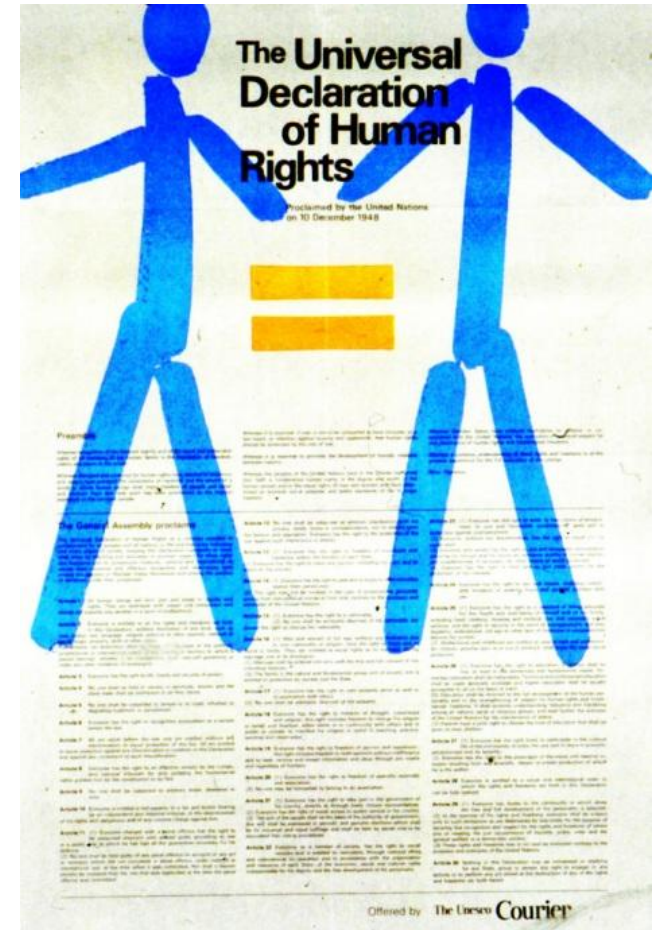
UNESCO's mandate

Contribute to **peace and security** by promoting collaboration among the nations through education, science and culture in order to further **universal respect** for **justice**, for the **rule of law** and for **human rights** and **fundamental freedoms** which are affirmed for the peoples of the world, without **distinction**, **race**, **sex**, **language** or **religion**

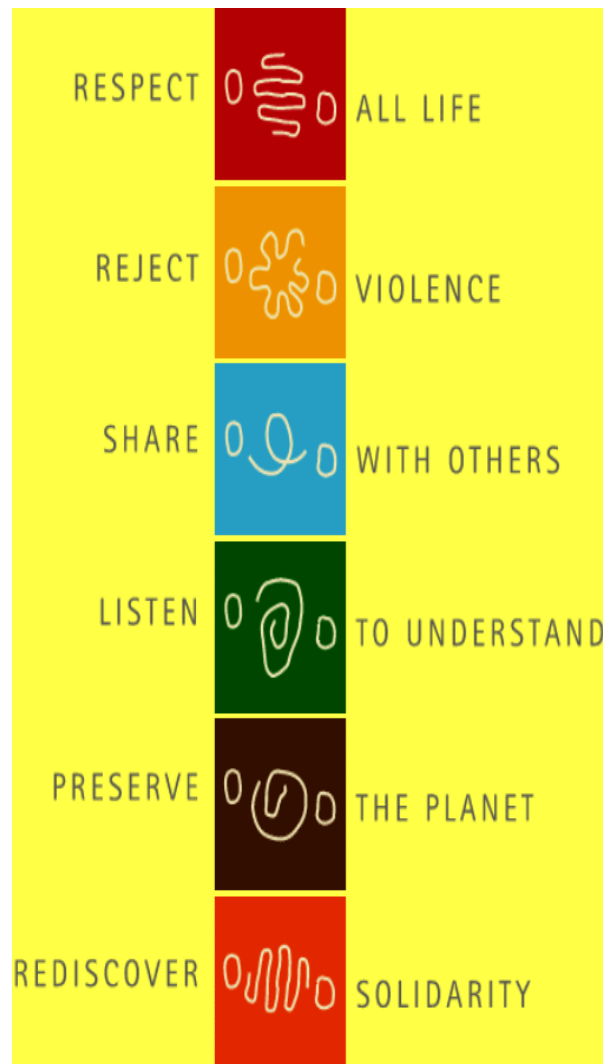


UNESCO's mission

- **Promotion of peace through education** is at the heart of UNESCO's mission
- **Development of comprehensive systems of education** that embrace the **values of human rights, intercultural understanding and tolerance.**
- Education for peace and non-violence promotes relevant **knowledge, skills, attitudes and behaviours**



Culture of Peace



- As defined by the United Nations, the Culture of Peace is a set of **values, attitudes, modes of behaviour** and **ways of life** that rejects violence and prevents conflicts by tackling their root causes to solve problems through dialogue and negotiation among individuals, groups and nations
- **Peace** and the pressing need to create and maintain conditions for the preservation and promotion of lasting **collective peace and security**, which are prerequisites for and the ultimate goals of development
- **Everyday Peace** to be conceived as an **everyday living** experience, not only in periods of conflict, but also in **ordinary times**

Education for Peace and Conflict Prevention

- promote non-discrimination and inclusion
- provide a safe environment free from violence or fear
- relevant for the needs of the learner and to the context
- equip learners with skills to make informed decisions
- share common values of mutual respect
- equip learners to be active global citizens promoting peace and human rights worldwide



What is needed...

- Establish national frameworks for education as an important means of enhancing national cohesion and peaceful coexistence
- Integrate peace education into policy and programming and the curriculum
- Increase number of governments that also recognize the importance of education for peace integrated in their national education plans
- Empower learners with the necessary knowledge and skills to face local and global challenges, and to become responsible citizens participating in the building of a just, peaceful and sustainable future

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Education for Peace: ADEA ICQN

- Deliberate policy and institutional response to conflict.
- Strategically it implies setting up a friendly environment within which learning can be carried out.
- The use of education to achieve peace in society.
- It brings to the fore the social purposes of Peace Education, which prepares learners to acquire peace-building competencies (ICQN, 2012)
