Built in the late 12 th - early 13 th century, the tower is built of marble, red and buff sandstone, and has alternate angular and semi –circular flutings at its first storey. The upper storeys have either angular or semi-circular flutings or plain surface. The surrounding archaeological area contains funerary buildings like magnificent Alai–Darwaza, a masterpiece of Indio-Islamic architecture, the Quwwatul- Islam mosque, the earliest extant mosque in India built of materials reused from twenty-seven Brahmanical and Jain temples, with an inscribed iron pillar dateable to circa 5 th cent. AD fixed in the centre of the courtyard, Alaud-din's College and Tomb and Alai Minar.

In view of the damage caused to the Qutb Minar by lightening and earthquakes, coupled with increasing atmospheric pollution in the past half-century, it is not surprising that the minaret should have been the subject of periodical restoration and reconstruction work. The authenticity of many of the existing facing stones is not great in terms of age; however, replacement has been carried out with scrupulous attention to accuracy in techniques, tools and materials, as studied by an ICOMOS expert while the work was in progress. The remaining monuments within the complex do not suffer from the same stresses as the minaret and restoration work on them has been minimal, so that the level of authenticity is high.

The Qutb Archaeological Area & its buffer zone is monitored as per the provisions laid under the Ancient Monument and Archaeological Site and Remains Act 1958, Rules 1959 and Amendment Rules, 1992 by the Archaeological Survey of India. Besides above, other organizations such as Delhi Development Authority, Municipal Development Corporation, Police and locals bodies are approached, as per need for maintaining the values of the property. The Church Colony which has come up on the south-west of the complex unauthorizedly on the Govt. land may be relocated elsewhere and the area developed as green. The Archaeological Survey of India has already initiated action to remove the encroachments. The main area which may require legal or administrative actions relates to unauthorized constructions in the prohibited and regulated zones.	

Conservation

Make reference to all major interventions at the property and describe its present state of conservation:

The Qutb Minar has constantly been the subject of conservation, restoration and maintenance since it was built in the early 13th century. In addition to restoration done in the 14th century after lightening, it was also repaired between 1805 and 1828, following major earth quake damages in 1803. In 1920, the facing stones of the Qutb Minar necessitated repairs. Major structural work was also carried out in 1944-49 to deal with similar problems. The foundations were strengthened by grouting in 1971-72. Further work was being carried out since 1989-92 to replace crumbled facing stone blocks after strengthening the core masonry.

As with all the monuments under the care of the Archaeological Survey of India, there is a regular annual monitoring and maintenance programme, combined with programme for special conservation. Regular maintenance and restoration work is a regular feature carried out. The open area around the monument is maintained green by the Horticulture Branch of the Archaeological Survey of India.

The property is in good state of preservation. No interventions have occured in the integrity and values of the property because conservation works are planned keeping in view the original character of the monument.

the visitors. Beside contact programmes for school & college students are organized. On the World Heritage Day and 19th November of every year i.e. the first day of the World Heritage Week, the entry to the monument remains free.

Conducted tours of the school children are organized regularly and the groups are taken around the monument under the guidance of an expert having knowledge on architecture, archaeology, conservation and management of the World Heritage monument. The students are informed the cultural value of the monument and also the way Archaeological Survey of India conserves and maintains the monuments maintaining its original character and value. Even the archaeologists and experts on conservation give lectures to the college and school students on special invitation.

What role does World Heritage inscription play for the site concerning the visitor number, the research programmes and/or the awareness building activities?

It creates curiosity among the visitors and research scholars to analyze values of the World Heritage Monuments viz a-viz other monuments and ignites spark to know more about the World Heritage sites and monuments, in the world. The inscription makes the monument popular at national and international levels amongst the visitors.

a. Development Pressures: The impact of commercialization/ urbanization is reflected in the form of constructions in the buffer zone. But effective steps by the Archaeological Survey of India as per the provisions laid under Ancient Monument and Archaeological Site and Remains Act, 1958, Rules, 1959 and Amendment Rules, 1992 have yielded positive results and development activities are under total check since 1992.

- b. Environmental Pressures: The vehicular pollution darkens the stone surface of the monuments. The pollution level, however, has reduced considerably after introduction of Compressed Natural Gas driven vehicles in Delhi since 2002.
- c. <u>Natural disaster and preparedness:</u> Lightening conductors have been provided at the monuments. There is no threat from floods and fire at the site.
- d. <u>Visitor/ tourist pressure:</u> Although a large number of visitors visit the Qutb complex every day but the area of the site is large enough to accommodate them.

facing stones is not great in terms of age; however, replacement has been carried out with scrupulous attention to accuracy in techniques, tools and materials, as studied by an ICOMOS expert while the work was in progress. The remaining monuments within the complex do not suffer from the same stresses as the minaret and restoration work on them has been minimal, so that the level of authenticity is high.












LAYOUT OF MONUMENTS IN AREA AROUND QUTUB MINAR




Sketch of ENTRANCE DOORWAY differentiating the Original work re-placed in 1828 and the modern repair supplementing it.




DETAIL OF THE IRON PILLAR AT QTAB

The Qutb Minar has constantly been the subject of conservation, restoration and maintenance since it was built in the early 13th century. In addition to restoration done in the 14th century after lightening, it was also repaired between 1805 and 1828, following major earth quake damages in 1803. In 1920, the facing stones of the Qutb Minar necessitated repairs. Major structural work was also carried out in 1944-49 to deal with similar problems. The foundations were strengthened by grouting in 1971-72. Further work was being carried out since 1989-92 to replace crumbled facing stone blocks after strengthening the core masonry.

As with all the monuments under the care of the Archaeological Survey of India, there is a regular annual monitoring and maintenance programme, combined with programme for special conservation. Regular maintenance and restoration work is a regular feature carried out. The open area around the monument is maintained green by the Horticulture Branch of the Archaeological Survey of India.

The property is in good state of preservation. No interventions have occured in the integrity and values of the property because conservation works are planned keeping in view the original character of the monument.


