What is ResiliArt?

A global movement to support artists and creators

Join the ResiliArt debates

ResiliArt is an online debate series with key industry professionals and artists – both established and emerging – that raises awareness of the far-reaching impact of the current confinement measures as well as the importance of cultural and creative industries to economic development and social cohesion. While UNESCO, in partnership with CISAC, is the initiator of the debate series, it will be replicated around the world and focus on different priorities.

1. Engage in the interactive online debate on 15 April 2020 from 2pm-4pm (Paris time) by asking questions at unesco.org/resiliart-debate
2. Encourage fellow artists to follow and engage in the debates
3. Post your comments on your social media accounts using #ShareCulture and @unesco

1. Post a photo or video of you continuing to be creative despite the health crisis
2. Write or record a message of ResiliArt to help empower the artist community.
3. Tag the post with #ShareCulture and @unesco
4. Nominate a fellow artist who is ResiliArt
5. Post on your social media accounts on (or after) 15 April 2020

Your message may answer – but not limited to – one of the following questions:

- What is your way around social distancing measures to stay creative or keep art accessible?
- What is the biggest obstacle this health crisis has posed for you as a creator?
- What measures could be developed to support artists during this period?
