Alissandra Cummins is a leading expert on Caribbean heritage, museum development, and art. She has been the Director of the Barbados Museum and Historical Society since 1985 up to date.

Alissandra is the President of the International Coalition of Sites of Conscience and a Board Member at UNESCO International Centre for Documentary Heritage. She is also Chairperson of the Barbados National Art Gallery Board.

Professor Andrea Papi graduated in Chemistry from the University of Florence, Italy, in 1972. Since his university years, he has been dealing with restoration chemistry. He is a professor of Chemistry for the Ministry of Education.

From 1978 to 2004, he was the Academic Director of the Institute for Art and Restoration in Florence.

Since February 2004, he has worked as a consultant in the field of restoration laboratory planning and restorer training courses, of which he is also a professor, in various parts of the world.

Tatiana Villegas Zamora is the Coordinator of the Culture Programme at the UNESCO Regional Office for Culture in Latin America and the Caribbean, based in Havana, Cuba. She is a Colombian underwater archaeologist who has worked on the development of underwater cultural heritage protection in Latin American countries as well as in diverse developing countries in other regions of the world over the last twenty years, through the promotion and implementation of UNESCO's Cultural Conventions of 1954, 1970, 1972 and 2001 particularly through capacity building.

Tatiana studied high school in New Delhi, India and in Georgetown, Guyana. She continued her university studies in the fields of History of Art and Underwater Archaeology at the Sorbonne in France, where she obtained her Master Degree, while also working at the Permanent Delegation of Colombia to UNESCO (1992-2001).

Since 2010 she joined the UNESCO international staff and was appointed Cultural programme Specialist in Havana, until 2014. She then joined the UNESCO Office in Port au Prince until 2016, when she was appointed at the UNESCO Regional Office for Science in the Arab countries, based in Cairo, where she was responsible of the Culture programme in Egypt, Soudan and Libya.
