





Webinar series on FRAMEWORK FOR REOPENING SCHOOLS Webinar #10: Hybrid learning approaches



Background

Building on the <u>Framework for reopening of schools</u>, issued by UNESCO, UNICEF, the World Bank and WFP, a webinar series has been developed to focus on support to national governments for re-opening schools amidst the COVID-19 pandemic. Bringing to light the latest <u>Supplement</u> to the Framework for Reopening Schools, UNICEF, UNESCO and the World Bank continues its series of webinars on the implementation of safe school operations.

In the following weeks, the upcoming webinars of the joint UNICEF-UNESCO-World Bank series will address, among others, technical issues such as resurgence; academic and pedagogical considerations such as curriculum prioritization and remote assessment; school leadership and management; hybrid learning; and the use of technological platforms for remote learning.

Questions the webinar will address

As schools closed around the world, countries moved quickly to offer remote learning to continue children's education through various delivery modalities including online platforms, broadcast media (TV/radio) and paper-based take-home packages. The webinar on 16 December will focus on the delivery and effectiveness of hybrid and remote learning modalities and intends to share experiences from countries grappling with decisions to open or close their school systems, while the Northern hemisphere is experiencing a second wave of the pandemic.

The results of the second round of the joint UNESCO-UNICEF-World Bank survey (July-October 2020) show that among low-income countries, only 20 per cent considered remote learning sufficient enough to account for official school, while 70 per cent of lower-middle-income, 82 per cent of upper-middle-income and 86 per cent of high-income countries perceived it to be a valid learning alternative to official school days. Stark differences among income groups reflect the great inequities in access to the technologies that are required for remote learning. ¹

On the other hand, more than 90 per cent of countries across all income groups reported that remote learning (be it through online platforms, television, radio or take-home packages) will continue as schools reopen. Therefore, the webinar taking place on 16 December will not only address questions around the inclusion and effectiveness of remote learning, but also discusses how hybrid approaches can be best implemented.

The webinar will address the following questions:

- How are countries planning for and/or ensuring remote provision of education using multimodal delivery systems, including a combination of online, TV and radio, implementing a systematic approach?
- How have these approaches adapted to or improved during school closures, reopening, and reclosures?
- How to ensure an ideal balance of remote and in-classroom learning for all grades and what does this mean for school/institutional planning?
- What is being done by countries to support teachers in implementing hybrid teaching and learning?
- What do we know about the effectiveness of hybrid approaches?

Format

This 90-minute webinar will include panelists from selected countries around the world. A moderator will facilitate the discussion between the panelists on the three main themes. A Q&A session will follow the discussion.
