 100 million years. The range of scil, rock and altitude zone has ensured a high diversity of flora in the 17 vegetation types represented. Its caves contain some of the most spectacular formations while Deer Cave and Sarawak Chamber are superlative for their sheer size. The site's outstanding biological diversity is well represented by the existence of a wide range of flora and fauna resources, some of which are endemic to the area. Boundaries

Gunung Mulu National Parks limits is not ideal as full catchments protection is lacking (very important for some of the caves) and very important caves in the adjacent Gunung Buda area are not included in the site. Fortunately, the State Government of Sarawak has recognized these deficiencies and the nomination document provides a map indicating several extensions awaiting Ministerial approval. An additional 25,000ha. will eventually be added. Certainly the Gunung Buda area has substantial values and should be eventually incorporated into the site (particularly as it is currently being over harvested by swiftlet nest collectors). These extensions will greatly contribute to integrity of the park.

Gunung Mulu National Parks also adjoins the Labi Forest Reserve in Brunei. This reserve contains extensive undisturbed lowland forest and effectively complements Gunung Mulu National Parks by adding to it s integrity and habitat connectivity. IUCN suggest high-level discussion between the Governments of Sarawak and Brunei on it future co-operative protection of the two adjoining site.

Management

Gunung Mulu National Parks has had two management plans prepared and a third is now in process (due September 2000). Implementation has been effective with a park headquarters field station and a good system of trails and access to four 'show caves'. One constraint is adequate staffing. Currently there is only an acting park director and the level of staffing (47 people) and range of expertise compares unfavorably with Kinabalu in Sabah. Relate to this constraint is the proposal to contract the management of the park out to a private body. Provision for concession management is made in Sarawak's 1998 Parks Act and, if structured properly, could result in a more effective management regime. The new management plan will contain details of the new arrangements.

In terms of legislation and institutional structures, national park are defined as a concurrent function under the Malaysian constitution. Both state and federal levels of government have powers to pass legislation provided there is a consultation. In Sarawak, national parks including Gunung Mulu are established and managed at the State level under the new Ordinance pass in 1998. Malaysia,s national park act does not apply to Sarawak (or Sabah) and it is thus the individual states that will carry the prime responsibility for the implementing the convention in Malaysia (as in the case in other federal system).

Threats

Local Penan and Berawan peoples were given privileges to hunt pig and deer in the park when it was gazetted. As much of the traditional nomadic hunting area outside the park has been affected by logging, hunting pressure on the park has intensified especially on larger animals such as pig, primates and hornbill. Gunung Mulu National Parks has been intensively hunted over the past decade and a wildlife census is needed to determine sustainability levels.

A second serious threat comes from logging, which is occurring around the park. Most of the forests have been cut up to the boundary rivers. Growing erosion has increased the silt-load of these rivers significantly altering the aquatic ecology. Further away from the park, the conversion of the natural forests to oil palm plantation is inevirably leading to habitat loss for cave swiftlets and bats. These species are known to forage for insect beyond a 25km radius from their nesting sites. IUCN suggest that clear felling to create palm estates not be permitted within this distance from the Gunung Mulu National Parks boundary.
