Manual on the Annex of the 2001 Convention

The Annex to the 2001 Convention contains detailed practical guidelines entitled "Rules concerning activities directed at underwater cultural heritage". These Rules contain among others regulations as to how a project is to be designed; the competence and the qualifications required for persons undertaking interventions; the planning of the funding of excavation projects; the documentation of archaeological underwater excavations; and methodologies on conservation and site management. The 36 Rules of the Annex present a directly applicable operation scheme for underwater interventions and constitute one of the most significant components of the 2001 Convention. That is why UNESCO has elaborated a Manual on these Rules to better explain their content and facilitate their application. The publication of the Manual on the Annex is foreseen in its electronic format and in English language on 13 April 2011 during the third session of the Meeting of States Parties and for autumn 2011 in the printed version in English, French and Spanish. The first edition of the book will be distributed free of charge.

A draft version of the Manual has been made available to all Member States for information purposes.
