These coordinating bodies chaired by the Secretary General (Technical committee) and the Minister of Education (Steering Committee) set the policy framework and direction for the LLL agenda for the nation. In addition, a dedicated Chapter on LLL or ALE is also included in the recently launched Malaysia Education Blueprint 2015-2025 (Higher Education). The focus on LLL and ALE is also included in the 11th Malaysia Plan (2016-2020). Thus, LLL and ALE are both given prominent coverage on Malaysia Blueprints and Plans.

APEL provides an opportunity for individual with working experience but lack of formal academic qualifications to pursue their studies in Higher Education Institutions (HEIs). In general, knowledge obtained through formal education and working experience will be both assessed in APEL's assessment. At the moment, APEL in Malaysia can only be use as entry requirement to HEIs for the following the following level of qualification; 1. Level 3 MQF (Certificate); 2. Level 4 MQA (Diploma); 3. Level 6 (Bachelors degree); and 4. Level 7 (Master).
