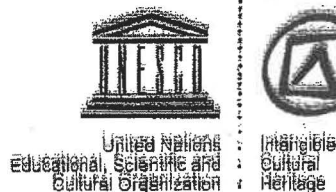

New Future Foundation is a multi-ethnic multi-cultural organization serving children, youth, and young professionals with educational, recreational and cultural programs, and has since expanded into economic social development and health.

New Future Foundation believes that all people (regardless of race, class, age, sexual orientation, religion, or educational background) have the right to participate in opportunities which ensure everyone has access to a bright new future and the joy that comes with change.

The NGO aims to empower our communities and neighbors, encourage each other to make a change, inspire those around us to try something new through educational enhancement courses, GED subsidization, and cultural outreach programs for youth, adults;

and their families. New Future Foundation is reinventing itself to better serve the needs of those in the Greater New York area, today. While we still feel international endeavors are important, we recognize that changing the world begins with changing lives at home. Therefore, we are refocusing our efforts to fill the educational and economic gaps that have widened in New York's most underserved communities. The U.N. Women and New Future Foundation hosted a forum to usher in CSW 59/Beijing+20. A forum held Friday, Feb. 6 at Harlem Family Church Center, 147 W. 120th St., laid out their past and future efforts to establish an all-girls school in Ghana, Africa, with local Americanized Africans participating in the academic aspects.

Local activist Queen Mother Dr. Delois Blakely, a U.N. goodwill ambassador to Africa and founder of the U.N. non-governmental organization New Future Foundation, was the moderator of the event honoring the International Day of Women. The Rev. Juanita Pierre-Louis, pastor of Harlem Family Church Center, hosted the forum.

The Queen Mothers of Africa, which have been reunited after 20 years, are on a mission to build an all-girls school in Ghana. This reunion and consultation is the first introductory side event of the CSW 59/Beijing+20 session, starting in Harlem.

The 59th session of the Commission on the Status of Women will take place at the U.N. in New York City, First Avenue and 42nd Street, March 9-20. Representatives of member states, U.N. entities and ECOSOC-accredited non-governmental organizations from all regions of the world will attend the session. It has been 20 years since U.N. Women gathered in Beijing. Since then, the "Platform for Action" has been formed. It covers 12 critical areas of concern that are as relevant today as they were 20 years ago: poverty; education and training; health; violence; armed conflict; economy; power and decision-making; institutional mechanisms; human rights; media; environment; and the girlchild.

CSW 59 will address all areas of concern and strategic objectives will be identified in addition to a detailed catalogue of related actions to be taken by governments and other stakeholders at national, regional and international levels.

STATUTS DE L'ASSOCIATION NEW FUTUR FOUNDATION

TITRE I: OBJET ET COMPOSITION

ARTICLE 1 : NOM, DUREE ET SIEGE

Il est fondé entre les adhérents aux présents statuts une association régie par la loi N°66-70 du 13 juillet 1966 portant Code des Obligations Civiles et Commerciales et le décret N°97-347 du 02 avril 1997, une association ayant pour titre : « **NEW FUTUR FOUNDATION** ».

Sa durée est illimitée et son siège installé Zac de Mbao Cité ICS N40 Dakar Sénégal Téléphone 00221770384939

ARTICLE 2 : OBJET

Cette Association a pour objet d'aider les jeunes et les femmes, au Sénégal et dans la sous région, à participer vivement au développement de leur pays, de promouvoir le dialogue afro-américain, et de protéger la femme et les mineurs en danger.

A ce titre, elle mène les activités suivantes :

1. Promouvoir la scolarisation des filles et l'alphabétisation des femmes ;
2. Participer à la promotion de la langue anglaise dans l'enseignement moyen et secondaire par la création de clubs anglais dans les lycées et collèges et le financement des activités desdits clubs;
3. Contribuer à l'enrichissement de l'enseignement préscolaire, primaire, moyen et secondaire par la création d'un « Groupe Scolaire Bilingue Afro-Américain » ;

4. Combattre la pauvreté chez les femmes en leur aidant à formaliser leurs activités génératrices de revenus et à accéder au financement desdites activités ;
5. Promouvoir la protection de la femme en apportant assistance juridique aux femmes victimes de viol, d'harcèlement sexuel, de violence conjugale...;
6. Promouvoir la protection des mineurs en danger en leurs apportant assistance sociale, médicale et juridique ;
7. promouvoir une politique de concertation et d'échange culturel entre africains et américains par l'organisation de journées culturelles afro-américaines.

ARTICLE 3 : ADMISSION

L'association « NEW FUTUR FOUNDATION » est ouverte à tous, sans distinction d'origine de race, de sexe de religion.

« Pour faire partie de l'association, il faut être agréé par le conseil d'administration, qui statue, lors de chacune de ses réunions, sur les demandes d'admission présentées. »

ARTICLE 4: CONDITION D'ADHESION

Peuvent être membres de l'Association toute personne qui accepte de se conformer aux présents statuts et d'être à jour de ses cotisations annuelles.

ARTICLE 5 : RADIATION

La qualité de membre se perd par :

1. La démission ;
2. Le décès ;
3. La radiation prononcée par le conseil d'administration pour non-paiement de la cotisation ou pour motif grave, l'intéressé ayant été invité (par lettre recommandée) à fournir des explications devant le bureau et/ou par écrit.

TITRE II: ADMINISTRATION ET FONCTIONNEMENT

ARTICLE 6: LE CONSEIL D'ADMINISTRATION :

L'Association est administrée par un Conseil d'administration de douze (12) membres élus en Assemblée Générale pour une durée de cinq ans renouvelable indéfiniment. Le conseil d'administration est dirigé par un (e)

président (e) assisté d'un (e) vice président (e), d'un secrétaire bilingue et des autres membres du conseil.

Les membres du conseil d'administration doivent être âgés de 21 ans au moins.

Le conseil d'administration se réunit au moins une fois tous les six mois, sur convocation de son président, ou à la demande du quart de ses membres.

Les décisions sont prises à la majorité des voix.

En cas de partage, la voix du président est prépondérante. Tout membre du conseil qui, sans excuse, n'aura pas assisté à trois réunions consécutives sera considéré comme démissionnaire.

ARTICLE 7 : LE BUREAU EXECUTIF

- Un Trésorier Adjoint jouant un rôle de chef comptable ;
- Un chargé de la communication et du partenariat.

ARTICLE 8 : DUREE DU MANDAT DU BUREAU EXECUTIF

TITRE I – L'ASSEMBLEE GENERALE

Art.1 – Les convocations à l'assemblée générale sont envoyées aux membres au plus tard quinze jours avant la date fixée pour sa réunion, sous la signature du président.

Art.8 – En cas d'empêchement, les membres du Conseil d'Administration peuvent mandater une personne de leur choix, membre de l'association, régulièrement à jour de ses cotisations.

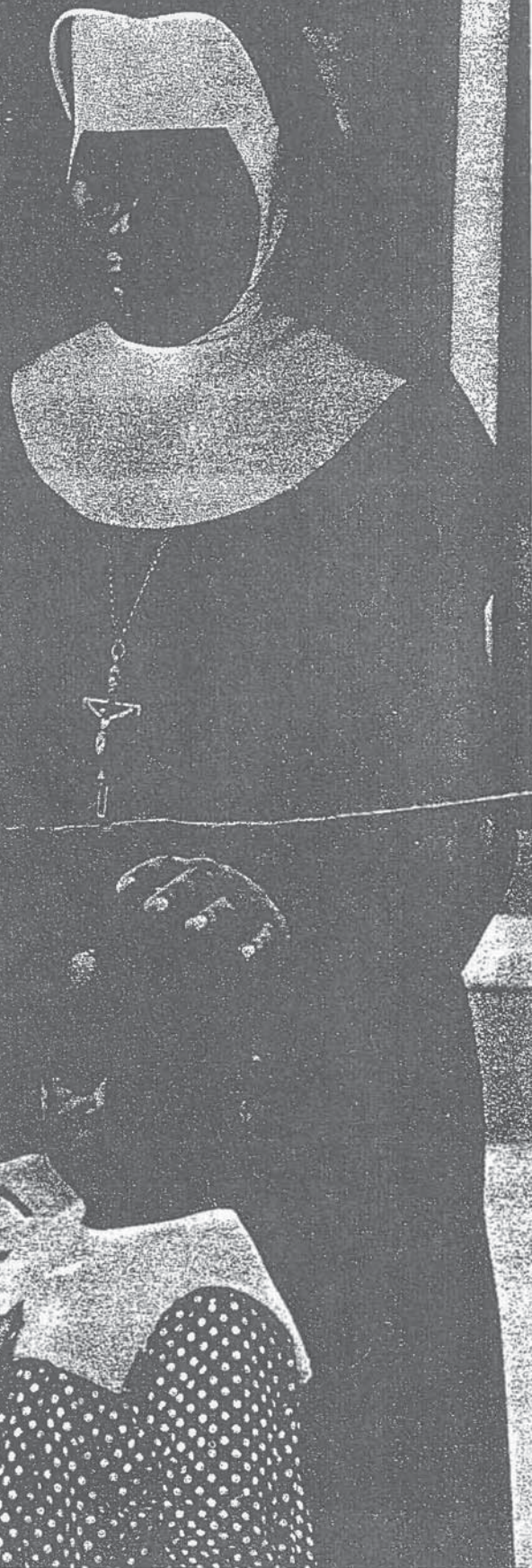

In A Hung-Up World

When Sister Sp The Hippies L

You may find her on any street in Greenwich Village.

A dimpled nun with an infectious smile strolling along with the hippies.

"Hi, baby," says a bearded, headed boy with a guitar slung over his shoulder.

"Hi, baby," says the nun. "Got a song today?" The conversation sounds like a TV script.

But it isn't. Sister Noelita Marie of the Franciscan Handmaids of Mary is a real person.

She'd liked to learn to fly an airplane. Occasionally she zips around in a police car. And wanders down to the Village every Saturday afternoon to see the action.

Tall and slight of frame, Sister Noelita Marie, is, as far as she knows, the first Negro nun from this area. For the past 10 years she's lived in New York, working in the field of education and as a counselor in the city's prisons.

Most Prisoners Are

"I began my work in the prisons as a volunteer," she says. "It was my own choice. The great problem in New York city is drug addiction. Most of the prisoners are addicts. If you need seven bags a day at a total cost of \$70 to keep high and you aren't working, how are you going to get it? Robbery or murder. So you wind up in jail.

"Because it's such a problem, everybody's concerned about it. But you've got to DO something. I like the challenge."

The idea of hardened addicts talking to a wisp of a girl in a religious habit isn't probable. But Sister Noelita Marie makes it possible.

"A Catholic boy, for instance, may reject me because I'm a nun," she says.

"I have to convey to him that I am a human being too. No matter what you're dealing with, you first have to tear down the walls.

"My method is to come down to their level. You've got to do that to make them rise up. So I use their language. A prisoner may come in and I'll say, 'You're up tight today. What's bugging you.'

"The only trouble is I have to drop those phrases when I'm not working. The word for heroin around addicts is 'white lady.' The phrase is 'white lady's a killer.' Sometimes that slips out with other people and I have to explain.

Always Wanted To

"Basically I don't believe people should be cooped up behind bars for five or six years. There was one young boy who came into to see me one day and I said, 'Man, you didn't know about things when you first came here.'

"He said, 'Yes, sister, but I learned.'

"I've always wanted to know why? That's one reason I'm so interested in youth. I respect them as individuals. They're very generous people but they've been held back. They haven't been allowed to be creative. So some are destructive. Teenagers want direction. It's how that direction's given that makes the difference.

"Now, we have the hippies. They don't care if I'm a nun. They don't care what you are. But hippies are hung up on one thing or another. They're rebelling and escaping against society. A hippy can be rich or poor. Most are intelligent and intellectual. They live as they want to live and do what they want to do. And each one has his own story.

"I remember talking to a homosexual in the village. He

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told me that a dollar means more to society than any person. And being a homosexual was the quickest way to make money. At the same time he was rebelling against society that says he's something ugly. So he makes a point of telling everyone, he's homosexual. He's throwing the ugliness back at a world he can't stand because of its value on the dollar.

"Then there was a teenage girl—a born leader who's father was a drug addict and stepfather molested her. She was a pot party organizer and for everything I said she had an answer.

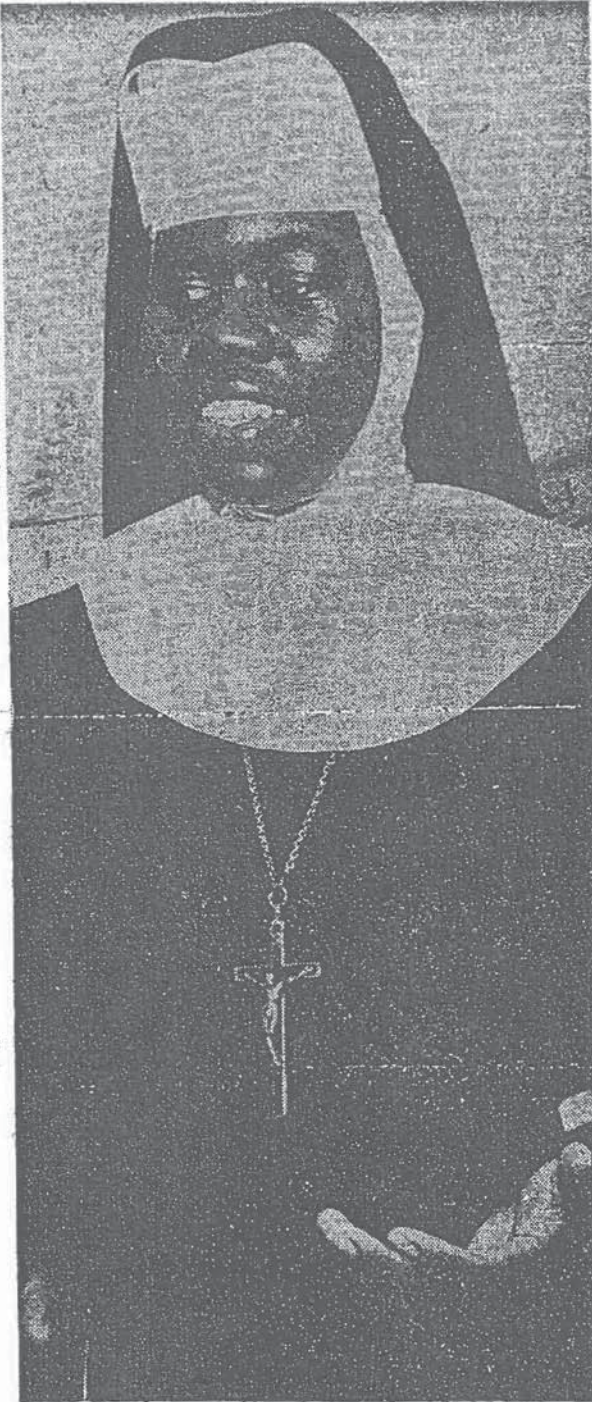
Problems Of Her

"What do you know about my problems, sister?" she'd say. 'You've never been molested or had an addict parent.'

"No,' I'd say. 'But I was a teenager and I had problems of my own. All teens have ideal values. But you have to make them real. If you plan to be an adult start acting like one. Let your parents be children, but don't let yourself go that road.'"

Sister Noelita Marie left New York three weeks ago for a vacation in Ft. Lauderdale. From the time of her arrival she's made a point of checking out the local scene on drug addiction, prison life, education and race relations.

"Ft. Lauderdale's changed a lot in the past 10 years," she says. "It's a progressive city in its buildings, population and beautification programs. But it's still conservative on race. Intermarriage isn't accepted too well as yet. And because I'm a Negro, some people here don't believe I'm a nun. It's not like that in New York. Prejudice isn't because of color there. It's class. People living in slum areas are prejudiced against middle-class persons who

come to slums to work and then go home every day to an outlying area. Slum dwellers want to know why they can't get jobs in the area where they live."

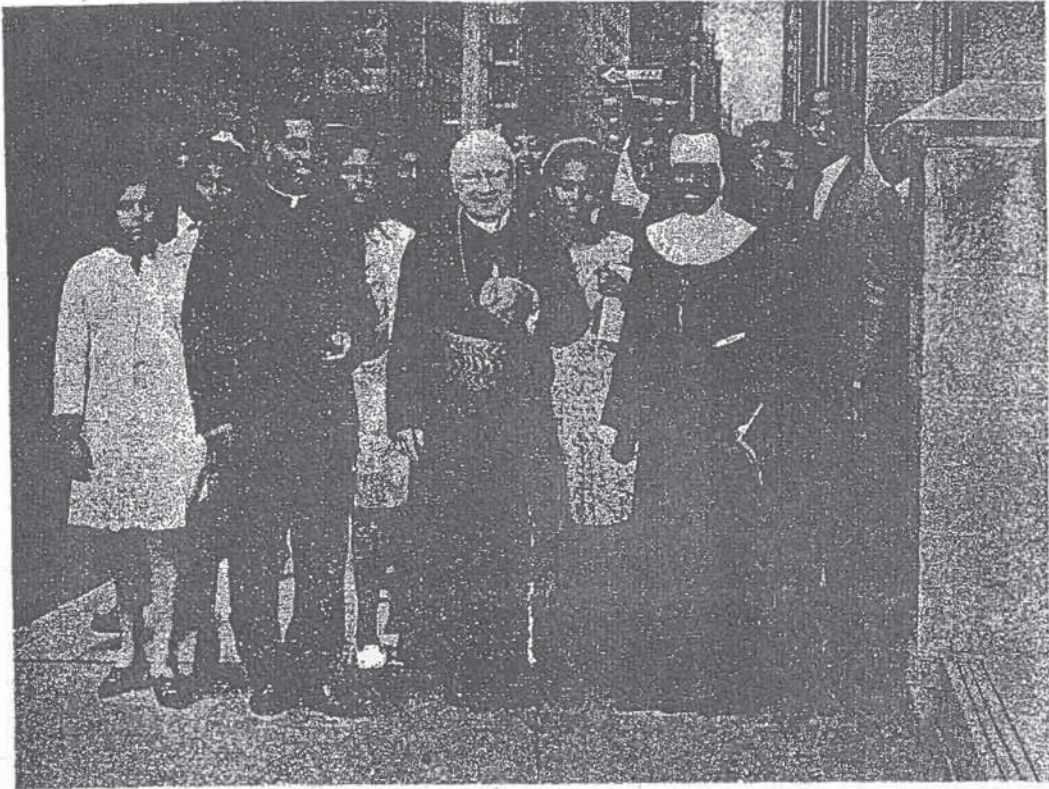
Punctuating each sentence with a wave of her hands, Sister Noelita Marie punches out her own advice on life.

"Everyone makes up soci-

ety," she says. "We know what's right. But we're all hung up on something—trying to escape. We're so busy with covers that we don't have time to share. Everybody's lived in illusion for too long. We've got to get down to reality."

And with that she took off for a final lesson.

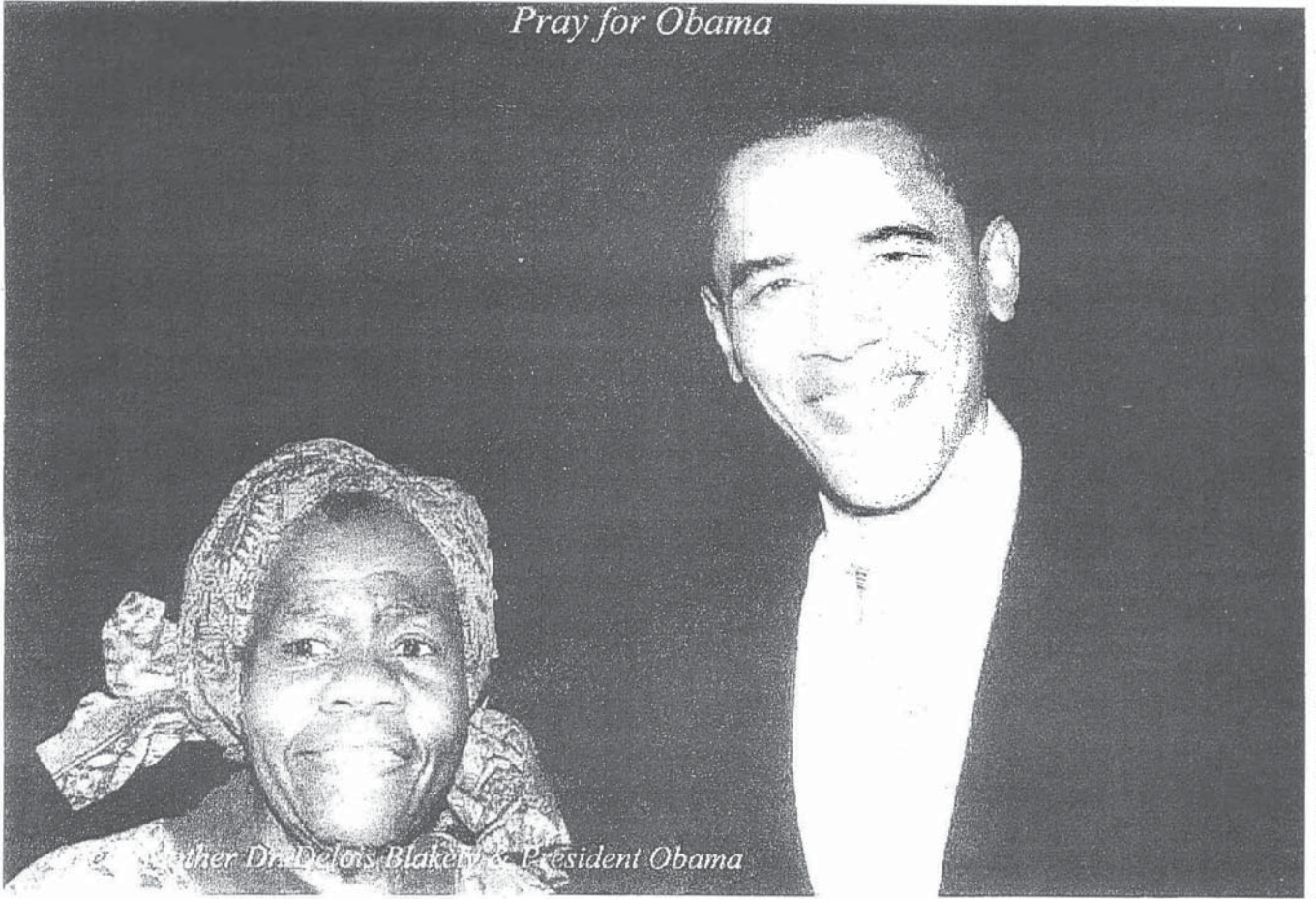

It attempts to develop a strong sense of identity in each child while the child is meeting, associating and appreciating children from all areas of life.

This organization prepares children for the future where they will encounter people from all backgrounds, so they will be able to relate and communicate with them without a sense of inferiority, superiority or a loss of identity.

The program is a preventative for some of the problems we presently have in our society. Future generations can have a more productive and positive attitude towards working and cooperating with many different people.

Delois Blakely, a nun for ten years, who left the convent to concentrate directly on the problems of New York City young people, founded the New Future Foundation.

"The overall problem is human relations," Delois explains. "Unfamiliar ethnic backgrounds create big problems: the youngsters look on different cultures and life styles as things to be feared and distrusted. By establishing programs where the young people work, and play, and participate together in community life, they soon get along-naturally."





How does it work?

FIRST-ENJOY:

The young people must enjoy working, playing, participating—just being with each other. To that end programs are carefully planned to make learning a pleasure.

The main method of the New Future Foundation is to sponsor street workshops for youth from different backgrounds. Some of the workshops include: reading and writing; creative poetry; hiking; bicycling; sledding; horseback riding; sketching; sculpturing; ice and roller skating; airplane and boat rides (with special permission from parent or guardian); indoor and outdoor tennis; learning about and eating foreign and domestic foods uncommon to each other's tables; learning about government, local and federal; exploring the world of business.

Beyond the new enjoyment of togetherness are three serious goals:

1. To make the young people aware that each one must assume leadership and take on responsibilities in solving problems in society.
2. To make the young people aware that each one has resources within himself and herself to do so.
3. To make the young people aware of their own background and culture, to be proud of it, and realize that it has value for others.

New Future Foundation believes that everything in society is instrumental to a young person's learning process. The community in which he lives—and the communities of his classmates—are sources of learning just as much as the schoolrooms.



Who are the workers?





New Future Foundation is with youth, for youth and by youth. One of the most inspiring aspects in the work of the NFF is the dedication of the high school and college students who act as counselors. In some instances the Foundation receives the services of the students, while the counseling students may receive credit in their studies or on-the-job training. Several groups of counselors are involved:

1. High school students are provided by the Neighborhood Youth Corps, under the sponsorship of the Youth Services Agency; the New York Board of Education under the sponsorship of the Right-to-Read Program, and the mayors High School volunteers. These young people are doing on-the-job training and are remunerated for their services.
2. The Urban Corps, City of New York, provides work-study students, year round, as part of their training in developing knowledge and skills, in their chosen fields. New York University, Yeshiva University, Columbia University, and others, have a special arrangement with the Foundation whereby their students receive credit for this work.
3. The doctoral candidates and faculty of Yeshiva University specializing in reading and psychology, develop a totally new program to teach inner-city children who are non-readers, to read, write and spell. The success of the program has been due, in large part, to a special system of diagnosis which leads to the discovery of each child's special learning needs.
4. Undergraduate students in the Department of Art at Cooper Union School of Science and Art produced a film on the work of the Foundation. A second documentary film on the NFF was produced by graduate students at New York University School of Film and Television. Both projects received accreditation for the students.

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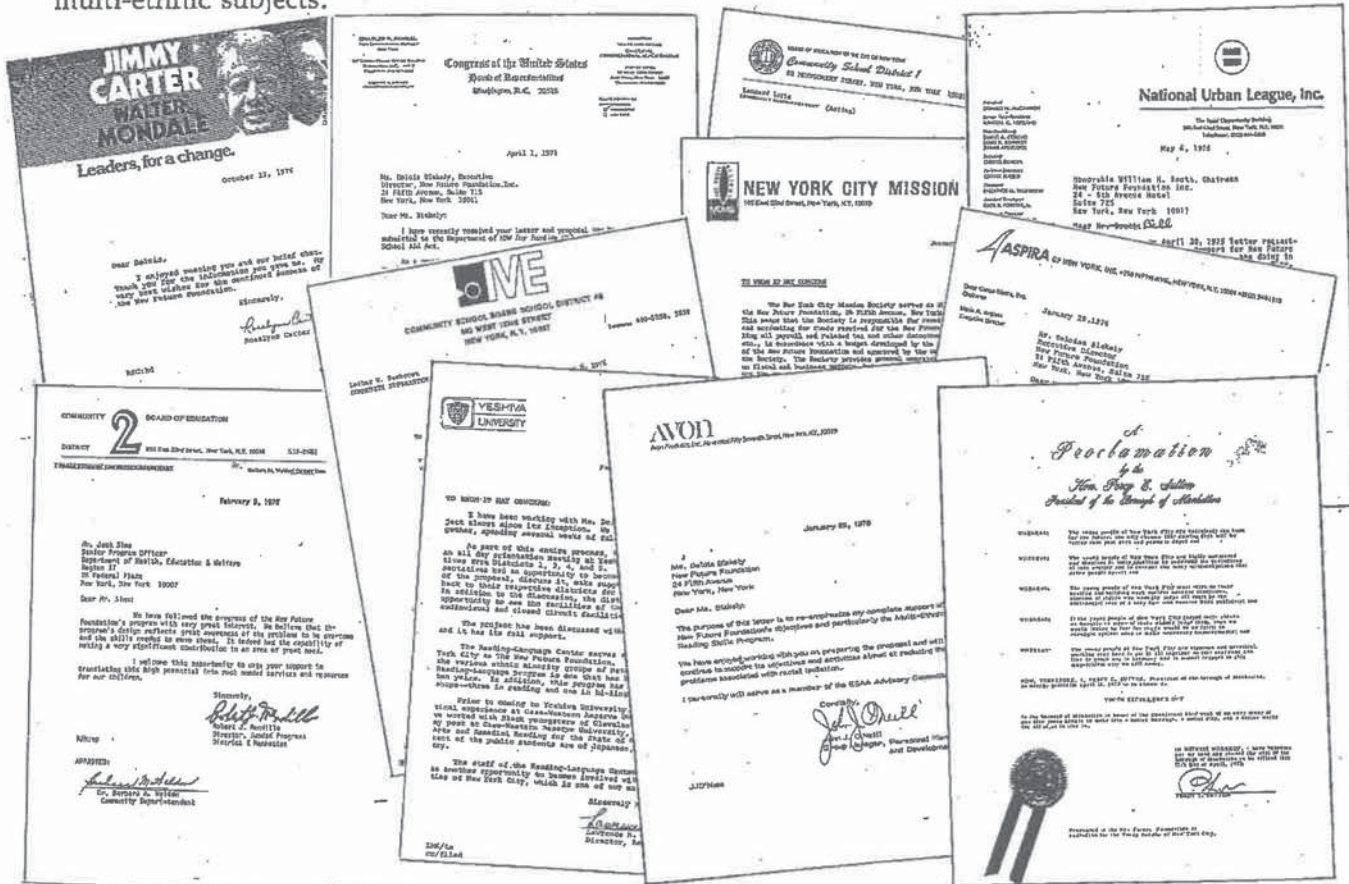





What's the success record?
