



Sub-Regional training of trainers and peer learning on participatory policy monitoring of the 2005 Convention

DRAFT PROGRAMME

30 July – 1st August 2019 Jakarta, Indonesia

BACKGROUND NOTE

The 2005 Convention for the Protection and Promotion of the Diversity of Cultural Expressions is an international legal instrument, ratified by 145 countries and the European Union that supports governments and civil society in their efforts to design and implement policies and measures that support the creation, production, distribution of and access to cultural goods and services.

To achieve this goal, UNESCO is running a capacity-building programme on participatory policy monitoring since 2014. Supported by the Government of Sweden through Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida), this programme aims to strengthen the human and institutional capacities of governmental and civil society actors in monitoring and reshaping their cultural policies through the elaboration of quadrennial periodic reports (QPR).

The submission of QPRs is a statutory obligation for those States that have ratified the Convention. These reports are tools to assess results achieved and challenges encountered, and provide information on policies and measures taken to promote the cultural and creative sectors, in line with the principles and objectives of the 2005 Convention. This reporting process goes well beyond a technical exercise; it is designed to support, through inclusive multi-stakeholder dialogues, transparent, forward-looking and evidence-based cultural policymaking.

At the global level, the QPRs also constitute a key source of information for the UNESCO Global Report series, "Re-shaping Cultural Policies", which serve to advocate for policy change. Two Global Reports have been published in 2015 and 2018. The third will be launched in June 2021, building on the data and information emerging from the QPRs (as well as other types of sources) submitted before April 2020.

A first phase of the project was implemented during the 2014-2017 period¹. Positive results have led to the signature of a second phase. This new project, entitled "Reshaping Cultural Policies for the Promotion of Fundamental Freedoms and the Diversity of Cultural Expressions", is being implemented in 16 partner countries² (2018-2022) and will also allow for the publication of the third edition of the Global Report.

GENERAL OBJECTIVES OF THE TRAINING

This training is expected to explore how partner countries from Asia could engage in transparent and participatory policy monitoring processes through the elaboration of their QPRs and support non-partner countries in their endeavor.

Overall, the objectives of the training will serve to:

- bring together the national counterparts of Parties to Convention from the Asian region with UNESCO HQ and FOs colleagues;
- present the format for quadrennial periodic reporting to national counterparts;
- discuss methodologies to support participatory policy monitoring processes at country level;
- share UNESCO's tools and materials for the promotion and implementation of the 2005 Convention;
- inspire peer-to-peer cooperation mechanisms to promote mutual learning and expand South-South cooperation.

EXPECTED RESULTS OF THE TRAINING

- participants share common knowledge and understanding of the future role and responsibilities of the national counterparts;
- participants reach common understanding of methodology to be used and agree on future steps to elaborate their quadrennial periodic report in a participatory and effective way.
