REPORT OF THE INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMME FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF COMMUNICATION (IPDC) ON ITS ACTIVITIES (2008-2010)

OUTLINE

Source: Article 10 of the Statutes of the International Programme for the Development of Communication (IPDC).

Background: This report is submitted to the Intergovernmental Council of the International Programme for the Development of Communication (IPDC) in pursuance of Article 10 of its Statutes adopted at the 21st session, which stipulates that the Director-General shall submit to the Council, at each of its sessions, a report on the implementation of the International Programme for the Development of Communication.

Purpose: The present report covers IPDC's activities during the period between the 26th (2008) and 27th (2010) sessions of the Council. It provides an overview of important decisions and initiatives of the Council, IPDC projects and the financial situation of the Programme.

INTRODUCTION

The International Programme for the Development of Communication (IPDC), which was created 30 years ago, is the only intergovernmental programme in the UN system mandated to mobilize international support in order to contribute to sustainable development, democracy and good governance by strengthening the capacities of the developing countries and countries in transition in the field of electronic media and print press.

This unique role has been continuously reaffirmed through resolutions adopted by the United Nations General Assembly, including the most recent one *Resolution A/RES/64/96, "Information in the service of humanity"*, adopted on 10 December 2009 by the United Nations General Assembly at its 63rd session in which the General Assembly urges all countries, organizations of the United Nations system and all others concerned "to provide full support for the International Programme for the Development of Communication of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, which should support both public and private media."

26TH SESSION OF THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL COUNCIL OF THE IPDC

The overall responsibility for the Programme lies with the Intergovernmental Council of the IPDC, which meets every two years to assess the work carried out by the Programme. It consists of representatives from 39 countries elected by the General Conference of UNESCO. The twenty-sixth session of the Intergovernmental Council of the IPDC was held at UNESCO Headquarters, Paris from 26 to 28 March 2008.¹ The Report on the 26th Session of the Council is submitted as a separate document.

Election of the Bureau

At the beginning of the session, in accordance with its rules of procedure, the Council elected its Chairperson, Vice-Chairpersons, members and Rapporteur of the Bureau, as follows:

Chairperson: Mr Walter Fust (Switzerland)

Vice-Chairpersons: Afghanistan, Tunisia, Venezuela

Members: Namibia, Russian Federation, United States of America

Rapporteur: Mr Mamadou Koumé (Senegal)

Follow-up to the two Decisions adopted by the IPDC Intergovernmental Council

Decision on Media Development Indicators

In line with its standard-setting and policy-making role, the Council at its last session debated and endorsed a comprehensive set of Media Development Indicators (MDIs)² developed by a group of international experts at the request of the Council. The Council agreed that these Media Development Indicators constitute an "important diagnostic tool for all stakeholders to assess media development in a given country and to thereby determine the areas in which assistance is most needed". described the MDIs as an important contribution to the definition of a UN common approach to CCAs and UNDAF in the fields of media development and good governance. Moreover, the Council directed the IPDC Bureau to link the Media Development Indicators to development objectives when selecting project proposals for approval. Since then, IPDC has launched a series of assessments using the MDIs in selected pilot countries aimed at producing a set of evidence-based recommendations to guide the formulation of media-related policies at national level that enable media to fulfil their democratic potential. These recommendations are also designed to improve the targeting of media development interventions by both state and non-state actors. During 2009, five MDI assessments were launched in Bhutan, Croatia, Ecuador, the Maldives and Mozambique, involving multi-stakeholder partnerships in which both state and non state actors were involved. These assessments were conducted under the guidance of UNESCO by relevant local institutions in order to ensure national ownership of the process. The outcomes of the completed assessments will be presented to the IPDC Intergovernmental Council at its 27th session under the relevant agenda item.

In line with the directive given by the Council, the IPDC Bureau revised the format for submitting projects with a provision for the submitters to explain the links between MDIs and the development objectives of their proposals. The MDIs have been widely distributed, translated into seven languages and have been acknowledged by major actors in the media development field, including UNDP, the World Bank and the Council of Europe (see Resolution 1637, 03 October 2008). In pursuance of the Council's decision, the Director-General requested the heads of all UN agencies to use MDIs in their relevant country programming strategies.

Decision on the safety of journalists and the issue of impunity

The 26th session of the Intergovernmental Council decided that the Council should monitor the safety of journalists on the basis of the Director – General report submitted to the Council. It recalled 29 C/ Resolution 29 on the “Condemnation of violence against journalists” (UNESCO General Conference, 29th Session 1997) which calls upon Member States to take the necessary measures to protect journalists and prosecute those responsible for attacks. The Council also noted that the patterns of violence against journalists remain essentially unchanged while impunity of those who instigate the assassination of persons exercising the right to freedom of expression is prevalent. Following the report submitted by the Director-General on his condemnations of the assassinations of 121 journalists in 2006-2007, the Intergovernmental Council decided to launch an IPDC initiative to deal with the impunity of such crimes. The Council urged Member States “(a) to comply with the relevant obligations under international law to end impunity and to prosecute those responsible for violations, where actions have not been taken; (b) to inform the Director-General of UNESCO, on a voluntary basis, of the actions taken to prevent the impunity of the perpetrators and to notify him of the status of the judicial inquiries conducted on each of the killings condemned by UNESCO.” The Council also invited the IPDC Bureau to give priority to projects that support local capacity building for the safety of journalists. The Director-General implemented this decision by writing to the 28 Member States concerned requesting them to inform him, on a voluntary basis, of the judicial follow up to the killings that the Director-General had condemned. Twelve Member States responded and provided information on the follow up. A separate report on the responses as well as on the killings of journalists condemned by the Director-General in the 2008-2009 period is being submitted to the Council under the relevant agenda item.

IPDC SPECIAL INITIATIVE

Africa – Institutional Excellence in Training

Having recognized journalism education as a major issue to be addressed in Africa, UNESCO developed a set of criteria for institutional excellence in journalism training. After a mapping exercise to assess the capacities of African media training institutions, UNESCO identified twelve institutions that have the potential to become centres of excellence in journalism education. IPDC has approved 8 projects totalling US\$ 239,500 to support staff capacity building to adapt the UNESCO Model Curricula on Journalism Education in the relevant institutions while US\$ 240,000 was provided through the Regular Programme to build media resource centers and to upgrade reference material in 8 identified potential centers of excellence. UNESCO is currently negotiating a tripartite agreement with the African Union and the European Union to mobilise resources to develop these institutions into centres of excellence within four to five years.

214 PROJECTS APPROVED FOR FINANCING FROM THE IPDC SPECIAL ACCOUNT

Three annual meetings of the Bureau of the IPDC Council were organized at UNESCO Headquarters in Paris:

The meetings were chaired by Mr Walter Fust, IPDC Council Chairperson. The Advisers for Communication and Information from UNESCO's field offices attended the meetings to present the projects under their responsibility. The main purpose of the meetings was to select the media development projects to be financed by IPDC in 2008-2010.

During the period under review, 258 projects proposals were submitted for the Bureau's consideration by local media organizations from developing countries of all regions. Proposals were developed on the basis of the IPDC guidelines for project preparation³ with expert assistance from UNESCO professionals based in 33 field offices. Proposals were eligible to be considered only if they were submitted by credible organizations, had a clearly stated objective, and contributed to at least to one of the following IPDC's priorities:

- Projects that promote or strengthen freedom of expression by supporting electronic and print media or by building the capacities of media professionals to defend their right to freedom of expression and its corollary press freedom, including projects aimed at improving legislation in this respect.
- Projects that promote community media (electronic and print), including community multimedia centres with integrated community broadcasting facilities.
- Projects that support the training of media professionals and, in particular, capacity building of media training institutions to offer high-quality training and to train trainers

Among 258 projects proposals considered, the IPDC Bureau approved **214 projects (45 regional and 169 national projects from 89 countries) for a total amount of US\$ 5,698,180** (for the list of the approved projects, please see the annex). The table below provide information on the distribution of IPDC assistance by regions and countries:

CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE IPDC SPECIAL ACCOUNT

The IPDC Special Account received a total of US\$ 5,630,320 from 15 donor countries between 2007 and 2009, which were used for the financing of 214 projects approved in 2008-2010. The main contributors were Spain, Switzerland, Finland, the USA, Norway and Denmark:

In accordance with IPDC's procedures, the Bureau allocates funds to projects only on the basis of financial resources already available on the IPDC Special Account at the end of the financial year preceding the meeting of the Bureau. This practice helps to avoid any deficit in the IPDC budget and to proceed with the launching of the projects immediately after the Bureau's meeting.

The table below provides information on the progress of contributions received and the number of projects approved since the implementation of IPDC reforms in 2005:

In order to increase funds available to IPDC to support media development projects, the Council's Chairperson has sent letters to both traditional and potential donors, including developing countries, underlining the importance of supporting IPDC, even through symbolic contributions. The donors were reminded that any contribution, however modest it may be, is of great symbolic significance as it demonstrates their confidence in this unique multilateral assistance programme.

Evaluation of recent IPDC projects

The projects submitted to IPDC are considered to be a part of the long-term programme implemented by IPDC in each country. Therefore, when selecting projects, the IPDC Bureau considers the progress made in the country through previous IPDC support, based on project implementation reports and external evaluations. Every two years, the IPDC Bureau makes a selection of implemented projects that are to undergo an external evaluation. In line with the decision made by the Bureau during its 53rd meeting in 2009, evaluations were carried out on seven IPDC projects implemented to support community media in Jamaica, Kenya, Kyrgyzstan and Tanzania. These reports are presented to the 27th session of the IPDC Council. The evaluation reports constitute important working documents, especially for the Bureau, and serve as a useful reference for other partners that may wish to come on board, including private donors.

CONCLUSION

Since the accomplishment of the wide-ranging reforms of its working methods in 2005, IPDC has been able to assert its role in providing independent sustained support for media development in the developing countries through the financing of projects aimed at expanding opportunities for free and pluralistic media.
