- i. The member state has been undertaking safety and security trainings exclusively for female journalists in various parts of the country in conjunction with the journalist union associations and other media stakeholders in the field of media development in Kenya.
- ii. Further, all trainings or where there is a need to engage the journalists as a cohort, at least 30 % of either gender must be represented as an affirmative measure in line with Article 27 of the Kenyan Constitution on Equality and Freedom from discrimination.
- iii. Roundtable meetings are held regularly and women in media are given opportunities to incentivize upcoming female journalists and prepare them to realities of newsroom and news gathering.
- iv. Female journalists in Kenya have a robust association, the Association of Media Women in Kenya (AMWIK) where members meet regularly for capacity building and to support and strengthen each another as well as compare notes and share opportunities for female journalists.
