African World Heritage Fund Report for the 38th Session of the World Heritage Committee Midrand (South Africa), 04/03/2014

Date of the Report: 4 March 2014

1. Background and mandate of the Centre

The African World Heritage Fund (AWHF) was created in 2006 and endorsed by the African Union Heads of States meeting the same year. It was granted the status of UNESCO Category II Centre in 2009 and the agreement between UNESCO and South Africa signed on 27 January 2010.

The AWHF's mandate is to strengthen the implementation of the 1972 World Heritage Convention in African States Parties, by facilitating the application of the decisions of the World Heritage Committee on the African continent. To that end, the AWHF shall assist African States Parties to:

- Prepare and update national inventories, tentative lists and nomination dossiers;
- Compile integrated management plans for the proper management and conservation of World Heritage properties located in the territory of the relevant African States Party;
- Comply with their obligations under the 1972 World Heritage Convention.

2. Institutional and operational structure of the Centre (Governing Board, Staffing, Operational funding and premises)

The AWHF's 14th Board meeting was held in Swakopmund, Namibia on 5-6 December 2013. The Board of Trustees comprises 12 members including representatives of South Africa (host country), African regions and professionals, UNESCO and the African union. The secretariat comprises 8 officers.

The AWHF depends on voluntary contributions from States Parties to the Convention (mainly from Africa) to set up and consolidate the Endowment and Operation Fund. The programmes funding is provided by various partners.
